### **St Andrews Church**

We have finally crossed the i's and dotted the t's on the paperwork that is needed to advertise for a new vicar. It is hoped the advert will go out from the Peterborough Diocese at the end of August/ beginning of September but it is unlikely that an appointment will be made until the New Year. We are all hopeful there is a suitable candidate just waiting to come and lead us in our mission.

Some of you will be aware that the rectory and rectory room are to be sold; a more modern economical rectory is to be purchased in Stanion for the new incumbent when an appointment is made. Whilst this brings to an end the long tradition of having a vicar in residence in Brigstock the beautiful house will always be there as a reminder of the previous occupants and the wonderful history that surrounds all of the church buildings and grounds.

Services are continuing as normal but I want to draw your attention in particular to our 'All Age' services that are held on the second Sunday of each month at 11am. This is a 30-minute service without communion that is designed for children and adults and extends the worship the children take part in during their time at Brigstock Primary school. It would be wonderful to see all of the 110 children who attend the Church of England school (and their families) but even a small percentage would fill us with joy. The service contains readings and singing (we are pretty good with the action songs these days!) and story telling. It is a much more informal gathering. Do come along and join in one month if you are able. Everyone is welcome. All services are followed by tea, coffee and biscuits.

Since the last newsletter Mrs. Penelope Escombe has retired as Churchwarden after 20 years of service and in July we thanked her for all of her dedicated service with gifts and celebration cake. Mr. Carl Hector continues as Churchwarden and Mrs. Linda Ellison has been appointed as the new Churchwarden.

In May a very successful Christian Aid collection occurred around the village, the house-to-house collection amounted to £960.10. This collection involved over 500 houses and 32 roads, which were covered by 10 collectors achieving a 43% envelope return. Our neighbouring United Reformed Church provided four collectors to assist us and also had a breakfast event on the Sunday, which raised a separate £ 77.41 for the charity.

We would like to thank all of you who generously donated, all of the collectors and everyone else who helped to increase awareness of the event.

We have also been busy fund raising. The springtime mini market was held alongside the plant sale and was well attended. The sun shone brightly for the summer fete – a combined fete with Brigstock Latham's primary school, a wonderful time was had by all. Many thanks to all who contributed items, helped with stalls or who came to support the event over £1,800 was raised, this was split between the church and school

On 23<sup>rd</sup> September we look forward to welcoming Mrs. Mary Laing to talk on her travels around the world in a two seater. This promises to be a most fun and interesting talk so do look out for tickets when they go on sale.

### **Brigstock Neighbourhood Plan**

The Neighbourhood Plan has been on a slight slow down while we waited for the results of the Gladmans appeal. If they had won, then it would not really have been worth going on as any developer could apply for planning permission and get it under appeal even if East Northants rejected it.

So now that we know that the appeal has been dismissed, it is full steam ahead to get the Neighbourhood Plan completed.

The committee are now looking at the possible sites which could be developed to give around 35 houses which the survey of residents showed was the preferred growth over the next 15 years. We will be bringing these back out to all residents to comment on or approve in the near future.

We are also preparing the justification for the proposed open spaces, so that these can be protected from future development .

The actual plan is being written now, so that when we have all the information together, we can complete it as soon as possible.

### **VILLAGE OF THE YEAR 2016**

### **BRIGSTOCK WAS AWARDED HIGHLY COMMENDED**

The judges came round for the Village of the Year on Thursday 26<sup>th</sup> May in the morning and met with various people. We recently received our grading and were pleased with the Highly Commended.

Thanks to Liz Searle for organising the entry and judges' visit and all the others involved.

# GLADMAN DEVELOPMENT, OFF BENEFIELD ROAD-APPEAL DISMISSED.

The Public Enquiry called by Gladmans after their planning applications were rejected started on 19th July. East Northants Council had their staff and barrister facing a team of 5 from Gladmans. It started with a site visit to the village with several residents joining in to give their views to the independent examiner.

There then followed 7 days examination where experts from both sides were called to give evidence or be questioned. Several residents and representatives from the village gave evidence, explaining why they thought it was not a suitable development for the village. A lot of the arguments revolved around whether there was an adequate supply of allocated housing sites in the district as per the Council's Joint Strategy.

