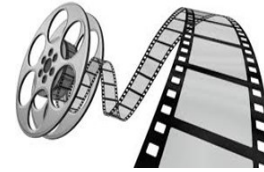

Each case is considered on its own merits which means taking into account the particular circumstances of the individual. **All cases are dealt with in the strictest confidence.** After the needs of those in financial distress have been considered, the trustees have the opportunity to give grants to village organisations which benefit village residents. Who's Who in Brigstock: Carl Hector

Carl Hector has lived in Brigstock all of his life and probably knows more about the history of the village than anyone else. He was born in 1938 in a 3-storey cottage called Fern Hollow at the entrance to Church Walk situated where Harper's Court now stands. He lived there with his parents and grandparents and they had a long-term lodger, Tom Ellis, who was one of the main farmers in Brigstock. Although he had more than one farm including Nicholl's Farm with a farmhouse on Park Walk opposite the WI hall, as a single man Tom seemed to prefer the home comforts of Fern Hollow. Tom had a big influence on Carl while he was growing up for he used to spend many happy hours on the farm. In fact he thinks that he spent as much time on the farm as he did at Brigstock School. At 11 years old he went on to Corby County Modern School for Boys. He hated school except for metalwork and regularly got the cane as did most of the other boys. One teacher had two canes, one black and the other a light colour. He asked Carl one day which do you prefer, chocolate or pineapple. When Carl replied neither, he ended up with both, one on each hand.

Carl remembers that during the war years two landmines were dropped from aircraft just outside Brigstock. The family hid under the stairs as they thought the bombs were going to fall on the village. He also recalls that Czech soldiers were stationed at the Mill. They had half-track tanks and other armoured vehicles and used to drive these through the village. You can still see the marks on the high pavement where these vehicles caught the side of the road. He also remembers the American Air Force bombers getting into formation over Grafton before heading off on daylight raids on Germany and dropping flares when they returned to indicate the damage sustained by the plane and the crew.

A dramatic incident happened when Carl was 7 years old. While playing up at Ellis's Farm with his friends, three girls, he decided to light a fire. Unfortunately it was too near the stackyard and the hay went up in flames, burning buildings, machinery and some unfortunate chickens and ducks. Carl was petrified, especially when he was interviewed by the village policeman but luckily Tom Ellis realised it was purely accidental.

Ten years later he witnessed another tragic incident involving fire when he saw from his bedroom window a single seater jet flying over the village in flames. He followed the fire engine on his bike up Old Dry Lane to find

that it had crashed just outside the village in Harry's Park Wood, just off Weldon Road, killing the pilot.

On leaving school Carl worked for Tom Ellis for seven years doing a variety of jobs on the farm and it was there that he learned to drive a tractor. Later he worked for a short time in the Steelworks but did not like being inside all day. He then took a job as a lorry driver delivering slag from the steelworks which was used as a fertiliser on farms all over the country. Later he was a lorry driver for Tarmac and British Oxygen. He was then given a month's trial by Trevor Smith at Woodlands Garage and ended up staying 36 years until his retirement. Carl met his wife Lyn at Corby ten pin bowling alley where he was a keen player and also a part-time doorman and they were married in 1965. They have three children, Edward, Elaine and Carol.

Carl also loved his cricket and started playing for Brigstock aged 14 and continued well into his 40's. He helped to put up the cricket pavilion which was used before the present pavilion was built. It was purchased for £10 from the brickworks at Elstow, dismantled, brought to Brigstock and re-erected by the club members themselves.

Carl has had a long time interest in the history of the village and was one of the founder members of the Brigstock Historical Society in 1978 along with Beryl Simon and Heather Bailey. He has been involved with the Society ever since, collecting old photographs and stories of the village, giving slide shows and taking groups on guided walks around the village. He gets regular visits from Brigstock school students when they have school history projects.

Carl has also made a valuable contribution to St. Andrew's Church. He has been a bell ringer for 22 years, initially being taught by Brian Cope, and he is now the Tower Captain. Carl says that at present there are not enough bell ringers and more volunteers would be appreciated. Carl took on the duties of church-warden ten years ago and part of this work is to ensure that the fabric of the Church and everything in it are well maintained. He used to go up into the tower every two days to wind up the clock but now that is automated and he only has to alter the hour and occasionally adjust the time.

Carl was also a member of the hand bell ringers who played at events in the village but unfortunately due to members leaving, they do not have a team at present but they hope to re-start in the future.

