MAY DAY CELEBRATIONS

Article provided by the Historical Society.



Aren't we lucky that our village school still celebrates May Day. The first record of the traditional May Day celebrations being organised by the school goes back to 1912 when the headmistress of the lower school was a Miss Mary Wright.

Here is the entry from

the school log:

May 1st 1913

School closed all day on account of May Day festivities. The crowning of the May Queen (Hilda Braybrook) took place at one o'clock in the Hall Hill. Afterwards the children gave songs and old country dances. A parade of the village was then made, a collection of £4 being taken. After the parade the children had an excellent tea in the schoolroom, after which followed games and may-pole dancing in a field kindly lent by Mr W. Beeby.

Below is a photo from around 1958 showing dancing on Hall Hill. This was provide by Theresa Ewen, (nee Blades) who is dancing on that day. Note

It is lovely to have the opportunity to write again about what Volunteer Action does in Brigstock. It is two years since my last piece so I can update you on how numbers have grown in the village.

In May 2016 we had 19 people signed up to our COMMUNITY CAR SCHEME.

In May 2018, we have 51. Not just doubled - nearly trebled!!

We are delighted to be able to help so many people but we did not double our number of drivers. With just two drivers in Brigstock, they both have to work hard for us. If you do have your car and some time, please consider becoming a volunteer driver. Passengers pay 40p per mile and you give your time for free. We are flexible on your commitment to us and try to work round what suits you.

In the past couple of years, VA has seen growth of 10% each year across the whole region we support. You have to live at an address in our area to qualify for our service but you can then book drives to go anywhere – including Addenbrookes and the Leicester hospitals. We recently did a drive to Heathrow for someone and regularly take one lady down to a village in Hertfordshire to stay with her daughter.

We also offer a befriending service. I know that there is a great community spirit in Brigstock so not many people get forgotten but if you are leading a full and busy life it can be difficult to remember how long the days and weeks can seem to those who rely on friends and neighbours to 'pop-in'. Our befrienders go with only one purpose – a chat. No need to rush. Just take the time to talk. No charge.

If you think the services we offer may benefit you, please call. Signing up is free for both. If you have time to offer and think you would like to help, please call. We would particularly like to recruit a new driver in the area and are currently looking for male befrienders. We can find a way for you to help, though, whoever you are.

ALLOTMENT NEWS

Despite the cold and wet spring, plants are now growing at a rapid rate. We could not get the early potatoes in on the usual St Patrick's Day as the ground was under water. But with the warmer weather all are now in and they are catching up. Hopefully the moisture will stay in the ground and give us a good crop, but we do need some rain to make things grow. This hot spring is great, but we are never happy.

June is the month when you can safely plant out the non-hardy plants as the treat of frost has passed. So its out with Courgettes, Pumpkins, french and runner beans and sweetcorn. These will provide crops right through till September and they can be stored or frozen to last you over the winter.

Tomatoes can also be planted out and it is best to remove the side shoots to stop them getting too overgrown. 4 or 5 trusses is enough for each plant to cope with. Greenhouse grown ones will ripen quicker, but outdoor ones will keep going until the first frost hits them. If you have a small garden, try pots or growbags.



If you are growing lettuces or other salad crops, plant a succession with a few every 2-3 weeks. This means that you will keep a ready supply ever ready for you.

It is surprising the amount of crops that you can harvest from a small area especially if you feed them well and rotate what you plant where.

If you only have a small garden and want more space, why not try an allotment. There are spare ones on the Benefield Road site. Call in and have a chat or contact the Charity Secretary, Sally Wilks . 01536 373428.

The Benefield Rd Allotment Association has been very successful in getting a grant from the National Lottery to upgrade their borehole pump to a solar powered one. This means that the old generator powered one has been replaced with a more environmentally friendly one, and much quieter, which runs automatically to keep us supplied if a source of fresh water.

Many thanks to the Lottery for this funding.

that. It's great that people care about the tidiness of the village and are willing to do their bit.

