NEWTOWN REMEMBERED

Ask the majority of residents in Brigstock the whereabouts of "Newtown" and in most cases they will tell you. Situated to the north of the village it comprised of nine Victorian red bricked terraced cottages fronted by what could only be called a glorified cart track, producing more dust in the summer than you could imagine, and with the onset of the motor car, it became more and more intolerable.

Bordering the road was a number of, what was then we'll cultivated allotments, but over a period of twenty or more years they were left to deteriorate and mother nature took over. Everything became overgrown with trees and shrubs, and a vast area of BlackBerry bushes which produced possibly the largest Blackberries in the county.

Unfortunately over this period flora and fauna took over completely and became very invasive to neighbouring properties. Inevitability lurking in the wings was the ever present property developer waiting to pounce, and after a period of fourteen years permission was granted to put into place plans to create new homes.

In February of 2015 the first site machinery moved in and week by week a dramatic change started to take place and by midsummer major construction was almost complete and everything was on schedule. Shortly before Christmas 2015 the road was eventually constructed which really was the icing on the cake after a hundred years or more of dust and filth

The first resident moved in prior to Christmas and will be succeeded by others over the next few months. What was once an uncharacteristic part of our lovely village has now been transformed into what is now a very new and quiet residential part of our village community and blends perfectly into the surrounding area.

This is possibly the end of an era which could have culminated in the transition from the original village stonework, to brick built dwellings still around today, and now well into the future.

Although not widely known all nine existing cottages were all occupied by people all linked to the same family but more recently new fresh young blood is in the neighbourhood which leaves my wife and myself the oldest, consistent, and original codgers on Newtown.






Brigstock Film Night – Season Finale

Who's Who in Brigstock:- Jim Clark

Jim Clark has been a Brigstock resident since 1987 when he came here with his wife, Jean, on his retirement after 48 years service in the grocery business. The couple came to the village to be near their daughter and son-in law who live in Stanion. He has recently passed his 92nd birthday and has been a widower for 18 years but still takes an active part in the community.

He was born and brought up in the small village of Euston, near Thetford, which reputedly is where the name of the famous London station originated. After leaving school at 14 he started work as an apprentice in the grocery trade but after three years, in December 1942, he was called up to serve his country during the Second World War. Following basic training and a 6 week driver's course he went for battle training in Lincolnshire. He then embarked with the Norfolk Regiment, arriving in Bombay and then on to the army dispersal camp at Deolali, an unpleasant location, which affected some soldiers' mental and physical health and which gave rise to the phrase "sending you doolally". He was transferred to the King's Regiment at Jhansi, which was part of the Chindit force, which operated in Burma, behind the Japanese lines, a dangerous mission, blowing up bridges and railways and disrupting enemy supply lines. Before going into Burma during a parade there was call for all trained drivers to come forward. Jim thought this was alright, he was going to drive a truck, but instead was put in charge of a mule, the only means of transport through the jungle. He spent 5 months fighting in Burma before being pulled out in June 1944 with an injured knee and suspected diphtheria. During his service with the Chindits many of his comrades were killed or injured. Jim was one of the many heroes of that conflict, ordinary young men who did extraordinary things in their country's service.

It was not until the end of 1946 that Jim finally came home to England and he was not demobbed until 22nd May 1947, nearly two years after the end of the war. He was then able to go back to civilian life and resume his career.

He had management positions in the grocery business and moved over the years to a number of locations, including Wisbech, Wellsnext-the-sea, Kings Lynn and Newmarket, finally retiring from his job at Haverhill in 1987. He met Jean in the course of his work as she was employed by same company and they were married in 1950.

Jim became a member of Brigstock Sunnysiders soon after he came to the village and has been involved with them ever since, serving as Chairman for about 12 years. He was also a founder member of the Brigstock Lunch Club, helping with transport and serving for many years as Treasurer and Chairman of that social group. Until last year he organised the annual Big Coffee morning at Harper's Court to raise money for the MacMillan Nurses. He is interested in bellringing and was one of the bell ringers at the St Andrew's Church for 10 years, although he has now retired from that activity. He also has a keen interest in photography and is President of Corby Photographic Club, which regularly meets in Stanion Village Hall.

