Brigstock Village Hall changes

Due to lockdown, we had to stop all classes and events in the Village Hall from the end of March. This has meant that it has been very quiet and empty over the past few months. However we have been able to have a good clear out and tidy and with the Playgroup now finished. They have removed all their equipment and the annex has had all the tables and chairs moved into the store cupboards, making it a much more useful room.

We have also had the roof to the hall repaired to stop the leaks and to refurbish the dormer pitches. This was funded by a grant from East Northants Council for which we are very grateful.

Our next project is to convert the rear play area into a more useable seating area for all hall users. We probably need a further grant for this, so it may take sometime to arrange.

Brigstock in Lockdown

In the beginning:

Back in March it was becoming apparent we would be going into lockdown. Jane, a very active villager, immediately compiled a newsletter to say how the village would be setting up a support mechanism for anybody that may be isolating or having difficulty leaving their homes. Before we could even get letters out, lockdown was in place, but we managed to drop leaflets to more than 600 properties in the village. The village was divided into zones and a coordinator allocated for each street. There was a contact number for each street resident to contact their street coordinator and central telephone number and an email address.

Actively supporting Isolators:

Straight away we were galvanised into action collecting and delivering shopping and prescriptions. Brigstock has its own local pharmacy at our GP surgery; it was like a drive thru McDonalds. Press the bell on the window and shout a name. A hand would appear and had you your medication. A wonderful service!

Co-ordinator Networking:

We then set up a WhatsApp group so that all the street coordinators were in touch with each other. This enabled people to pass on requests if they were unable to fulfil them themselves.

Social Media became invaluable:

We also set up a FaceBook page "Isolators Group", for those people who have social media, but were unable to leave their homes due to shielding. This gave them a very welcome contact with others in a similar position. It also contained lots of useful contact numbers. We had quite a big take up and suddenly the scheme started to enlarge and other groups in the village came on board.

The Village Pantry (foodbank):

The village hall became the home of Brigstock Pantry. It was becoming evident by then that some families were struggling financially. The aim of the Pantry was, and still is, to provide groceries and other essential items to those in need. As well as store cupboard foods and essentials, cash was also donated by village folk. At the end of each day, the newly opened Bake & Brew tea shop gifted unsold bread and cakes, which was distributed to elderly residents who were isolating.

Brigstock in Lockdown - cont'd

Special treats for those isolating:

The Volunteer group then decided to widen its activities and give gifts to people who were isolating. Villagers named it "The Gift Fairy". Villagers donated items and cash. These were nicely presented in gift bags and were very much appreciated by those who received them.

Village Initiatives

Brigstock residents have pulled together in an amazing way. Some of these initiatives will continue

Supporting Local Charities:

Not leaving the village became everyday life for most people. Gradually other stalls started to spring up in the village. It started off with knitted rainbows which were sold for a Dementia charity.

As people were not leaving the village to avoid unnecessary car journeys the village became ever resourceful. People had time to have a clear out. With charity shops and the local tip closed, stalls starting springing up on driveways. Most of these were either given away or to raise money for various charities. To date £7,797 has been raised for local charities and £757 for much needed funds for our two churches. One could buy plants, books jigsaw puzzles, jam, marmalade and bric-a-brac.

Craft Project for everyone:

One enterprising villager then started a CD weaving project to make a wall hanging for the village hall. Weaving packs was provided, or you could design your own. The idea was to weave onto a CD or create your own design to depict your lockdown experience. More than 100 have been produced by boys, girls, ladies and even the men got involved. This now hangs in Brigstock Village Hall.

Scrabble Competition:

A very elderly resident set up two Scrabble competitions which could be done alone, and the answers submitted. Money raised was given to Brigstock School.

Brigstock in Lockdown - cont'd

VE Day Celebrations:

By VE Day the village needed some light relief and what a great day it was. One street decided to hold a Street Party and by the end of the day there were other street parties planned around the village. The volunteer Group went and sang to the elderly folk outside the sheltered accommodation and another street held a bucket collection for the British Legion. One enterprising street made cakes, which were sold to raise money for a local hospice.

Yarn Bombing:

The Knit and Natter group made knitted flowers for the planned church Umbrella Festival. Due to lockdown the festival is postponed until next year. With flowers already made for their display, the group decided to put the flowers to good use and decorate the village square to cheer people up, with well received feedback from residents.