There were also discussion about traffic, drainage, archaeology and the environment. It was very difficult to judge at the enquiry which way the decision would go. The Inspector said that it would be about 5—6 weeks before a decision was made.

However on 15th August, it was announced that the appeal had been dismissed and Gladmans would not be able to develop their site. The Inspector stated that the Council's Joint Strategy had only just been approved by the Secretary of State and that there was no evidence that the proposed housing could or would not be delivered in the district. He continued that Brigstock was a village with a good open space between it and the by-pass and that this area should remain undeveloped. There is still the very remote possibility that they appeal to the High Court, but this seems very remote.

A lot of work was put into fighting this development by residents in the village, especially the residents group and the Parish Council, and this has helped East Northants Council to beat the application.

It is now imperative to get the Neighbourhood Plan completed so that the village does get extra protection under planning law to control the building of new houses.

### Brigstock United Reformed Church

A lot of work is involved in sorting and packing the boxes, but it was eventually finished and we ended up with 84 boxes and 42 black sacks to send to Salvatex! The van that collected them all was full to the brim. The whole event raised £651 for our funds, and we are especially grateful to Sharon and David Eldred who did a lot of hard work and organising behind the scenes.

In August we started a new venture-a weeks' Holiday Club for children of primary school age. We had no idea how many children-or their parents!-would be interested, but we had an excellent response and the week went really well. There is a separate report about the Holiday Club with more details of what went on, but we are really indebted to Helen Johnston who did the bulk of the organising, together with Paula Addison-Pettit and Graham Baty; without their skills and enthusiasm it wouldn't have happened. We are also very grateful to volunteers from the church and from other organisations who gave up some time to help out; their assistance was very much appreciated.

We have a few more events to look forward to; another Barn Dance will be held on September 3<sup>rd</sup> in the Village Hall. Tickets are still available at £7.50 each, to include a ploughman's supper, and the music will be provided by Kelly's Eye.

On October 7<sup>th</sup> there will be a Beetle Drive in the June Small room, Mill Lane. Our last Beetle Drive became very competitive, and tickets will be quite limited due to space, so make sure you get yours early! Details will be on posters nearer the time.

#### What is CallConnect?

CallConnect is a unique bus service whose timetable is not fixed but responds to passenger requests. This means its routes are different each day depending on the bookings made by passengers. Journey requests can be made by telephone or online. The service is designed to improve transport opportunities in rural communities and some market towns where there is an infrequent conventional bus services.

#### Who can use CallConnect?

Everyone! All are welcome to use the service regardless of age or status. You can use the service as frequently as required for anything from shopping or travelling to work or school to a social event or medical appointment. Even if you are just visiting the area and need a bus, contact our booking office and find out how we can help you.

### How do I book a journey?

You can book a CallConnect journey by calling our booking team on 0345 263 8153. When requesting a bus journey, have your membership number and journey details ready. You can make a booking up to seven days in advance. You can also request same-day journeys but please give a minimum of one hour's notice.

All bookings are subject to availability.

#### **Fares**

The amount you pay to travel depends on your journey. Each service area is divided into zones – the further you travel, the more you pay. Booking office staff can tell you the cost of your journey so that you can have the correct fare ready. Children aged under 5 travel free with an accompanying adult. If you hold a valid concessionary bus pass due to age or disability, you can use it on CallConnect buse are accepted during off-peak travel (after 9.30am).

### **Opening and Operating Times**

CallConnect operates 7am-7pm, Monday-Saturday

Details of any local variations are available from the booking office.

The booking office is open from 8.00am-6pm, Monday-Friday; 9.00am-4pm on Saturday; and closed Sundays and Bank Holidays.

### Need a little help?

Our vehicles are fitted with low-floor steps and are fitted with a taillift to ensure they are as easy as possible for everyone to use. For wheelchair passengers, CallConnect can accommodate one fixed wheelchair per bus. Passengers wishing to travel in their wheelchair must inform us of the make and model to ensure it meets our safety standard of being impact-tested. Travel in a wheelchair is subject approval and availability.

### **NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH**

### **Volunteers sought for Custody Visiting**

The Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner is looking for volunteers to join the county's Independent Custody Visiting scheme. Independent Custody Visitors are volunteers who visit people in custody to check on their welfare, that they are receiving their rights and entitlements and that the conditions they are being held in are satisfactory.

