At the Carol Service a new flower stand was presented to us by Barrie Tiney and dedicated to the memory of Maureen. This was bought with some of the money donated at Maureen's funeral two years ago.

The run-up to Christmas was, however, tinged with sadness for us as one of our longest serving members, Margaret Knight, died after a year in which her health deteriorated quite quickly. Her funeral at the end of December gave us the chance to remember how much she had done for the church in her 45 years as a member, being our organist, an Elder and taking on the treasurer's job at the Open Door as well as making countless cakes and pots of marmalade for our coffee mornings. We all miss her very much.

We have been looking ahead and planning events for this year. The fundraising we do is necessary to keep the chapel running but, as already mentioned, we donate to charities as well. Memories of a Brigstock War Veteran

Reginald William Vivian Shiells, known to everyone as Viv, served his country during the Second World War as an infantryman in the British Army. He fought in the campaign in North Africa and was part of the Allied Army's advance into Italy in 1944, where he was seriously wounded by a mortar bomb at Monte Cassino. As he lay wounded two medical orderlies approached carrying another soldier on their stretcher. They saw that this soldier had died so they put Viv on the stretcher instead and carried him to the field hospital. If they had not done this he probably would have died where he fell. From the field hospital he was shipped back to Liverpool and from there to Allam Hospital in West Bromwich and later to Kettering Hospital before returning home to Brigstock, where he spent the rest of his life. The following is an extract from the "Evening Telegraph" of October 29, 1997, which was part of a series of articles celebrating Kettering General Hospital's centenary year.

Angels help bring smiles to victims of war

Old soldier Reginald Shiells has vivid memories of Kettering General Hospital after being badly wounded in the Second World War.

Mr Shiells, now 85, spent a month in Buccleuch Ward after being injured by a mortar bomb in the assault on Monte Cassino in Italy in 1944. The former infantryman with the Queen's Royal Regiment suffered terrible wounds to both legs and left arm and still has shrapnel in his left hip.

Although he still walks with a stick, he has nothing but praise for the angels of mercy at KGH who looked after him after being brought back to England on a hospital ship.

"I spent some time in a hospital at West Bromwich before coming to Kettering to recuperate", said Mr Shiells of Bridge Street, Brigstock.

"There were only two or three wounded soldiers on the ward at any given time but we were treated very well. We even got an extra hot meal – a cooked supper – which made the other patients jealous but we would often share some of it out."

Mr Shiells remembers Matron Agnes Jackson's twice daily rounds and how the nurses spruced and tidied up the patients for her inspection. Night staff would also clean up the ward before going off duty.

Memories of a Brigstock War Veteran—cont'd

The day began at 5.30am when water bowls were brought round for the men to wash and shave.

"We usually had eggs for breakfast, which relatives brought in to be boiled and all the eggs were marked with the patient's name. We had dinner at midday and bread and jam for afternoon tea. The food was always brought in on a trolley and served by the nurses on the ward."

Mr Shiells said bedtime was at 8pm, which did not please some of the servicemen who were well enough to date off-duty nurses and sometimes had to sneak back to bed after lights out. "If Sister Hooper caught them there would be trouble", he laughed, "Once there was a Canadian serviceman who jumped into bed with all his clothes on. He thought he had got away with it until she spotted his boots sticking out of the bedclothes."

After the war Mr Shiells was the canteen manager at Tarmac in Geddington Road, Corby. His daughter Janice was a sister on the intensive care unit at Kettering General.

Viv died in the year 2000 at the age of 88. Janice still lives in the family cottage in Bridge Street. She has been retired for some time after spending many years caring for her patients in intensive care at KGH and is still very active in village life.


Look out later in the year for our next open evening, when we will be looking to start the next set of new learners. Listening to village bells is a wonderful thing, let's keep the tradition going!

From Captain Alan and Revd. Heather Lowe:

The months of March and April are always welcome ones as we see again the promise of new life as things begin to bud all around us. The natural world seems united in its determination to fill the world with colour again! Speaking as ones who have had a difficult Autumn and Winter following a serious accident (to Alan) Spring is even more welcome in 2019.

Brigstock Neighbourhood Plan

East Northamptonshire Council arranged a referendum which was held on Thursday 6 December 2018. Everyone on the electoral register in Brigstock Parish was entitled to vote.