Supporting the NHS

The village came together to show their support for the NHS in many different ways

Scrub Bags, Knitted Hearts and Face Masks:

The knit and natter group sprang into action

n immediately, making scrub bags for local nurses. They also knitted hearts for KGH intensive care units. They have since turned to making masks. Some have been sold to raise funds for local charities and some were given to the Brigstock Pantry to hand out to those in need.

Knitted Nurses:

Several villagers made knitted nurses, which were placed around the village in recognition of their work.

Community Clapping:

Thursday night clapping became a ritual as to which street could make the most noise. One of the clapping nights, the local Co-op store invited villagers to social distance along the high street. All the staff came out and sang in praise of the key workers, which was captured on video.

On a separate occasion, after the clapping, an organised sponsored head shave took place to raise funds via "Just Giving page" for the NHS. Two men and three very brave women took part with over £2,000 raised.

Brigstock in Lockdown - cont'd

Brigstock gardens look amazing this year or they did until the torrential downpours! With garden centres closed and travel restricted there was a mad scramble for plants. Lesley French and Jane Steward came to the rescue with their plants sales for charity. Well done Ladies.

A few other plant stalls sprung up and some villagers were giving away free garden produce. We seem to have had rather a glut of rhubarb and courgettes which seemed to spring up on several driveways with a help yourself notice!

Well done to everyone in the village for your hard work and friendship.

Knitted Hearts:

Sewing machines swapped for knitting needles as K&N ladies made knitted hearts to give to Covid patients at Kettering General.

Knitted nurses:

Little knitted nurses suddenly appeared around the village in support of our NHS workers. We received a lot of feedback from village folk seeing these little nurses appearing around the village.

Brigstock's Frontline staff:

One of our members even made one for our own frontline staff working at Brigstock doctor's surgery and another one for our Co-op store workers (dressed in their Co-op uniform) to thank them for their community support.



Flowers on the village square: With St Andrews Umbrella festival preparations well under way, our display spot picked and a mock-up already done, it seemed a shame to store the flowers away when the festival was postponed indefinitely. As we already yarn bomb the village at Christmas, one of our members thought it would be a great idea to varn bomb the village with the flowers we made for the festival, to put them to good use and cheer up people when they walk by.

At this time of year, we are normally planning our advent window, the new items we want to knit for the Christmas (do I dare mention the word) yarn bombing and thinking about the poppy display for November. When we closed in March, we thought it would only be for a short time, but with so few parents wanting their children to come back once we could open, it was not possible due to staffing issues.

May Day Celebrations in Brigstock

Yes, I know, Autumn doesn't usually spring to mind as the most appropriate time to mention May Day! However I wanted to take this opportunity to thank everyone who has contacted me and contributed to filling in the names of Brigstock School's May Day Queens and let you all know what has developed so far.

After the initial urgency to establish home learning and new routines had subsided the opportunity arose for me to spend a bit of time examining and tidying up the School archive including the May Day records. I say "records" in the widest possible sense. I was surprised and horrified to find that very few written details exist – most evidence is confined to a few dodgy photos and yellowed newspaper cuttings, generally un-dated. It proved a much greater challenge to unravel than I expected – especially in isolation without a team of ex-pupils and local historians around the kitchen table.

It seems that May Day has been such an integral part of school and village life that few have considered it necessary to write anything down. Have those involved always thought it was, a) so important that no-one would forget, or b) irrelevant to record names as the event itself was the most significant thing? Discuss!

Even the Headmasters (yes, all men until 2017!) daily logbook, which often appears to have been their main preoccupation in those wild days before computerisation, the National Curriculum and OFSTED, often merely says 'Today was May Day'. Obviously never occurred to them to write down the name of the main player, the May Queen! To be fair, even in the last 20 years since I have worked at school we haven't consistently recorded any details and rely on collective memory — which I can confirm is fraught with contradiction and controversy.

Anyway, thanks to the valiant efforts of those who raided their lofts, rifled through their sideboards and argued with their families and old classmates, the basis of a more detailed record of May Queens (and Kings) since 1930 now exists. The 70's, 80's and 10's are allegedly complete, the 30's and 40's sparse and the 50's, 60's, 90's and 00's each half done. As you can see there remains ample opportunity for those young and old to add to this interesting and locally important archive and resource. I hope that when we finally have the opportunity to safely celebrate the 400 year anniversary of Brigstock Lathams School this information will form a substantial feature for all to examine and amend.

Chris was ably assisted by David Stuart who put his horticultural skills to good use and sourced the plants and kindly planted them up. Our grateful thanks to both Chris and David and the village volunteers who are deadheading and watering the plants.