Of course, Jim never forgot his wartime comrades and is an active member of the Burma Star Association, the Burma Star being one of the medals that he won for his service, and is vice-chairman and treasurer of the Peterborough branch of this organisation. He was also a member of the Chindits Old Comrades Association. Over the years he has attended many reunions and commemorations all over the country, including three garden parties at Buckingham Palace. Last year was particularly busy, with commemorations to mark the 70th anniversary of the end of the war. On 19th October 2015 the Chindits Old Comrades were officially retired at a special function at Clarence House attended by Prince Charles who spent time with all the members who were able to attend. The ending of the Association must have been an emotional occasion for all those present, bringing back memories of their comrades and friends who were left behind in Burma.

ENGLAND SCHOOL

The children continued the Day 10 project work through the latest PSHE theme of friendship, which was entitled "You've Got a Friend in Me." The school walked to the memorial for 11:00 am and marked it with a 2 minutes silence. Poems and prayers were read out by staff and children. Representatives from each year group laid the wreath.

The Art Club created a troop of green monkeys for the bank at the front of the school. The green monkeys represent 'Resourcefulness' which is one of our four learning values. They symbolise creative learning and are also an inspiration for some story writing in Year 3 and 4. Look out for the red tortoise of Resilience which will be joining them soon...

The children in Year 5/6 art club designed the window. We have chosen a very traditional nativity scene. Every child in the school created a star and we proudly unveiled the window on the 10th December after our Christmas play performances. Reception and KS1 brought in their favourite toys to begin their unit of work on toys. The children created masterpieces and had a picnic with their toy friends. They have completed some fabulous writing and art on the theme of toys.

BRIGSTOCK LATHAMS CHURCH OF ENGLAND SCHOOL PARENTS AND FRIENDS ASSOCIATION

It's a good time to look at what the PFA has done over the past few years; after all, many of you have supported us by attending the fete or enjoying a play. What has all this jollity done for the children?

If we start by looking back a few years, the unusable earth bank running down from the playground to the stream was turned into an outdoor theatre - not used as much this term, but when it's warmer the first three school years now have classes outside. The environment in that secluded area, surrounded by willows with the old mill sluice just downstream, is perfect for children to enjoy outdoor learning. Given that we live in a village surrounded by wonderful countryside, It's superb news that outdoor classes can now be a part of the school week. The Beer Festival had a big part to play in making this happen, and it's radically changed the amount of useable outdoors the school has available.

The school library was completed by the start of last academic year and has added both space and an increased focus for reading. Giving the children space and opportunity to read and select from a large choice of books is clearly a great way to stimulate the ability to learn. Watching children scanning the shelves and plucking their next book in a relaxed way is a pleasure. It's a lovely space and is quite unique for a smaller village school.

The latest infrastructure project - that makes it sound like Crossrail, but to the school it's considerably more important - is the sound system in the school hall. Robert Leacroft - Brigstock's Mr Son et Lumiere - has taken this completely in hand and we are now in the superb situation of being able to hear the tiniest mites deliver their lines in assemblies, readings and school plays. It's wonderful.

So that's what we've been up to on top of the steady supply of bus journeys, theatre trips and ice cream which keeps life that little bit more invigorating.

GLADMAN DEVELOPMENT, OFF BENEFIELD ROAD

A developer, Gladman, submitted a planning application for 110 houses on fields between Benefield Road, Woodyard Close and Old Dry Lane. This application was rejected by East Northants Council in March, but Gladman have now submitted an appeal to the Planning Inspectorate against this decision.

There will be a Public Enquiry set for the 18th July where the application and evidence will be considered. The Planning Inspector will make his recommendation to the Secretary of State for a final decision.

The Enquiry is open to all to listen to and some residents will be able to make representation as well. Keep an eye on the Planning website and there will be an update in the next newsletter.

THE JOYS OF CLOG DANCING

Clog dancing is traditionally from the north west of Britain, most notably associated with the 19th century Lancashire cotton mills. Initially it tended to be men who would dance and, later, as its popularity grew to its peak between 1880 and 1904, they would compete professionally in music halls. However, women also participated and later their dancing, too, became popular in music halls. They would also dress up colourfully and dance in local villages, carrying sticks to represent the bobbins in the cotton mills.