The question posed at the Referendum was "Do you want East Northamptonshire District Council to use the Neighbourhood Plan for Brigstock Area to help it decide planning applications in the neighbourhood area?"

378 votes (88.9%) were cast in favour of YES and 47 votes (11.1%) cast in favour of NO. This was from an Electorate of 1095, with 425 Ballot Papers were issued which was a turnout of 38.8 %.

The Plan was therefore accepted by the Parishioners of Brigstock.

The Plan was "made" (adopted) by East Northamptonshire Planning Policy Committee on 21st January 2019.

It will form part of the statutory Development Plan for the area. East North-amptonshire Council will continue to be responsible for determining most planning applications, but in Brigstock parish the policies in the Neighbourhood Plan, together with policies from the adopted Local Plan (consisting of the North Northamptonshire Joint Core Strategy 2011-2031, adopted July 2016 and remaining policies from the Rural North, Oundle and Thrapston Plan, adopted July 2011) and National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF), will be the basis for those decisions.

This should restrict building in the near future to the 2 sites identified in the Plan and to infill sites within the village boundary.

Thank you to all those who voted in the referendum. This was the culmination for 3 years work and many consultations with residents of Brigstock. Hopefully this will ensure that we can now control future development as detailed in our plan.

Most of us who have been coming all that time are no better at the game now than when we started, but it was never intended to be played seriously. Our annual trip to the ice rink at Beckworths Emporium in December went very smoothly, and we were left to organise ourselves once we had managed to reassure a member of staff that we had all played on ice before and knew what we were doing, or at least what we should be doing!

Fermyn Woods Country Park

I can't believe we are already in the third month of 2019, so far it has been a relatively mild winter with the odd cold snap here and there. I noticed the snowdrops by the café gate where out early January compared to 2018 when they were out at the end of the month. Here at the park we attempt to survey what is seen around the park so we can get a picture of what is here and when, another name for this is phenology which is is the study of periodic plant and animal life cycle events and how these are influenced by the seasons, weather and climate change. The Woodland Trust have a website called nature's calendar where you can do this for yourselves and have a go at some citizen science.

Whilst out in the Great Thicket we managed to see a Woodcock, which is a shy wading bird that is very well camouflaged and tends to sit still in the undergrowth instead of flying away. But on this occasion this one decided to fly and we got a nice look at this beautiful rare bird, unfortunately they are on the RSPB's red list due to a number of factors which includes habitat lose. They are resident to the UK but in the autumn the numbers increase with birds coming in from Finland and Russia to spend the winter here as it is warmer.

The Carols in the park was well attended again despite the down pours we had just before the event. We would like to thank the friends group for helping to set up and do refreshments to Reverend Heather Lowe for leading the Carol service and for the people who braved the weather to have a walk round the park whilst having a sing song.

Volunteers from the Butterfly Conservation Trust have been out a couple of times over the last two months and have cleared the bank behind Reedy pond and the bank at North valley of Hawthorn and blackthorn which was turning valuable grassland for butterflies into woodland.

With help from our park volunteers we have cleared some more areas in the refuge of trees which are starting to crowd each other out and prevent light from getting to the ground. We have also been doing our annual thinning of trees in the Great Thicket to create more habitat for the rare Black Hairstreak butterfly.

WI RECIPE PAGE ARROZ CON POLLO

Arroz con pollo is an easy, comforting ONE pot meal that comes together in less than 75 minutes. This classic Spanish and Latin American dish is made with rice, chicken, onions, and spices.

Ingredients:

6 slices of streaky bacon cut into small pieces

1.5 tablespoons of oil

leftover chicken chunks

1 onion

½ can of tomatoes

1 teaspoon of paprika

1 teaspoon of turmeric

¼ teaspoon of salt

½ pint of vegetable stock

3oz of frozen peas

4oz of long grain rice

Method:

Heat the oil and fry the bacon pieces

Pre-heat the over to Gas 4 (350 F or 180 C)

Fry the onion until soft

Add the ½ can of tomatoes and juice, paprika, turmeric and water

Bring to the boil

Add the chicken, rice, peas and bacon

Cover and cook for 1 hour 10 mins.