Brian Warmington has been volunteering as an Independent Custody Visitor for 8 years. He said: "I visit detainees in Corby Police Station to ensure all rights are upheld. I had never heard of custody visiting until I read an article in a local paper. I thought this is something I could do as a 'pay back' to society. "It is important that communities have confidence in their local police service and we help provide this community oversight."

The volunteers visit in pairs and follow a rota which means they carry out a minimum of one visit every two months. Volunteers visit the Custody suite in Corby Police Station or the Criminal Justice Centre in Brackmills, Northampton. Detainees are asked a number of questions relating to their welfare and are asked for consent to view their custody records to check everything is being processed and recorded properly. Report forms are completed and sent back to the Office of the Police and Crime Commission, who liaise with the Force about any issues.

A training programme is provided for all volunteers and regular meetings are held to have the opportunity to talk about any concerns. Alexa Daly, from the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner said: "Independent Custody Visitors play a vital role in maintaining standards of custody and the treatment of detainees.

"We're looking for people to join the scheme who live or work in Northamptonshire and are aged 18 or over. It's essential that anyone interested is able to be impartial, objective and non-judgemental, as well as being able to communicate effectively with people from different backgrounds."



### **Brigstock History - May-Day Revels**

The scholars attending Latham's School, Brigstock, had quite a gala day on Friday last, when they carried out their usual May-Day festivities which were of a very bright and enjoyable character.

The children, in their best attire, and gaily decked out with garlands and flags, assembled in the school playground at one o'clock and marched in procession to the Hall Hill. Here the crowning of the May Queen took place. The throne was represented by a gaily decorated trolley. This year Lorrie Millard was elected May Queen by the children and she was accompanied by the following four maids of honour: Ivy Beeby, Linda Millard, Annie Deans and Evelyn Hill; while Vernon Millard was crown bearer and Jack Beeby sceptre bearer. After the crowning of the Queen, the children sang very nicely the May Day song "Come lasses and lads". Then followed a country dance by a group of girls which received much applause. Another song "Welcome May" was sung and then the whole of the children marched past and saluted their Queen.

The children were then loaded in vehicles, kindly lent by Messrs. W. Beeby, J. Bellamy, C.N.Spencer, W.Palmer and H.Binder, and were conveyed to Farmingwoods Hall, where they were kindly received by Mr and Mrs Wallis and after singing their songs and dancing the country dance, they were handsomely rewarded.

Arriving back at the school about four p.m., the ladies 'committee had a bountiful tea ready, to which ample justice was quickly done. After that the children and their parents re-assembled in a meadow on the Thrapston Road, kindly lent by Mr W. Beeby. Here the maypole dance was charmingly done several times during the evening by two groups of girls, also the country dance. At intervals races and other games were indulged in. The evening performances were much enlivened by the presence of the Brigstock Brass Band who kindly gave their services. At eight p.m. the children re-assembled and after hearty cheering for the ladies and gentlemen, who had done so much to make the day so enjoyable, each child was presented with a bag of sweets and an orange.

# **Greetings from the Friends of Fermyn Woods Country Park**

The Friends of Fermyn Woods Country Park (FWCP) thought that that we would use this edition of the village newsletter to provide some information about "the Friends". The Friends group was originally set up following the Senior Ranger at the time arranging a meeting in 2009 inviting anybody with an interest in the country park to attend. At this meeting it was highlighted that several of the Country Parks within Northamptonshire had set up "Friends groups" who had facilitated hosting various events and activities at those parks which in turn had generated funds to help improve the parks. There was a great fondness for FWCP among the people who attended the meeting and so they decided that they too should set up a Friends group to help support the park. The newly formed group then formed a committee and arranged to meet every other month so that they could discuss ideas to support the Park.

Over the years one of the main ways that the Friends has achieved this aim is by hosting a significant number of events. The group was very fortunate in that its original Chairman, Pete Rogers, was the lead singer in a Rock and Roll Band and as he very kindly volunteered their services, over the years the Friends hosted several "Rock and Roll" nights. Another event that has been a very popular over the years is "Carols by Candles". For many people the singing of carols at various points around a candle lit park has become a regular event in their yuletide celebrations.

