Did you know that Northamptonshire Police has a free message alert system, to help people living and working in Northamptonshire be much better informed about crime and police activity in their local area, and help us to keep their communities safe?

The messaging service, is called Northamptonshire Neighbourhood Alert (formerly known as Community Connect), and it enables frontline police officers and PCSOs to send alert messages direct from their mobile devices to thousands of local people. They can do this in real-time while they are out and about policing the county.

After signing up to the messaging system, you will receive regular alerts from Northamptonshire Police, Neighbourhood Watch and other partner organisations, keeping you up to date and informed about crime and issues relevant to you and the area where you live or work.

If for example, there has been a spate of distraction burglaries in a particular district or an increase in vehicle crime, we can tell people immediately via the alert system. So they can better protect themselves and be more aware of any potential threats and risks. We can also very quickly share descriptions of suspects or appeal for witnesses – giving us a greater chance of arrest.

We want to encourage you to promote the alert system to friends, family and the public to get more people registered. The more people we have registered the wider and more effective our alerts will be.

Signing up to the messaging service is really simple and quick. The alert system is completely secure and registration is free.

BRIGSTOCK WINDMILL

The photograph on the front of this edition is of the windmill that used to be a familiar landmark along Stanion Road. It was demolished in about 1900 and had been falling into disrepair for a number of years. Windmill cottages still exist although significantly altered.

There were six small cottages in Windmill row. These were occupied by Levi Bell, a wood merchant and journeyman, Leah his wife and their sons Frank, Ernie and Archie (No 1), Jim Wills an iron-ore worker, his wife Kate and son Foscuet (No 2), Mrs Morley and son Robert (No 3), Jack, George and Fred Clark, farm workers, and sister Lizzie (No 4), Arthur Sharp, an iron-ore worker, wife Ada and daughter Pansy (No 5), and Herbert Bland, bricklayer and builder's labourer, his wife and their son Mark (No 6). The cottages had no running water or electricity. Water was drawn from a well at the bottom of the garden and there was an earth closet which all the residents shared. Cooking was by solid fuel in the kitchen range, with an oven on one side of the fire and hot water on the other. For some of the residents this was inadequate for the Sunday roast which was transported the half a mile to Mr Freeman's bakehouse opposite the New Inn where the men probably waited happily until the joint was done and they had to carry it carefully back home! In the 1920s the average rent for one of the cottages was two shillings a week.

Robert Worley, who lived in one of the cottages in the 1920s, has written a delightful book about growing up in Brigstock called "Bells, Books and Candles". This is available to borrow from the Historical Society library along with many other books of local interest. Please email me if you would like a list (sallywilks@mac.com).

TALES OF BRIGSTOCK CEMETERY

We tend to think that the cemetery has always been as we see it today with the graves set out in a large grassy area which is mown regularly to keep it neat and tidy. But this was not always the case as this extract from a local newspaper of 15th February 1894 shows. And it is certainly true that even today any changes to the cemetery area can arouse strong emotions. It also shows that in 1894 Brigstock women were quite capable of forcefully taking matters into their own hands. The suffragettes would have been proud of them.

An extraordinary scene is alleged to have occurred in the usually quiet village of Brigstock on Tuesday. It appears that those responsible for the management of the cemetery recently decided to level the ground in order that it might be laid to grass and mown and to do this the grave mounds had to be removed. This decision caused a lot of dissatisfaction in the village especially among those who have friends buried in the graveyard. On Tuesday, when the caretaker proceeded to carry out his orders the following scene is reported to have occurred.

Within a short time a number of women entered the cemetery and soundly berated him. Soon their numbers increased until 40 or 50 women were present and finding their protestations in vain to stop the desecration they resorted to force. Bundling the caretaker into a barrow they wheeled him triumphantly into the streets where they took such further steps as they deemed necessary to prevent his return to the cemetery. For some time the village was in a state of considerable excitement.