Since October last year we have been involved with a project called a Partnership Approach to Catchment Area Management which is to do with gaining a better understand about what makes Harper's Brook flood and how to try and implement strategies to control the flow of water into the brook. This has been a very positive experience and, whilst we are never going to prevent flooding completely, Brigstock may not be so much a victim of the flooding incidents we have seen in the past few years. ARTICLE 4 DIRECTION

The Parish Council applied for an Article 4 Direction because we were concerned about the loss of historic character within the designated conservation area. Specifically, the concern relates to the replacement of historic windows and doors, often with plastic, and the loss of traditional roof coverings. Such work was currently able to be undertaken under permitted development, where no planning application was required.

After consultation the Parish Council received no complaints about the proposals from those affected. **The new controls apply from June 1st 2018.**

An article 4 direction is a mechanism which allows local planning authorities to withdraw permitted development rights in certain circumstances so as to bring building works, which would otherwise be permitted development, within control. The aim of making such a direction is to ensure that the traditional details which form part of the character of an area are not removed or altered, and that development which would damage the character of an area does not go ahead.

PARISH COUNCIL Cont'd

ENC has four other conservation areas that are subject to article 4 Directions: Easton on the Hill, Collyweston, Duddington and King's Cliffe.

The effect of an article 4 direction is not that development within the particular category of permitted development cannot be carried out, but simply that it is no longer automatically permitted by Article 3 of the General Permitted Development Order 2015 and must instead be subject to a planning application. This does not necessarily mean that the Council would refuse permission for works proposed, but it does enable it to retain some control over the design and detailing of the proposed development and to grant permission subject to appropriate conditions. Such applications need to be considered against national and local policy and any other relevant material consideration, including a conservation area appraisal.

This type of application will not attract a planning fee so the additional costs will be borne by the Council in determining the application.

An article 4 direction cannot be applied retrospectively to works that have already been carried out.

The following permitted development rights are withdrawn in the case of the Brigstock Conservation Area:

 The enlargement, improvement or other alteration of a dwellinghouse
The enlargement of a dwellinghouse consisting of an addition or alteration to its roof

P Any other alteration to the roof of a dwellinghouse

The erection or construction of a porch outside any external door of a dwellinghouse

The installation, alteration or replacement chimney, flue or soil vent pipe on a dwellinghouse

The installation, alteration or replacement of a microwave antenna on a dwellinghouse or within the curtilage of a dwellinghouse

I The painting of the exterior of any building or work

P Any building operation consisting of the demolition of the

whole or any part of any gate, fence, wall or other means of enclosure.



GLUTEN FREE LIME AND POLENTA CAKE

This cake was made by our member, Ann Stuart for gluten free guests at our 100th Tea Party. It is deliciously moist, freezes well and can be made in advance and stored in an airtight container for 2-3 days. Ann used dairy free spread instead of butter, but its up to you.

Ingredients:

300g (11oz) butter, softened, plus extra for greasing300g (11oz) caster sugarfinely grated rind and juice of 2 limes4 eggs, beaten300g (11oz) ground almonds150g (5oz) polenta1 tsp baking powder.

For the Glaze:

finely grated rind and juice of 1 lime 75g (3oz) caster sugar icing sugar, for dusting

Method:

- 1 Grease a 23cm (9") round spring-form tin
- 2 Preheat the oven to 160°C/140°fan/Gas 3
- 3 Put the butter, sugar and lime rind into a large bowl and beat with an electric whisk until pale and fluffy. Gradually whisk in the eggs, then add the ground almonds, polenta, lime juice and baking powder and carefully fold in until thoroughly combined.
- 4 Spoon into the prepared tin and level the surface.
- 5 Bake in oven for about 1 hour 15 mins, or until a skewer inserted into the middle come out clean and the sponge is golden brown and springy to the touch. If top f cake is getting too brown before it's cooked, then cover with foil.
- 6 Heat the lime rind and juice, sugar and 2 tablespoons of water in a small pan. Sir over a low heat until the sugar is dissolved. Simmer for 2 to 3 mins until syrupy.
- 7 Prick the surface of the cake with a skewer, spoon the hot syrup evenly over the warm sponge and leave to cool completely in the tin.
- 8 Remove from the tin, transfer to a serving plate and dust with icing sugar.
- 9 Serve warm or cold, sliced into wedges, with a dollop of crème fraiche.
