have been completely overwhelmed with everyone who has knitted, crocheted, donated wool, money and their time to help us achieve this wonderful display for the 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the end of WW1. We have covered the War Memorial and decorated several seats around the village with all the handmade Poppies.

The photo on the front cover shows our work and was the proud centerpiece for the service on Remembrance Sunday.



A cheque for £1292.50 was presented to Liz Harries, Corby representative of The Royal British Legion on Mon 12<sup>th</sup> Nov where all those involved were invited to attend.

The amount includes £786 from poppy tickets and generous donations, £300 from Olde Three Cocks quiz and £206.50 from Chapel tea and cake after the memorial service.

**The Final Brigstock total is £1,634.20**, which includes £21 from the school and collection boxes from the Co-op, Chapel and Olde Three Cocks.

We are now beavering away knitting for our Advent Window display on  $1^{st}$ December and our contribution to St. Andrew's Tree Festival from  $8^{th}$  to  $15^{th}$  December (do go and support all the entries).

Our group meets every Wednesday at The Olde Three Cocks (hosted by Margareta and Paul) from 10am to 12 noon. If you want to learn to knit or crochet, or you already knit come and join our friendly group.

### THE UNVEILING OF THE WAR MEMORIAL 1920

On Saturday 22<sup>nd</sup> May 1920 a solemn procession, led by six members of Kettering Town Band marched through Brigstock for the opening of the War Memorial. At the head of the procession was carried the furled banner of the N. U. Oddfellows lodge followed by Brigstock ex-servicemen, members of three friendly societies, two Oddfellows groups and the Rechabites, the cricket and football clubs and other individuals many carrying wreaths.

Gathered round the memorial were hundreds of Brigstock people, the majority of the village, including several female relatives of the fallen, dressed in mourning and also carrying wreaths. The vicar of St Andrew's Church, the Rev. A. C. Hooper along with members of the choir had walked up from

the church and several local dignitaries had arrived by car, including Sir Arthur de Capell Brooke of Great Oakley Hall who had been invited to unveil the memorial.

Sir Arthur paid tribute to the fallen, expressing his regret that such a sacrifice had been necessary and extending heartfelt sympathy to those nearest and



dearest to them. The memorial would be a daily reminder to friends and neighbours of the great sacrifice made.

The memorial cost £130 and the whole of this sum was raised by the people of the village in a house to house appeal.

Copies of the commemoration edition of Bygone Brigstock giving full details of all the men named on the cross as well as other interesting articles can still be obtained from the Historical Society (price  $\pounds$ 4).

### **Brigstock United Reformed Church : Early Days**

Brigstock United Reformed Church was built in 1797, over 220 years ago, but non-conformists, those who did not agree with the practices of the Church of England and wished to worship in their own way, were active in the village for more than a hundred years before that. A licence for a Congregational Meeting House was first granted to Edward Brooke in 1672. The building was situated in the grounds of the present Mill House and for many years this meeting house continued to serve the spiritual needs of the small but growing number of Dissenters in the village. But on 27<sup>th</sup> August 1758 a disaster literally struck during a Sunday service. This was reported in the Northampton Mercury as follows:

We hear from Brigstock in this County that on Sunday 27<sup>th</sup> of last month (August) in the afternoon during the time of Divine service they had a dreadful storm of rain, thunder and lightning. The lightning set the meeting house on fire which was burnt to the ground along with an adjacent building. One woman was killed in the Meeting House by the flash and three more were hurt.

Present at the Service during this terrible event was the Reverend John Smith and he wrote an account of the incident in the Oundle Church diary and his report gives more details than the newspaper :-

While I was preaching and as Mr Hill was speaking his choice experiences it was dreadfully tempestuous as to thunder and lightning and rain and at that time the Meeting House at Brigstock was burnt down; a ball of fire striking (it was thought) on a chimney adjoining to the Meeting house with a report louder and smarter than that of a cannon and flashes of fire and most sulphurous smelling . In a moment the whole Meeting House was on fire, over the heads of Rev. Mr Ward of Spaldwick then preaching and of the congregation struck down ten persons for dead, one of which was a young married woman who never breathed more, whose name was Eate and one John Smith ( a fine young man who had been in the army) lay for weeks of ten as helpless as an infant as though all the bones in his body were dislocated but recovered it, and one Leverit of Kettering ( as well as the said Smith ) lay for dead for the space of two hours before it be known that the said Leverit was dead or not.