Unfortunately there are no details of the "further steps" used to deter the caretaker and you have to feel a bit sorry for him as he was only trying to do his job. And as we can see from the way the cemetery is today the authorities got their way in the end. The Parish Council is responsible for the cemetery these days and I'm sure that any changes that have to be made to improve its upkeep will hopefully not cause any outcry in the village.

We have a vacancy on the Parish Council due to the resignation of Mrs Jill Schofield. Thank you to her for her support and commitment during her time as a councillor. Our Neighbourhood Plan is now completed and I would like to thank all the members of the Neighbourhood Plan committee, under the chairmanship of Chris Allen, for their tremendous hard work and dedication over the last two years. It has taken a great deal of time and thought to produce the plan which will determine how the village develops over the next few years. More details about what happens next can be found elsewhere.

PARISH COUNCIL

I think we have all been made aware of the difficulties that the County Council are having at the moment. This has a knock on effect on Brigstock in that county council services have been pared back to the bone. We can no longer rely on regular road sweeping, weed control, footpath maintenance etc. There are many of you who undertake some of these services yourselves. It is a great help when residents take care of the footpaths in front of their properties and keep them weed and litter free. Our annual litter pick is taking place soon so watch out for posters. This year we are concentrating on tidying up the telegraph poles which must have about 30 years worth of rusty staples and drawing pins in them! If you are putting up notices please use the village noticeboard and, if you do use the telegraph poles, take down the posters once the event has passed and remove the staples. If you are willing to "adopt a telegraph pole" and keep it tidy please let Nigel Searle know.

Once again I have to mention dog poo. Church Walk is a particular problem so whoever is letting their dog foul the grass please would you stop and think about the mess you are leaving. We will seek prosecution if you are caught. Dog poo can be bagged, binned and deposited in any of the village litter bins, not just the dog bins. Please make the effort.

MULTI USE GAMES AREAS (MUGAs)

Multi-Use Games Areas provide fantastic places for children and adults to enjoy up to 8 different sports, develop their skills, meet other children and share their sporting experiences in a formal or informal way. BRIGSTOCK WI 100TH ANNIVERSARY



Brigstock WI is very proud to be the oldest WI in Northamptonshire, which has been running since March 1918 without any breaks.

The first meeting was held on March 5th 1918 and presided over by Mrs Lloyd (of Stewart and Lloyd) who went on to join the County Executive when it was formed later in the year.

Since then, there has been 23 different presidents, of which 12 are still in touch with the WI in some way and invited to our big 100th celebration tea in April. The Present 50 members are celebrating on the actual anniversary with a special dinner at Harrowden Hall.

Some of the highlights over the years have been as follows.

Buying the present WI Hall in Park Walk from The Salvation Army in 1920s. Mrs Isabella Steward was a very active member from the beginning and served both village and county as demonstrator and judge. She even wrote a cookery book "How I make my jam" after winning a Large Silver Medal at Olympia in 1931. When she died there were mourners and floral tributes from several WIs around the area.

In 1937 WI raised 15/6p to plant a cooper beech tree to commemorate King George VI coronation and during the 1970s and 1980s trees were planted in the cemetery and county parks.

During the war we held a canning factory in Mrs R Gray's house, when sugar was rationed, to can fruit to sell.

The longest president and secretary partnership was with Mrs E Gray and Mrs Hector from 1947 to 1966. In 1965 Mrs Hector was chosen by the WI to represent Brigstock at the Golden Jubilee of National WI at a Buckingham Palace garden Party and Mrs P Parrish represented us at the 100th anniversary garden party in 2015.

In 1990s the roof had to be repaired and members raised the money themselves. In 2016 with help from various grants we finally had a toilet installed much to the relief of members!

We used to have a choir which wore green and black rosettes and did well at county level. These days we are still very active and do knitting, kurling, skittles, drama, have won the County quiz several times.

BRIGSTOCK WI 100TH ANNIVERSARY

We hold our own quiz, safari supper, table top sales, murder mystery nights to raise funds. For socialising we have evening meetings, a BBQ and summer walks round different villages with a quiz.

