

BRIGSTOCK HISTORICAL SOCIETY—Cont'd THE HISTORY OF VILLAGE SIGNS

You may think that village signs date back hundreds of years but, in fact, they first sprang up in Norfolk in the early years of the 20th century, when the then Prince of Wales (later to become King Edward VII) commissioned the Princess Alexandra School of Carving to make four signs for villages on the Sandringham Estate as a means of fostering community spirit and identity and to aid motorists. King George V also championed the trend, erecting a further three on the estate.

The spread of interest beyond Norfolk can be attributed to Prince Albert, Duke of York (later George VI) who gave a speech to the Royal Academy in 1920 promoting the wider use of village signs. This prompted the Daily Mail to run a nationwide village sign competition. The prize fund exceeded £2,000 and ten awards were made. The winning designs were exhibited at Australia House, London in October 1920. The village sign at Biddenden, Kent, featuring the two Biddenden Maids, was one of the successful Daily Mail competition entries as well as the sign at Bromley, Kent. There are now more than 3000 signs in Britain. There is even a Village Sign Society whose aims are to promote the enjoyment and appreciation of village signs in Great Britain and record for posterity all known signs.

Our own sign was carved by Glyn Mould who is now based at Sacrewell Mill where he runs woodcarving courses. He has even carved a village sign for Ambridge to celebrate the 50th anniversary of the radio programme.

BRIGSTOCK HISTORICAL SOCIETY—Cont'd



Our market cross may well date back to the Medieval period although the shaft you see today was erected by a local landowner in 1586 apparently after Queen Elizabeth I passed through. The steps were rebuilt in the early 20th C. The cobbles are thought to form part of the original market surface. Brigstock was an important farming village and records indicate that the success of the market came from the decline of the one in neighbouring Geddington. However, Brigstock Market declined in the 17th century due to competition from Kettering, Oundle, and Thrapston. It no longer existed by the 18th century. Crosses in market places were thought to help validate transactions and were used as important gathering points. We are lucky to have retained ours in what is thought to be the original location as fewer than 2000 now survive.



Friday 19 January 2017 – Whisky Galore (cert PG)



The Angel Inn

30, High Street, Brigstock, Northamptonshire NN14 3HA Innkeeper 1881: Mark Fisher 1834-1890 [the author's 2nd cousin removed x4].

Mark Fisher junior was born in 1834 to his farm labourer father Mark senior and his wife Jane née Line. He was the fifth of nine children, the two youngest - Elizabeth and Jane - being twins. The family lived in Hanthorpe, a small hamlet, which today, with the neighbouring village of Morton, forms the civil parish of Morton and Hanthorpe, just two miles north of Bourne, in south Lincolnshire. In 1857, Mark married Mary Booth, a girl from Hacconby, a village a couple of miles further to the north-east, and it appears from the following two censuses that they continued to live there. Hacconby - sometimes Haconby or Hackenby - is a small village. According to Whites Directory of 1856, the year before the Fishers married and made their home there, the population was only 454, but there were two pubs, the Red Lion and the Royal Oak.

Like his father, Mark was a farm labourer, but by 1877 when aged 43, he had left the village and, according to Kelly's directory of that year, had established himself as landlord at 'The Angel', a substantial premises in High Street, Brigstock, a large village in Northamptonshire. It is a matter of curiosity that this couple embraced a life-changing experience by moving from farm labouring to victualling [whether self-employed or as a brewery tenant is not known], whilst also displacing themselves some 35 miles distant. And unlike his second cousins in Tongue End, a village about 8 miles away, Mark had taken on a moderately sized inn and not a small rural beerhouse. Sadly, Mark and Mary ran the Angel for only a relatively short time as they both died before the census in 1891. Mary passed away first in 1889 aged around 55 [her year of birth has not been satisfactorily established]. Almost exactly a year later, on 15 January, 1890, the publican's curse struck. Mark was four years younger than his second cousin William, the other Fisher pub landlord who suffered an early death; Mark was about the same age as his late wife Mary, and succumbed to cancer. It appears the couple had no children. By 1891, the landlady was a widow, Sarah Hayes.

