The Brigstock Neighbourhood Plan Committee has been assessing possible sites for future development and have discussed these with the owners or developers.

We now need to know your views and preferences on these sites to provide the 35 future properties for the next 15 years of the plan. To get your input we will be sending out a second short questionnaire to finalise the plan.

You will be receiving the questionnaire around the 19<sup>th</sup> April delivered to your house. To give you a chance to find out more about the proposed site and to help you make your decisions, we have arranged a 'drop-in' session to allow you to examine the developer's proposals at

Questionnaires need to be returned by 8<sup>th</sup> May to either the Newsagents or 7 Church St.

Having received the questionnaires, the committee will use the information to complete the Neighbourhood Plan. The process will involve approval by the Parish Council and East Northants Council, before it returns back to the residents with a final referendum at the end of the year. On completion, the Plan will have full powers within planning system.



# Fermyn Woods Country Park New Ranger

I would like to take this opportunity to introduce myself, my name is Dan and I am the new Countryside Ranger at Fermyn Woods Country Park. I have moved over from the Brampton Valley Way, which is an old railway line that runs from Chapel Brampton to Market Harborough and is now a 14 mile linear path.

At this time of year the wildlife in the park is slowly starting to think ahead to the breeding season, the song thrush is one of the first birds to start singing again and has been heard at the Park in mid-January. The Hazel tree catkins are staring to open and snowdrops are coming into flower, there are a lot of birds to see around the park, at the moment there are big flocks of Siskins, Goldfinches and a big number of Bullfinches have been spotted. Of course Fermyn is known for its Red Kites and there are a lot about, if you don't see them you will hear them calling. There has also been big numbers of Fallow Deer seen in the woods and out in the fields near Lyvden.

So come down to the park and see what you can find and if you happen to spot me come over and say hello.

If you would like to come and get some outdoor exercise, why not help at the Country Park. We have several volunteers who come along to clear undergrowth, repair structures, clear rubbish, etc. If you can spare a few hours and join in with other willing helpers, give the Rangers a ring. 01536 373625

#### **WOODLAND SCENES**

Spring is creeping up on us quite quickly after a reasonably dry winter. The ditches had little water in them until late January, but now have some flow. Frogs can be seen in the ponds as well. Snowdrops are up and seem to be giving a good display this year. Hopefully the Bluebells will do the same. There are some great woods and estates around Brigstock which you can visit to see these at their best.

The Red Kites are starting to rebuild their nests and in early March will start to sit on their eggs. Since the tip at Corby closed about 2 years ago, where the birds used to get good pickings, they do not seem to congregate in such numbers in the local woods. Where we used to see a 100 or so roosting near Fermyn Hall on winter evenings, these are down to 20 to 30. I presume that they have spread out to the surrounding countryside to find food.

Talking of food, do continue to feed the birds in the garden as they do reply on this to get through the cold period when there is little wild food available. Seed, fat balls or peanuts are the best. This has brought many Blue Tits, Great Tits and Sparrows into our garden along with the odd woodpecker. Also nesting boxes and wild areas also give them places to nest - find them a small patch in your garden.

If you get out into the fields, and there are many footpaths to do this on, you could well see some of the many Fallow Deer that live around us. At the moment they are in small herds, but will slip away into the woods to give birth around June.

We live in a wonderful part of Rockingham Forest, so do use (but not abuse) it.

## Who's Who in Brigstock: Paul Falzon

Paul Falzon is a newcomer to Brigstock, arriving here at the end of March last year to take over the tenancy of the Old Three Cocks public house. Since then he and his partner, Margarita, have worked hard to try to make the pub a success and an asset to the village.

Paul was born in 1964 in Malta and spent his first few years in Sangwan, a small village in the south east of the island. His mother managed an apartment complex, owned mainly by English people, so that as he grew up he knew as many English people as Maltese. He also had an early introduction to the bar trade as his grandfather ran a local pub, called the Jubilee bar, where Paul spent time while his mother was at work. His first job was sorting out empty bottles before they were returned to claim the deposits on them. He loved helping out and it was there he decided that he wanted to work in a bar and maybe even own one someday. The family had moved north to St Paul's Bay in 1970 and it was there he attended school but was happy to leave as soon as he could. His first job was assisting his parents on the apartment complex, cleaning pools, and looking after the gardens. He also continued to work part-time in his grand-dad's bar.

His introduction to catering came after he borrowed a car from one of his relations and smashed it up in an accident. As a punishment and to help pay for the damage he had to work in a kitchen on the site peeling potatoes but he also learned how to make burgers and risotto and found that he really enjoyed cooking. From the age of 17 he was employed as a part-time caterer but had a full time job as a builder to earn more money. At 28 Paul took on his first pub, The Limestone Bar in St Pauls's Bay, which he ran while still continuing in the building trade. Later he took on a bigger pub/restaurant, called Ziggies, which became his full time job The pub served tourists, mainly British as well as locals and Paul was kept so busy serving food and drinks that at one stage he went 3 days without going to bed. It later became a popular underground nightclub with a bar above and Paul managed it for 16 years.

In his free time Paul became a power boat enthusiast and bought his own power boat racer, named Wicked, 33ft long with two 500 hp outboard motors. He drove this as part of the Chaudron team in the 2004 Grand Prix and was very successful, finishing second.

#### Who's Who in Brigstock: Paul Falzon, cont'd

Paul loved England and paid visits there several times a year to see friends and to go to boat shows. After his mother passed away he decided in 2011 to move here permanently. He started off as chef at the Dolphin in Bletchley, then moved to Woburn and from there to the Heath Inn. Leighton Buzzard where he stayed for three and a half years, becoming full time chef and then manager. While there he met Margarita, his partner, who was also an employee there at that time.

In 2015 he left that position to look for a village pub and eventually, after many disappointments, when he was about to give up, he found the Three Cocks in Brigstock and could see that although it was run down it had a lot of potential. After cleaning and maintenance the pub opened on 1<sup>st</sup> April 2015 and has been open every day since then. The business has been gradually building up and both the bar and the restaurant are popular with the locals. Special dining evenings, including a Maltese Night, have been successful as have the live music events. More improvements are planned with new menus due and the conversion of the games room to a private function room, where people can enjoy a meal and celebrate birthdays or other occasions with friends and family.

Paul appreciates the support he has received from village organisations such as the Knit and Natter group, the Men's Club and the Lunch Club and he also wishes to thank his staff, Debbie, James, Katy, Chris, Jane and Kitty for their help and dedication, with special thanks to Margarita.

Paul and Margarita intend to stay on at the Three Cocks to build up the business and to work for the people of the village. To celebrate their first anniversary here and to say thanks to the people of Brigstock they are organising a special free buffet lunch for the 31<sup>st</sup> March with samples of food from their latest menu.