#### Brigstock United Reformed Church : Early Days Cont'd

Undeterred by this tragedy the congregation continued to meet in rented premises and their numbers continued to increase. By 1797 they decided that a new chapel should be built and a house and yard were purchased on the site of the present United Reformed Church. Work was started on the building but unfortunately, as so often happens with building projects, they ran into financial difficulties. The cost for completion was £300 but the members had only manged to raise £100. What could be done? A small group of the leading members, including George Leigh, Thomas Viccars, Thomas Bellamy and John Bellamy sent a letter to the Congregational Board in London asking for financial assistance. In the letter they stated that there were 200 Congregational members in Brigstock who needed a place of worship and that they had already "built a shell and walls of stone and covered with slate". The letter was not only signed by the Brigstock members but underwritten and supported by many leading local Dissenters, including Thomas Toller and Andrew Fuller. The application was successful and funds were provided to complete the building of the church, which was officially registered as a place of worship for Protestant Dissenters in January 1799. The building has been in continuous use up to the present day as a Congregational Chapel and later as Brigstock United Reformed Church and has been not only a place of worship but an important part of the life of the village.

### THOUGHTS FROM NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

#### Some latest scams to be aware of:

1. It looks like the communication has come from TV licensing and says you are due a refund of £??? and if you give them your bank details they will refund you. The email has a link to take you to the page for you to add your details in. Please do not follow the link or give them any bank details.

2. A letter from East Northants Council says you have underpaid your Council Tax and could you send a cheque for the specified amount to the specified address. If you receive one of these letters then please check with East Northants Council before sending any money.

3. If you have organised for a utility company, builder or any engineer to come to your property or not, check their credentials or a badge on their arrival before letting anyone into your property. If you are unsure don't let them in until you have checked with the company they say they represent.

#### Tips to keep your vehicle safe:

1. Ensure all doors, windows and sunroofs are closed and locked when leaving your vehicle unattended. Don't simply rely on your key fob, as some thieves use 'jammers' to intercept the signal between the fob and the car, leaving the vehicle unlocked and vulnerable to theft.

2. Don't leave your keys lying around visible on a windowsill at home or near a front door, where they could be hooked through the letterbox.

3. Never leave valuables in your vehicle and keep any other possessions out of sight. Remove your sat nav and its holder and wipe away any window suction marks as these could indicate a sat nav is stored in your vehicle.

4. If you use a vehicle for maintenance purposes, it is advisable not to leave tools or other working materials in a vehicle unoccupied or overnight, as works vehicles such as vans are commonly targeted by criminals. (See notice on page 5)

5. Never leave vehicle documents in your car, as this would make it easy for a thief to sell your car or provide a cover story if stopped by the police.

6. Consider having anti-theft screws fitted to your number plates to prevent them from being stolen and used on another vehicle.

Darker nights – crime-prevention: During the long winter nights, take a fresh look at your home security. Keep front and back doors locked at all times and keep keys and valuables out of sight and reach from cat flaps, letterboxes and down-stairs doors and windows. If you are out in the evening, leave a light on and draw the curtains. Use timer switches to turn on energy saving light. Leaving a radio on could potentially deter a burglar when you are out. Don't leave spare keys outside, burglars know all the usual hiding places.



### **Fantastic MUGA News**

#### (Multi Use Games Area)

We have been awarded a grant by WREN's FCC Community Action Fund to cover the cost of providing a MUGA for the village. WREN is a not-for-profit business that awards grants for community, biodiversity and heritage projects from funds donated by FCC Environment through the Landfill Communities Fund.

The MUGA will be installed by Wicksteed Ltd in the area of rough scrub near the cricket nets and will offer a new sports facility for all the village to use. It is a Championship Ballcourt – approx. 18m x 10m with 2 football goals and 2 basketball hoops with backboards and has 3m high surrounding fencing to reduce the risk from flying balls.



It is being manufactured at the moment and will be installed early in the new year.

When the Neighbourhood Plan proceeds to local referendum and achieves more than half of votes cast in favour, then the Neighbourhood Plan will be 'made' by East Northamptonshire Council. If 'made' the Neighbourhood Plan will come into force as part of the Development Plan for the neighbourhood area, and subsequently be used in the determination of planning applications and decisions on planning appeals in the plan area. The Housing and Planning Act is very clear that where a planning application conflicts with a neighbourhood plan that has been brought into force, planning permission should not normally be granted.

