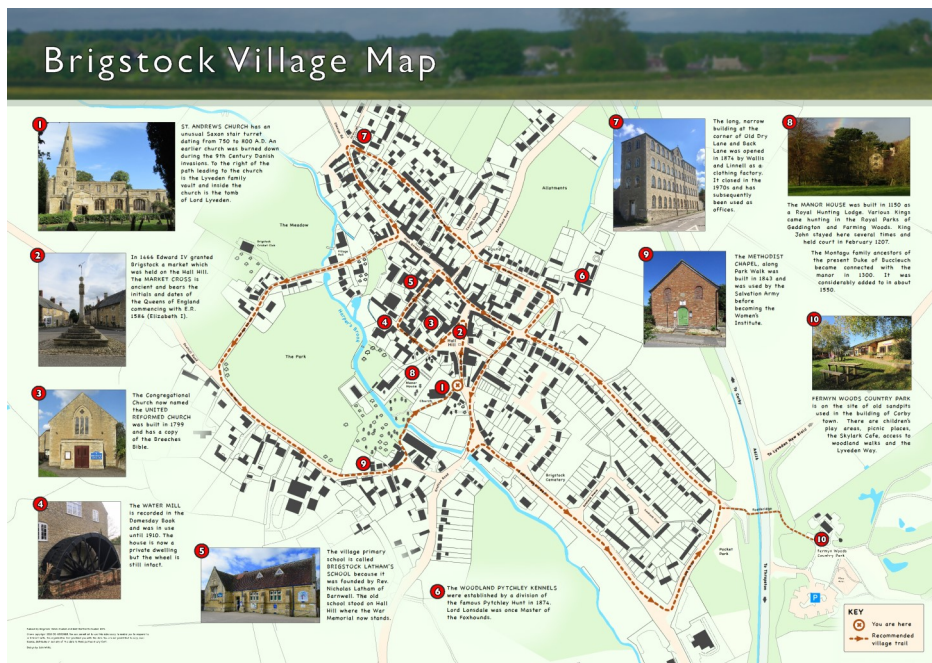

GRANT FUNDED WORKS TO THE VILLAGE HALL

Work has started on the construction of the extension to the hall. The base is in and the brickwork has commenced. This should be ready in mid-September to take all the chairs and tables making the whole hall so much more usable.

We are also getting new chairs for the hall with comfortable padded seats to make the film nights and other events so much more comfortable. There will be new catering equipment for the kitchen for the autumn, all funded from a grant.

We will soon have new curtains in the hall to replace the faded ones which have been there for several years. We are also having new carpets fitted throughout the upper floor of the hall, again to replace the worn out existing one.

We will soon getting the new projector system for the future film nights to give us better viewing experience. This will be supplemented by a new PA sound system which will be available for users in the village for their outdoor events.

The weekend of Fathers' Day dawned bright and clear and the June Small room looked lovely-tables set with white cloths, "proper" china and flowers, ready for a new venture-Fathers' Day teas. Not everyone likes a lot of sweet food, so we introduced a savoury option. This was the brainchild of Sharon Eldred who is amazing at helping us organise fundraising events. There was lots of home baking, waitress service and a lovely atmosphere and our customers were very complimentary. It was hard work but very enjoyable and gave us nearly £400 for our funds. Perhaps we'll do it again next year!

We also joined in with the Playgroup's garage sale in July, selling some of our bric-a-brac and making £52. We have some essential repair work to do to our building; the brickwork in some areas is very crumbly and water is getting in, and re-pointing also needs to be done. All this is very expensive and we are hoping to get some grants to help us out, but we have to pay at least half of the cost ourselves, and so we have to keep fundraising. So, our next effort will be at the Beer Festival where we hope to have a good tombola and a game suited to the American theme, devised by Paula. On **September 28th** we have our annual **Barn Dance** in the Village Hall-tickets this year are £9 each, £5 for children, and include a ploughman's supper. More details on the poster, tickets on sale now. In November we have another Beetle Drive-and the date has been changed due to a clash of events. The date for the **Beetle Drive** is now **November 22nd**, so do put the date in your diary and look out for tickets on sale from early October. The last event this year will be our ever-popular **Christmas Coffee Morning** on **Saturday, December 7th**.