But what has all this to do with Brigstock you might ask? Well, Cobbled Together is a small friendly group of clog dancers who rehearse during the winter months on a Tuesday evening in Cranford village hall, to learn new dances and develop the ones they know. Then, from around April to August, they dance outdoors at venues such as local pubs, village fetes, East Carlton Park, at the Cross in Geddington and, annually, on the front in Hunstanton. Sometimes they also join up with other groups such as the Braybrooke Morris Dances for these events.

HISTORICAL SOCIETY—LOCAL HISTORY

The great Isaac Newton probably visited Brigstock. What could have brought him to our village?

Isaac Newton was born at Woolsthorpe in Lincolnshire on Christmas day 1642. His father had died a few months earlier and his mother brought him up with his grandparents until she married the Rev Barnabus Smith in 1646. Unfortunately the Rev didn't want Isaac so he was left with his grandparents until he was 10 when his stepfather died and his mother returned to Woolsthorpe with Benjamin, Mary and Hannah his three half -siblings.

Hannah Smith grew up and married Robert Barton, gentleman of Brigstock. She was his second wife and Robert already had seven children. The family probably lived in the rectory. Hannah bore him a further 3 children – Robert, Catherine and Margaret. In 1693 she called upon Newton for help when she was "overwhelmed with sorrow" after Robert died. It is very likely that Isaac visited her in Brigstock upset by her grief. Hannah was apparently Isaac's favourite half-sibling. He always took an interest in family matters and was reputed to have been very generous.

Catherine Barton, Hannah's daughter, later became Newton's housekeeper after he moved to London. She was reportedly a great beauty as well as a woman of charm and wit who became friends with Jonathan Swift and Charles Montagu, Lord Halifax.

She eventually married John Conduitt, Newton's successor as Master of the Mint.

So next time you walk past the church you may be following in the footsteps of one of our greatest scholars and scientists.

Many thanks to everyone who helped with the Christmas celebrations. We had a good crowd for the turning on of the Christmas tree lights and carols. Having Father Christmas arrive in the pony and trap made it a very special occasion once again - thank you Tom and Carl. Well done Jane Jones and everyone who organized the Advent Calendar windows. There were so many positive comments from people walking round the village and looking at the different displays.

A comprehensive survey of the street lighting in the village with the aim of converting all lights to LEDs is now underway. We have to get at least two quotes before we can go ahead. Once again your comments are welcome about the style of lighting you would like to see, particularly in the Conservation Area.

Results are now in from the Housing Survey conducted before Christmas showing what additional housing supply the village needs, and these are as follows:

- 1 x 3 bed house for open market/private sale
- 2 x 2 bed bungalows for open market/ private sale
- 5 x 2 bed houses for shared ownership
- 1 x 2 bed bungalow for rent 1 X 2 bed house for rent.

PARISH COUNCIL

These results will feed into our neighbourhood plan and we will be having discussions with the Northamptonshire Rural Housing Associations representative.

Many residents are concerned about parking in the village particularly along Lyveden Road near the Country Park and Grafton Road. The Parish Council is liaising with the local police and they will be actively looking at the possibility of prosecuting those people who are parking irresponsibly and blocking the pavement. The police have suggested a public meeting to discuss the issues so keep an eye out for dates on the website or the village noticeboard. See elsewhere in the newsletter for a copy of the Police letter which has been sent out to some residents.

Similarly we have had the usual complaints about dog mess. We shall now be looking to prosecute those few repeat offenders. In the first place you will be issued with a warning but you could be fined up to £1000 for allowing your dog to foul the pavements. Please use the dogbins provided or the public litterbins and not residents' waste bins.

If you are in the countryside "stick and flick".

Please don't throw dog poo bags in the hedgerows!

Please note that the footbridge from the village hall carpark to the Meadow will be closed in March to allow the grass to recover. This is not a designated right of way.

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Road Harm Article

In the summer of 2015 the Police and Crime Commissioner, Adam Simmonds, visited 100 different villages and parishes across Northamptonshire and the number one concern raised throughout conversations with residents was road related problems.