If it does not get approved, then we will not have any Plan to control development in Brigstock.

There are two hedgehogs that have a ritual of passing under my window, sniffing along their merry way. The fox comes along the pathway the opposite and if he spies me at the window he will stop and stare, then stroll along to carry on his night time journey. There are many owls in the trees that let their presence be known as they talk to each other, and the bats that fly over the brook , who if they are lucky will have a tasty moth to keep their hunger away.

For the artists amongst you, whether it's with pencil, paints or camera, there is nothing nicer than to sit the brook, catch the water tumbling over the stones in the shallow spots, or the deeper pools that are shadowed by the wonderful trees, or the way the water flows through the bridges at either end of the pathway. The view of the church through the trees and bushes - it is all on your doorstep.

So next time you decide to take a stroll, try the footpath at the back of Harpers Court, stop, wait, and see what you might see. It is all around you - you just need to take the time to enjoy it.

# Fermyn Woods Country Park

We are well into autumn now with winter just round the corner. I have already seen winter migrants in the park in the form of Fieldfares and Redwings but they are much earlier than last year (The first Fieldfare seen this year was on the 4<sup>th</sup> October where as last year it was 9<sup>th</sup> November, the first flock of Redwings seen this year was 8<sup>th</sup> October where last year it was 22<sup>nd</sup> October) We are now undertaking our winter task of reducing and thinning trees around the park, including up in the Great Thicket for the rare Black Hairstreak butterflies but any tree work we do is beneficial to the fauna and flora found in the park. We are also doing the end of season cuts in certain places round the park of the grass/flowers and putting into grass piles for small mammals and snakes. The county dragonfly recorder has been monitoring round the park and has found the rare Willow Emerald Damselfly and evidence of it laying eggs. We have also had Froglife in who have improved the ditch leading into Reedy pond and have also improved Refuge and Long pond which where slowly being taken over by Reed Mace.

Our volunteers have been busy repairing the sand pit in the Toddler play area and picnic tables and benches round the park.

It is a brilliant time of year to come down to the park for a nice Autumn/ Winter walk and see what you can found round the park and in the woods. Why not stop off in the Skylark Café afterwards for a tea or coffee and slice of homemade cake.

## WI RECIPE PAGE

### **GLUTEN FREE LIME AND POLENTA CAKE**

This cake was made by our member, Ann Stuart for gluten free guests at our 100<sup>th</sup> Tea Party. It is deliciously moist, freezes well and can be made in advance and stored in an airtight container for 2-3 days. Ann used dairy free spread instead of butter, but its up to you.

#### Ingredients:

- 300g (11oz) butter, softened, plus extra for greasing
- 300g (11oz) caster sugar
- finely grated rind and juice of 2 limes
- 4 eggs, beaten
- 300g (11oz) ground almonds
- 150g (5oz) polenta
- 1 tsp baking powder.

#### For the Glaze:

finely grated rind and juice of 1 lime 75g (3oz) caster sugar

icing sugar, for dusting

#### Method:

- 1. Grease a 23cm (9") round spring-form tin
- 2. Preheat the oven to 160°C/140°fan/Gas 3
- 3. Put the butter, sugar and lime rind into a large bowl and beat with an electric whisk until pale and fluffy. Gradually whisk in the eggs, then add the ground almonds, polenta, lime juice and baking powder and carefully fold in until thoroughly combined.
- 4. Spoon into the prepared tin and level the surface.
- 5. Bake in oven for about 1 hour 15 mins, or until a skewer inserted into the middle come out clean and the sponge is golden brown and springy to the touch. If top f cake is getting too brown before it's cooked, then cover with foil.
- 6. Heat the lime rind and juice, sugar and 2 tablespoons of water in a small pan. Sir over a low heat until the sugar is dissolved. Simmer for 2 to 3 mins until syrupy.
- 7. Prick the surface of the cake with a skewer, spoon the hot syrup evenly over the warm sponge and leave to cool completely in the tin.
- 8. Remove from the tin, transfer to a serving plate and dust with icing sugar. Serve warm or cold, sliced into wedges, with a dollop of crème fraiche.