Aside from all this, we do remember that we are a church, and we have services every week, with a variety of preachers and the occasional service we take ourselves, often in the form of a Songs of Praise or Pizza and Praise. We are a very friendly fellowship and warmly welcome anyone who would like to come to any of our services-at 10.30 in our chapel in Mill Lane. New Police Office Base To Open In Corby

A new office base in the Corby Cube for Northamptonshire Police will mean local Response officers will be spending more time in and around the town from next month. From September 20, Response officers will use the facilities at the Corby Cube in George Street, in a move which will see the town's Neighbourhood Policing Team also relocate from Deene House.

Corby Cube already houses the Police Enquiry Desk on the first floor of the council building, which is open for the public to visit and get advice, report incidents and traffic collisions or enquire about property amongst other things. The new office base will bring the town's policing resources under one roof in a central location, which will help to increase both the responsiveness and visibility of officers in Corby and surrounding villages.

The move to the Corby Cube will be an interim one while work takes place to create a new joint police and fire hub on the site of the town's existing Corby Fire Station in Phoenix Parkway.

Meet the Brigstock Ancestors

This article is from a report in the “Kettering Leader and Guardian” published on 2nd March 1928.

Skeleton Discovered at Brigstock :

Archaeologist suggests burial took place over three thousand years ago.

Whist a workman was employed at a sandpit on the land of Mr F. J. Steward of Brigstock, about midway between the village and Stanion on Friday, he discovered, in a cavity, a human skeleton. It was obviously of great age but was in a good state of preservation, the teeth being almost perfect. The skeleton was in a bent position as if curled up when placed in the ground.

No stones were found around the skeleton or ornaments that might lead to any assumption that it was a Roman burial place and there have been, as far as we can gather, no other finds in the immediate vicinity. The skeleton was about four feet from the surface and does not seem to have been encased in anything.

An old inhabitant declares that it used to be said that there was a gypsy encampment not far from the spot about a century ago. On Monday, when our representative mentioned to a Brigstock resident that a well-known antiquarian was going to Brigstock to make an investigation on the spot the reply was “Well, he had better be quick. There is not as much of the skeleton there as when it was first found. Several pieces have been taken away as gruesome souvenirs and if he does not come quickly he will find nothing there except the hollow of the sandpit in which the skeleton was found”.

When first discovered it was a perfect skeleton. Dr Stokes, who has been to see it, came to the conclusion that it was the body of a female. A search in the sand has not revealed any indication of a settlement there.

It now appears that the skeleton is of considerably greater antiquity than was previously supposed. Mr G. Whyman Abbott, the well-known archaeologist of Peterborough, had an opportunity to examine the relics before the vandals got at them and he states:

“The skeleton was found lying on one side, north and south, with the head to the north and in a contracted position, with the arms bent and the hands towards the head with the knees bent and raised.”

This type of burial is always connected with the Early Bronze Age and he suggested that that the date of this particular burial was about 1300 B.C.

On the discovery of the skeleton it was at first thought to be desirable to acquaint the District Coroner to ascertain the cause of death, but, in view of the above circumstances, it was not found necessary.

Timely thoughts from the Associate Minister and the Rector

We had a lovely tomato plant outside in the back garden. Full of fruit, not yet quite full or ripe but looking like a prize winner in the making! That was before a storm decided to attack it with torrential rain and gale force wind, snapping its support and lifting it clean out of the ground, would you believe?

A timely reminder that we are not in control of the weather. In fact, so many things are not subject to our plans and hopes. It's nearly a year now since we were reminded of this when an accident left Alan with spinal fractures and a brain injury. He is doing ok and able to do more than he could and has appreciated the prayers and practical support of some of you in Brigstock. Some regular users of the Meadow have been asking why the willows along Harper's Brook have been so drastically trimmed this year. About 25 years ago willow trees were planted along the brook as part of the Nene Valley Project. This was instigated to continue the tradition of having pollarded willows along the river Nene and its tributaries. The trees were provided free of charge and planted by some of the children from the primary school with help from Ian Gemmell the ranger at the country park at the time. The Parish Council was successful in obtaining a grant from Tesco towards the cost of the pollarding and we have therefore fulfilled our commitment made all those years ago. You will see that the trees will soon recover and start producing the characteristic willow shoots. Some of you may be interested in using them for basket making as would have happened in the past. We are hoping to organise a willow weaving workshop when the time is right.

I am pleased to report that we have been awarded a grant of £2,605 towards the cost of a new solar powered speed sign to replace the one we have at the moment. We hope to be able to move this one to different locations around the village: Stanion Road, Sudborough Road and Grafton Road. This will be out soon so keep an eye out.

PARISH COUNCIL

There have been many compliments about the wildflowers on the bank in the Meadow. We hope to extend the wildflower area this autumn so if you are handy with a fork please get in touch. The area will need regular managing so volunteers please!