The period street photograph is circa. late 1800's/early 1900's and shows 'The Angel' - only just! - with Hanging sign and a lady [Sarah Hayes?] standing outside.

The Angel Inn - cont'd

The gabled house on the opposite side of the street still exists as well. The large doors in the building are suggestive of a former entrance to an inner courtyard, where coaches would have arrived, and the horses attended to and changed: a hint of the long-gone era of the coaching inn.

Whist the actual date the pub closed is not known, the last time it appeared in Kelly's Directory was 1906, so this may or may not be a clue as to when. The building is now a private dwelling, and there has also been a butcher's shop here since pub closure.

Fermyn Woods Country Park

All the summer migrants have now left Fermyn Woods for warmer weather and are being replaced with the winter migrants. Flocks of Redwings and Fieldfares have been seen round the park, a lot of the birds have now flocked together for safety and to find food which is easier to do with more eyes on the lookout. Jays and Squirrels have been going around burying nuts, there has also been signs of Fallow Deer in the park and males have been heard calling in Royal Coppice in the woods.

Now that the trees are dormant our winter programme begins where we remove areas of Hawthorn, Blackthorn and Alder from different sections of the park to allow grasses and wildflowers to grow and create areas for butterflies in the spring/summer. We are clearing sections in Great Thicket for the rare Black Hairstreak Butterfly, clearing banks near the landslip and behind the fishing pond for other butterflies such as the Dingy and Grizzled Skippers. We then either burn the cut down trees or where possible create habitat rows for wildlife to use as shelter or to avoid being detected by predators. We have also removed Hawthorn and Alder that was starting to encroach on the Plateau, if left to their own devises they would recolonise the Plateau and turn it from a grassland to a woodland!

Village Hall Plan

Robert Leacroft, chairman of Brigstock Village Hall Committee was able to report some progress towards a new village hall at the annual meeting. The next step will be to apply for outline planning permission, followed by negotiations for the sale of a piece of land and an application for a grant aid to East Northamptonshire District Council. Discussions had taken place in London with the Charity Commission.

Elected to the Village Hall Committee were Mr H. Winrow, Mr P. Cox, Mrs M. Cox, Mr J. Panter and Mr R. Cholerton. Also on the committee are the five trustees, Mr R. Leacroft, the Rev R. Howe, Mr B. Tiney , Mrs M. Druce and Mrs D. Windsor, together with representatives from village organisations, Mrs K. Leacroft (PTA), Mrs L. Murray (Womens' Institute), Mr B. Mayes (Football Club), Mr P. Burdett (St Andrew's Youth Club), Mr P Dodwell (Parish Council) and Mrs J Osborne (Mother and Toddler Club)

A brief meeting of the new committee was held at which Mr R. Leacroft was elected chairman, Mrs J. Osborne, secretary, Mrs K. Leacroft, treasurer and Mr P. Cox, NRCC representative. Mrs S. Panter was also co-opted on to the committee.

A Moment Frozen in Time

A time capsule was buried underneath Brigstock's new village hall yester-day — and may not be seen again for decades. The capsule contains items depicting life in 1993, including an electoral register, maps, school work, till receipts and clothes. Village hall chairman, Robert Leacroft looked on as an eight-inch thick concrete seal was poured over the capsule. He said "The boxes are buried just underneath the floor in the foyer. The top class of Brigstock School came to watch the ceremony. Every time they walk into the hall they will know they are walking over work they have done. The capsule may not be seen again until our new village hall is eventually demolished."

Designed by architect, Terence Hodgkins, of Aldwincle, the new two-storey hall faces out on to the meadow and brook and has a patio. Built with bricks and slate to match the neighbouring doctor's surgery, it blends in with the

surroundings. It features a large hall, with a sprung beech dance floor and an annexe, which can be used for a buffet and bar or which can be closed off and used as a separate function room. On the first floor there are two meeting rooms and also a large kitchen and storeroom.

Regular bookings ensure the hall will be put to good use. There will be sessions by a dancing school, playgroup, aerobics group and youth club. The hall is also a superb venue for dances, wedding receptions and private parties as well as fund-raising events.