Apart from all these many activities Carl has raised hundreds of pounds for the Church on his annual sponsored cycle rides for the Historic Churches Trust.

PARKING

Parking is an on-going problem in the village and we have been working with the police to encourage people to park more considerately. LIGHTING

We have listened to your comments regarding removal of lights in the village and will take them into account when undertaking the street lighting up-grade. Because the new LED lighting should be more efficient we hope that this will compensate for the few lights we are taking out of action. However, lights can be reinstated if there is enough support.

PARISH COUNCIL

GRASS CUTTING

One of the recurring complaints the Parish Council gets is about the standard of grass cutting in the village. At present this is undertaken by the County Council, and we get three cuts a year. We don't think this is enough so we have decided to ask East Northants Council through their contractors to cut the grass six times a year. Of course, this will mean extra expense but we hope that you will really notice the difference. We will have to increase the precept slightly to cover the cost but the village should look a lot tidier. Thank you to all of you who keep the verges outside your houses neat and tidy. It really is appreciated.

WORK IN THE CONSERVATION AREA

If you are undertaking any work in the conservation area please be aware of what you can and cannot do. Check with the planning department at ENC. For instance, if you are installing a satellite dish it should not be visible from the road. If you want to fell a tree you need to apply for permission.

DO YOU WANT TO BE A PARISH COUNCILLOR?

We have a vacancy on the Parish Council as Charlie Koris no longer lives in the village and found it difficult to get to meetings. If you are interested, please contact Nigel Searle our clerk who will tell you what you need to do. Memories of Christmas between the Wars

Extracts from an article by I.M. Tooley “A Village Childhood” written in 1987

Irene Tooley was born in 1922. She lived in the village all her life and worked at Wallis and Linnell’s clothing factory.

“One of the highlights of our year was the Christmas party given to the school children by the late Captain and Mrs Belville at Fermyn Woods Hall. Transport was provided and there was always a huge Christmas tree with a large quantity of parcels underneath. We had a lovely tea and, before going home, each child received a present and an orange.

The village band always looked smart in their uniform. On Christmas Eve, the band toured the village playing Christmas carols and it was a lovely sound, especially on a frosty evening. They also turned out on Christmas morning. On Boxing Day it was an annual event for the band to organise a whist drive and dance which was held in the school. Whilst our parents played whist, we children watched the dancing. We loved to watch the Grand March of the Lancers and to see some of the shorter ladies being lifted right off their feet as around and around the group circled.

The Congregational Choir also toured the village on Christmas Eve. At the time they had a large choir with several male members. I remember how well they used to harmonise.

The Kettering Co-operative Society paid a dividend on purchases at half yearly intervals. The members queued up in the Co-op yard and waited on the iron staircase to the upper room where payments were made. After the “divvi” had been paid, many mothers went to Kettering to buy the Christmas presents for their families. “

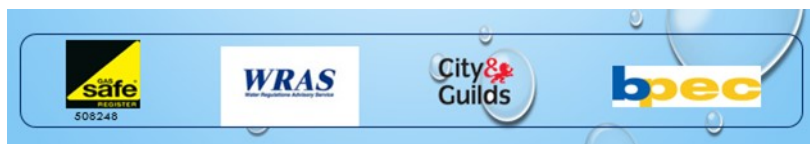

Mary's Meals

Brigstock URC Young Church spent time during September and October raising money for the charity 'Mary's Meals', an organisation whose vision is that every child receives one daily meal in their place of education. Their mission is to enable people to offer their money, goods, skills, time, or prayer, and through this involvement, provide the most effective help to those suffering the effects of extreme poverty in the world's poorest communities.

The Young Church organised a stall at the village Beer Festival and the viewing of a short film, 'Generation Hope'. This film follows the lives of young people who, as a result of receiving Mary's Meals as children, have been able to go on to achieve more than they ever would have done without.

Donations from the Harvest Festival Service held at the URC and a shared Harvest Supper with friends from St Andrew's also went towards the final total of **£335.00**. It costs just **£12.20** to feed a child for a whole year through Mary's Meals. With match funding from the government this amount raised will feed **55** children for a year. A tremendous effort from Young Church and from people's generous donations. Thank you.

The URC is continuing to support Mary's Meals through The Backpack Project. Many children receiving Mary's Meals don't have basic learning tools such as pencils and notepads. This project allows them to get the most out of their lessons through donations of backpacks full of the things they need. For many, a Mary's Meals backpack will be the only gift they'll have ever had.

So as we approach Christmas we will be putting together as many of these 'gifts' as we can.