The new village interpretation board is completed and ready for installation. It will be placed in the old location at the entrance to Church Walk. There will be a space for displaying posters. We hope you like it. Thanks to the Co-op for providing the new noticeboard outside the shop and thanks to Steph Beckett for applying for the grant. We hope people will use the noticeboards to display posters rather than telegraph poles.

Following concern about the removal of salt bins we are pleased to report that some will be reinstated although the PC will be responsible for filling them with the assistance of village residents.

The Council is looking into the possibility of installing some outdoor exercise equipment on the Meadow. If you have any experience of using such equipment please get in touch.

Thank you to all of you who report problems with our footpaths especially those of you who take a pair of secateurs on your walks and keep the paths clear. We have obtained a grant for a new kissing gate in the field next to the Meadow which we are hoping will encourage walkers to use the footpath along the bottom of the field next to Harper's Brook rather than the higher path. If you are a dog walker please "stick and flick" the poo or pick it up in a plastic bag and take it to a bin but don't chuck the bag in the hedges! Although we didn't manage to convince the judges of the Village of the Year competition **we** know what a great place Brigstock is. Thanks to all of you who helped with the application and showing the judges around. Never ones to give up we are already thinking about next year so any ideas and suggestions would be welcomed.

Litter Picking

We entered the CPRE litter picking awards again this year but did not get anywhere in the awards (perhaps having been awarded money for the last three years they thought someone else should get some), but thank you to all who keep the village tidy and looking good. If people keep the area outside their houses weed free and tidy the whole village would be fantastic.

BRIGSTOCK ARCHAEOLOGICAL GROUP

Love local history? Fascinated by archaeology? Want to get involved? Brigstock Archaeological Group (BAG) would love to hear from you. A new group established in association with Brigstock Historical Society, BAG aims to delve deeper into our parish's hidden past.

Previous archaeological experience or historical expertise aren't necessary, just a passion for the subject. To start with, the group simply wants to hear from anyone who might enjoy participating in community archaeology projects as part of a team of village volunteers.

Not all archaeology is field work requiring physical fitness. Cleaning finds, arranging logistics or researching can often be done from the comfort of a chair. Any age, any skillset, any level of fitness, BAG is keen to draw together as substantial a pool of volunteers as possible.

Once levels of interest are clear, the group will meet to discuss ideas for initial activities, ranging from field walking for material clues about interesting undiscovered locations, to digital research of existing data. The Middle Nene Archaeological Group (MIDNAG) has already kindly offered to outline how Brigstock could undertake a Big Dig event opening test pits at locations around the village.

A spate of finds around the parish in recent years, from coins and broaches to ceramics, suggests a rich, largely lost history spanning the Iron Age through to the post-Medieval period. St Andrew's distinctive Anglo-Saxon tower is the most ready proof of that, but most evidence lies buried below the houses, gardens and fields in and around the village. Few are now familiar with Brigstock's Roman temple digs half a century ago; who knows what else lies hidden? BAG plans to find out.

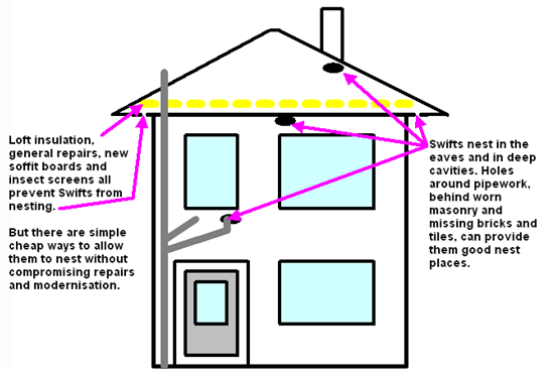

BRIGSTOCK SWIFTS NEED YOUR HELP

I have been watching the Swifts flying above Brigstock ever since we moved in several years ago. They arrive from Africa in May, soon lay their eggs in roof spaces and then leave again in early September for their 6000 mile journey back to central Africa along largely unknown routes. Winter is spent in the Equatorial and Southern parts of Africa. The birds are silent, flying high and fast and covering large areas in the search for food. They spend all their time on the wing, never landing, except to nest. They are vulnerable to bad weather; there have been mass fatalities following severe storms. The swift population was estimated at 80,000 in 1990, but are thought to have decreased by as much as 50% since then.