Villagers joy as new hall opens

A splendid new village hall has opened its doors for years of events at Brigstock. The £174,000 hall, built by Peacock and Horgan of Ringstead, has been welcomed by villagers as a vast improvement on the 43 year old hall it replaces, which was demolished last October.

On its opening weekend, a giant car boot sale was held in the meadow, with refreshments being served in the spacious new hall. A champagne supper dance was held in celebration, with the Johnny Harris Big Band, and was attended by villagers who helped to raise funds for the project.

When these endowments became "consolidated" and updated, it was clearly laid down in law who could benefit. After certain expenses, one quarter on the income goes to St Andrew's Church. The rest of the income is for the relief of need, hardship or distress, either generally or individually, of the people resident in Brigstock. Each case is considered on its own merits which means taking into account the particular circumstances of the individual. All cases are dealt with in the strictest confidence.

After the needs of those in financial distress have been considered, the trustees have the opportunity to give grants to village organisations which benefit village residents. If you wish to make an application for yourself or on behalf of someone else, please contact the secretary Mrs Sally Wilks or one of the trustees whose names can be found on the noticeboard in the church porch.

Brigstock WI Recipe Page

A truly scrummy Gin and Tonic cake for a Christmas centrepiece.

For the cake (you will need to buy 4 limes)

250g salted butter 200g golden caster sugar 4 eggs 250g self-raising flour

75g natural yogurt Juice of 1 lime (keep lime skin for zest).

50 ml gin

For the Syrup:

125g golden caster sugar 150ml tonic water

1 tsp juniper berries, lightly crushed Juice of 1 lime (keep lime skin for zest)

For the buttercream icing

200g softened butter 400g icing sugar

2 tablespoons of milk

Zest **only** of 3 limes (using up those you've already juiced above)

To decorate

Lime zest 1 tablespoon of granulated sugar

Lemon sherbets The zested lime cut into thin wedges to decorate

1/4 cucumber, peeled into ribbons

For the Cake:

- 1 Heat the oven to 180C/160C fan/gas mark 4.
- 2 Grease and line 2 x 20cm cake tins.
- 3 In a freestanding electric mixer, or using an electric whisk, beat together butter, sugar until pale and fluffy, for around 5 mins.
- 4 Add the eggs one by one, making sure they are fully incorporated, before adding the next one.
- 5 If the mixture looks like it might split, add a tablespoon of your flour.
- 6 Fold in the rest of the flour
- 7 Mix the natural yogurt with the juice of one of the limes and 50ml of gin, then add this to the cake mixture to make a thick and silky mixture.
- 8 Split the mixture between the cake tines and bake for 35 mins until a skewer comes out clean.

Meanwhile, make the syrup.

To make the syrup

- 1 Put 125 golden caster sugar, tonic water, juniper berries and juice of one lime into a saucepan over medium heat.
- 2 Once the sugar has dissolved, bring to the boil and cook for 5-7 mins, until it's a thick syrup.
- 3 Cool for 5 mins, strain then pour in the remaining gin and set aside.
- 4 Once the cake is out of the oven, allow to cool for 5 mins, then prick all over with a skewer, then liberally spoon the syrup mix over both of the cakes. Allow to cool completely in the tin.

To make the buttercream:

- 1 Beat the butter until soft
- 2 Add the icing sugar, a little at a time to avoid a sugar cloud!
- 3 Once fully incorporated, add the milk and the zest of the limes.

To assemble:

- 1 Place one of the cake layers on a cake board and cover with **1/3** of the buttercream
- 2 Sit the second cake layer on top of the first. Cover this with just a **thin** coat of icing
- 3 Put the cake in the fridge for 30 mins to firm up this will make it easier to get the rest of the icing on smoothly.
- 4 Use the remaining buttercream to cover the top and sides of the cake.

To decorate

Mix the lime zest with the sugar and sprinkle this over the cake and finish with lemon sherbets, lime slices, cucumber ribbons, party straws and any other gin & tonic paraphernalia you fancy.