To help tackle this issue, Adam has recently announced the launch of a brand new service for victims; **Voice: Road Harm**.

The new service offers support for victims of serious road traffic collisions, an area which the Victims Code until recently did not support. **Voice; Road Harm** will give support to both victims and their families who have suffered distressing road-related trauma, such as face-to-face therapy, and a telephone helpline offering emotional and practical support.

Talking about the new service, Adam said: "Putting victims at the heart of the criminal justice system has been one of my main aims since being voted in to office and I'm delighted that we can offer further specialist support to victims with the launch of Voice: Road Harm. With the creation of the Voice: Road Harm service we have significantly improved the support we are able to offer victims, witnesses and those affected by crime, and Voice: Road Harm is another strand to this that will see people receive a better standard of care when they need it. Too often road victims have been ignored and this service aims to address this imbalance"

The key objectives of Voice; Road Harm is to ensure that all victims and witnesses of serious road traffic collisions receive a service that is tailored to their needs and preferences; that they receive appropriate information, advice and support to enable them to cope, recover and thrive; are treated in a respectful, sensitive, professional and non-discriminatory manner; and are supported, where appropriate, through their participation in criminal proceedings.

WOODLAND SCENES

Spring has Sprung!! In some instances, it has come far too early and has really confused the plants and animals. Daffodils were very confused— some flowered before Christmas, with others flowering at their normal time in February. Some Snowdrops also started early, with the main crop coming in February. So far the Bluebells are sticking to their proper timetable. Time will tell what the impact on other plants and animals will be.

After the very wet winter, February has been quite dry with only 21mm of rain. January had 80mm. We were lucky to miss the big storms that Scotland and the Lake District got. To get 450mm of rain in 2 days would be horrendous, and we would also see floods where we just don't expect it.

Lately, the Fallow Deer seem to be forming larger herds, with groups of 30—40 gathering on the fields, or sheltering against the hedges. They will soon be dropping their young and keeping well hidden.

Keep a look out for the Red Kite nests as they are starting to rebuild them ready for egg laying in the next few weeks.

Do keep feeding your garden birds— this is a very hungry period for them without insects or seeds. We have a great range around the village and they need helping most of the year.

Winter Months at Fermyn Woods Country Park

During the winter we have been undertaking making glades in the thicket. The aim is to encourage regeneration of Black Thorn to improve the habitat of the Black Hairstreak butterfly.

The Black Hairstreak, Satyrium pruni, is one of the UK's most elusive butterflies found exclusively in blackthorn Prunus spinosa thickets in a small part of the East Midlands

(Asher et al., 2001). The adults reside in the canopy of trees and dense scrub, feeding on honeydew secreted by aphids and rarely descending. They are at their peak of activity between 12.00 and 14.00 on warm sunny days during their short flight period from mid-June to mid-July (Asher et al., 2001). The work has been undertaken by the rangers in

Below is a copy of the letter sent to some Brigstock residents concerning parking. This may affect other areas, so we are circulating this wider.

POLICE WARNING

PARKING ISSUES - BRIGSTOCK

It has been brought to my attention over the past couple of months that residents are parking in a way that causes obstruction to other road users and pedestrians.

May I remind you that pavements are for the use of pedestrians, wheelchairs, mobility scooters and pushchairs, and pavement users having to step out into the traffic to go around a parked vehicle is not acceptable.

Where a vehicle is blocking the pavement preventing the pavement from being used is classed as an obstruction which is a ticketable offence.

Some other points to remember

Do not park within 10 meters of a junction – This is one cars length

Do not obstruct a dropped kerb or someone's driveway

Do not park within the confines of a pedestrian crossing

Do not park on double yellow lines

Do not cause unnecessary obstruction

Please remember when parking that an emergency vehicle may need to pass through.

The above still applies at school drop off and pick up times.

More yellow lines have been suggested but I feel this will just move the issue around the village. I suggest that people contact the local council and highways to come up with a solution as to where people CAN park, as I understand it is difficult from some of you. Brigstock is a growing village so this issue will only get worse! I would like to help find a solution before I have to start issuing tickets.

Also call 101 for any vehicle obstructions as I may not be in and they can deploy another officer to deal with it.