Other events worth a particular mention include the quiz nights in The Green Dragon with our quiz master "Ranger Pete" asking an eclectic mix of questions as well as "Brass in the Park" which included the award winning Youth Brass 2000 playing a medley of tunes. More recently there was the owl night which included an informative talk followed by the opportunity to hold owls of various sizes. As well as being fun these events have been raised a considerable amount of money which has been invested back into the country park to improve the facilities e.g. education structure, dog walker shelter, bird cameras, furniture for a children's area within the café, orienteering plaques.

### Who's Who in Brigstock: Margaret Knight

Margaret Knight moved from Northumberland, where she was born and brought up, to Brigstock in 1959 after her marriage to husband Paul, who was serving in the RAF at that time. However she did have an earlier connection to the village, for, after leaving school aged 14, she came to Fermyn Woods Hall to serve on the staff as a trainee cook. A friend of her mother was a cook there and had found a place for her. Margaret worked and lived in at the Hall, which was then the residence of the Bell-ville family, for about two years before returning north. Captain Bellville had come to Brigstock to become Master of the Woodland Pytchley Hunt based in the village. Margaret's parents both worked for the railways in Northumberland and, on her return, Margaret also found employment there as a clerk and worked at many different stations in the area, including Newcastle Central.

Paul's parents had a shop in Bridge Street, opposite the school, and Margaret lived there and helped in the shop, while her husband was completing his RAF service. Before moving to that location Mr and Mrs Knight had another store at the bottom of Benefield Road and behind that shop were the bake-house and a petrol station, as many people in the village will still remember. The Bridge Street shop was a general grocery store. Deliveries of goods were also made round the village and some customers came to expect personal service. On one occasion at 11pm on Christmas Eve Margaret received a call from a customer to say that the family had just returned home and had no tea or coffee in the house and could some be sent round straightaway. The request could not be fulfilled as, apart from the fact that everyone was in bed, the shop was alarmed and could not be opened till the following morning. Margaret also recalls that one of the items sold in the shop was snuff, which sold well but which she hated serving, as she did not like the smell of it or the way it was consumed.

When the children were born the family moved to Tresham Lodge on Benefield Road. This gave them a lot more room but the house had no modern amenities. There was no mains electricity and no hot water system in the house. Paul had a generator rigged up to provide lighting and a boiler in the outside barn was used to provide hot water for bathing the children and washing clothes, both done in the outhouse.

Looking after the children and helping in the shop didn't leave much spare time for anything else. She must have been very happy to move to Stanion Road, while the children were young, to a house with more modern amenities. After Paul's parents gave up the shop Margaret worked for a time at Wallis and Linnel's factory in Brigstock and later worked from home making duffel coats for Gloverall's of Wellingborough.

But during these busy years and ever since, the Chapel, now the United Reformed Church, was an important part of Margaret's life. She has served as a Church Elder for many years and helped with the essential organisation of the church by producing preaching plans and booking visiting ministers for the Sunday services. Margaret also took over as church organist after Becky Smith. The chapel was important in the social as well as religious life of its members and one of its popular activities was the concert party. Margaret was a member of this group who not only provided entertainment for the village but travelled to different places in the area to put on shows. She is also treasurer of the Open Door coffee mornings held each Wednesday in the meeting room at the chapel.

Paul became interested in finding out the details of the Lancaster bomber which crashed at Luscote's Lodge on 22<sup>nd</sup> December 1943 near the site of the present gliding club in Brigstock. He also wanted to have a memorial erected at the site to commemorate the three airmen who died on that day, Sergeant Thomas G. Higgins, Sergeant George C O'Neill and Flight Sergeant Cecil E. Ryall. After a great deal of research and fundraising, a memorial was installed near the site of the crash. At the official Dedication Ceremony on 16<sup>th</sup> September 1998 a Lancaster, a Spitfire and a Hurricane made a fly past to commemorate the occasion. The gliding club had given permission for their club room to be used for refreshments. Margaret and her friends had catered for an estimated 60 people to be there but when they looked out they could see about three times that number at the ceremony. After a few moments of panic a quick trip to the Co-op was organised to save the day and make sure that there was enough for everybody. Paul also helped to put up another roadside memorial to commemorate another fatal air crash which took place between Benefield and Corby. Both of these memorials are now looked after by Kevin Flecknor.

### Weeding round War Memorial

There have been comments about the War Memorial being untidy and so at the last Parish Council meeting it was suggested that all the different organisations in the village take it in turns to weed it on a monthly basis.