I think that we should be doing something to help them when they arrive back in Brigstock next year. They appear to only nest in the older central part of Brigstock in the old stone houses with slate roofs. This is because these are usually the only roofs that have holes in them that the swifts can access to nest.

Where Swifts nest and what stops them nesting



What can we do to help?

- 1 Make sure that any improvements to houses allow for swifts to continue to nest.
- 2 Do not work on roofs where they are nesting from May to August
- 3 Preserve nesting holes or make new ones.
- 4 Swifts do not make nests so there is no mud, leaves or mess as other birds
- 5 If your roof has been sealed, put up some swift boxes to encourage more to nest on your house.
- 6 Any new houses should have swift nests built into them. There are a wide range of materials now available off the shelf. One of the largest colonies of swifts in the country is now on a new estate in Fulborn, near Cambridge, where a whole estate had nests built in or fixed to the outside walls. Lets gets the planning system changed.

SWIFTS, Cont'd

I would love to hear if you have swifts nesting in your house or you have seen where they are nesting in the village.

If we can find suitable properties and willing owners, we can get some boxes which we can fix to the walls to encourage new nests. I hope to apply for a grant to take this forward but would like some help and support.

Fermyn Woods Country Park

So here it is September already, summer seems to have flown by, and it has been a busy one at the park both with visitors and wildlife.

The Blue Tits nested in the café nest box again which was enjoyed by people visiting the café, they laid later this year but managed to raise and fledge 7 chicks. It has also been a good season for butterflies and we have had high numbers of Marbled Whites, Meadow Browns, Ringlets, Silver Washed Fritillaries, Painted Ladies and Gatekeepers to name a few. The Black Hair-streak was out the last two weeks of June along with the Grizzled and Dingy Skippers in May/June. His imperial majesty, the Purple Emperor, was two weeks late this year and did not emerge till the start of July which could have been because of the cold wet weather we had in June. The Purple Emperor is usually found up in the woods but we do get the odd one come down to the park - this year I found a male in the door way of the gents toilets as I went to lock up. There is a video of it on our Facebook page. Here at Fermyn we get over 31 species of butterfly, there are about 59 species that breed in the UK including migrants like the Painted Lady.

We have had a good show of wild flowers this year. Bee and Pyramidal Orchids were seen around the park along with an increase in numbers of Ox Eye Daises, Knapweed and Birds Foot Trefoil; all being very good sources of nectar for butterflies, bees and insects. There has also been an increase in Yellowhammers around the park and Skylarks singing out in the surrounding fields. There has also been a pair of Kingfishers seen frequently both at the fishing pond and refuge pond which is nice to see. I would also like to mention how nice the raised beds looked this year. They were rebuilt and planted by volunteers last year and funded by the Friends Group. We have had a lot of positive feedback from people visiting the cafe and the insects, bees and butterflies have really benefitted from all the wildlife friendly plants.

With help from our volunteers we have been making repairs round the park from repairing fences, replacing a gate post and repairing the roof of one of the huts in the toddler play area to scraping off the paths where the verges are making the paths narrow in places. Along with our summer programme of mowing and strimming,- we have had events run by our Education Ranger during the holidays and the friendly spider quiz trail round the park.

The next few months will see the Park change as the weather gets colder and the days shorter. There will still be lots to see, so do dress up warm and come and see what is around. There is always the SkyLark Café to visit for hot food and drinks.

WI RECIPE PAGE

Peanut Butter Cookies

Ingredients:

5oz (150G) Plain Flour
½ Tsp (2.5ml) Bicarbonate of soda
½ tsp (2.5ml) Salt
3oz (75g) Granulated Sugar
3oz (75g) Soft Dark Brown Sugar
4oz (100g) Butter
1 egg
½ tsp (2.5ml) Vanilla Essence
8oz (225g) Crunchy or Smooth Peanut Butter



Method:

- 1 Heat oven to Gas Mark 4 or Electric 350f/180C
- 2 Sift together the flour, bicarbonate of soda and salt and set aside.
- 3 Cream together the butter and sugar's until soft and fluffy.
- 4 Mix in the egg and vanilla.
- 5 Then add the peanut butter.
- 6 Add to this mixture the dry mix. Ideally sieve this in and mix until you have a dough consistency then chill for about an hour.
- 7 Spoon out the mixture and roll into small balls and place on a greased baking tray. Press down with a fork (not too hard but enough to leave fork lines across the top).
- 8 Place in a preheated oven for 15 minutes. They should be slightly coloured, crispy on the outside and chewy on the inside.

Although you should cool before serving, mine get eaten straight from the oven! Enjoy