In the village we support other groups by having litter picking teas, war memorial tidy rota and the duck race at the beer festival when ladies catch the ducks out of the brook- this year we even dressed up!!

We are ready for the challenge of the next 100 years. Bring it on, I say!!!! Liz Searle – President

Knit 2 stitches together across the row (10 sts)

Thread through wool and pull up tight. Sew up seam and add black button for the centre.

Brigstock WI Recipe Page

Brigstock WI celebrates its 100th birthday on 5th March 2018; therefore we thought it would be fitting to choose a recipe from the 1937 Northamptonshire Federation recipe book. Thumbing through the old and very well used book, I spotted an advertisement :

"SERVICE FOR LADIES"

For all your fully finished laundry work (4d per lb), dry cleaning (24 hr service), dyeing and invisible mending".

Made me chuckle how times have changed.

CELERY SOUP:

1 head of celery, 1 piece of butter (the size of an egg), 2 pints of water, salt and pepper, 1 egg yolk, 1 gill of milk or cream.

Method:

Put chopped celery into a pan with melted butter and stir until celery is well coated with butter. Pour on the water, add salt and pepper and boil (without a lid on) until celery is quite soft. Skim well from time to time. When celery is soft, rub all pan contents through a sieve. Return soup to pan and stir until boiling. Mix the egg and cream together and pour boiling soup on to this. This soup is specially food for rheumatism.

TOMATO SOUP:

1 large tin of tomatoes (or an equal quantity of fresh ones), 2 large onions, 1 carrot, salt and pepper.

Method:

Boil all together in 2 quarts (2 pints) of water or stock until tender. Rub through a sieve and return to the pan. Add 1oz of butter. Thicken with a tablespoon full of flour mixed in a breakfast cup of new milk. Allow to boil about 2 minutes and serve.

Both the above recipes were submitted to the book by Brigstock WI members.

The visit to Beckworth's ice rink in December to play the real game went a lot better for some people than for others! One of the lanes had been used more consistently, and was smoother than the other, so was easier to play on - or at least that was the excuse of those of us on the second lane who had trouble getting the stones to move very far at all to begin with. But we all managed to get them to the target by the end of the game. It just looks so easy in the Winter Olympics!

Fermyn Woods Country Park

Well I don't know where 2017 went, I have now been at Fermyn Woods Country Park for a year and I have enjoyed every minute of it. It certainly has been an interesting winter with a couple of heavy snow showers and a lot of snow and ice removal from car parks, it defiantly keeps you fit.

The carols in the park and advent window on 16th December was well attended and was a nice cold and frosty evening, we would like to thank the Fermyn Woods friends group with helping to organise the event and Revd Heather Lowe for leading the carol service round the park.

With help from our volunteers we have been working through our winter habitat work and have cleared a lot round the park, whilst the pond has been empty in the refuge we have been selectively removing willow regrowth towards the back of the refuge to allow light to get to the ground and encourage any dormant plants to grow in the spring. We are removing a section each year so there is a rotation of cleared areas, none cleared areas and areas growing back which is good for wildlife.

Butterfly Conservation Beds and Northants have undertaken the clearing of scrub on two large banks beyond Reedy Pond. These are particularly important habitats for Dingy Skipper and Grizzled Skipper butterfly, as they prefer low growing vegetation. We are also creating a butterfly and insect corridor in the Great Thicket, by removing hawthorns in certain areas, this allow easier movement from one area to another, and increase the butterflies chances of finding a nectar source, as well as allowing Blackthorn to regrow, an important part of the Black Hairstreak Butterfly's life cycle.

We have also started clearing the left hand side of the purple route as the bramble and self-set trees and regrowth are starting to take over and encroach on the path. Already, on the areas we have cleared, there are signs of Bluebells coming up; nature doesn't take long to recolonise. Hopefully there might be a nice show of Bluebells, keep an eye out when you are walking round in spring. - Dan Hurst, Ranger