3rd Village Planter – can you help?

Our grateful thanks to <u>Brigstock Sawmill</u> who have recently donated some railway sleepers so that we can put another planter in the village to enhance its appearance. Thanks again to Chris and Dave who have volunteered their services and will be busy again putting it together. Again, with guidance from Highways Dept, the new planter is being constructed at the grassy area on Grafton/Sudborough Road.

<u>We have a slight problem</u> (this is where you might be able to help). When we purchased the two new Brigstock signs, we had no idea that we would be building another planter therefore we have run out of funds. Due to lockdown there has been no further meetings of the project group.

We need £180 to purchase planter fixings, stain, topsoil and plants and to purchase bulbs for all three. We hoping to hold a fundraising coffee morning, but of course this is not possible yet. Fermyn Woods Country Park

Well what a strange year it has been, because due to Covid 19 the Country Park and Café was closed from mid-March to mid-May. But that did not stop the Ranger team as we carried on with day to day maintenance round the park of mowing, strimming, general repairs, putting woodchip round all the equipment in the main playarea and much more. The wildlife enjoyed the break from people in the park, - the birds seemed to sing louder and the rabbits were more visible.

We had our usual suspect of butterflies this year of Marbled Whites, Meadow Browns, Ringlets, Silver Washed Fritillaries, Dingy and Grizzled Skippers to name but a few. Due to the dry weather during May there were not so many Dingy and Grizzled Skippers this year. Purple Emperor numbers were also down this season both here and at other sites it is found across the country. It is thought the cold spell we had at the beginning of June and the high winds is the cause of the low numbers.

The Frogs and Toads left spawn in the fishing pond and in many of the ditches and small ponds in the Forestry but were only seen on their big migration to the ponds for a couple of days. The Long Pond had a good number of Newts who could be seen rising to the surface to breath for quite a long period. These were all helped by the very wet winter and spring which raised all the water levels up to where they had not been seen for several years.

The park reopened mid-May and has been the busiest it has been for a long time with people wanting to be outdoors and people discovering the park for the first time. Unfortunately there has been an increase in litter not just at all the Country Parks but at all parks, national parks, beaches and any green space nationwide, which is a shame. Please remember the country code and take your rubbish home and where possible recycle it. Put a carrier bag in you back pack, pocket or car and put your rubbish in that, - litter can be very harmful for wildlife and spoils it for the rest of the people using the park.

The Skylark Café reopened in June for takeaway teas, coffees, cake, sausage rolls, ice cream and more, so check the boards by the café for more options. Again the café has been well supported since it reopened and has been extremely busy.

Fermyn Woods Country Park Cont'd

The wildflowers put on a good show we had Oxeye Daisies, Knapweed, Meadow Sweet, Hedge Bedstraw, Pyramidal, Common Spotted and Bee Orchids, Viper Bugloss and Birds Foot Trefoil to name but a few.

Also it has been a good season for birds round the park - all the summer migrants of Cuckoo, Willow and Garden Warbler, Blackcap, Chiffchaff and Whitethroat to name a few all returned to breed. The Red Kites put on a good display when a park visitor left bread scraps on a picnic table. They were coming down very low and putting on some good aerial displays that would make the red arrows jealous!

Please remember when you are visiting the park to observe social distancing guidelines. The Rangers.

DIPHTHERIA IN BRIGSTOCK 1902

In the summer of 1902 an outbreak of diphtheria occurred at Brigstock. This highly infectious disease, which has today been virtually eliminated from Britain by routine inoculation, is particularly dangerous to children and, as late as the 1930s, was responsible for between three and four thousand deaths a year in this country.

An emergency meeting of Thrapston Rural Council called on August 20th to decide what action should be taken to deal with the situation was attended by Councillors F. J. Steward and J. H. Nicholls of Brigstock. The report of the meeting, which appears in the Kettering Leader, illustrates some of the difficulties faced by local authorities in coping with health matters, for it shows clearly that they had a great deal of responsibility for the provision of all necessary facilities for the treatment of the disease.

Dr Elliott, the Medical Officer of Health, stated to the Council that on August 6th he had been notified by Dr Stokes of two cases of diphtheria and that both had since died. Two days later five more cases had been reported. (One of the two girls who died was Florrie Swan, sister of Mrs W. Spencer). Dr Elliott had then visited Brigstock and found several more cases of sore throats which in his opinion were probably mild attacks. He also reported unfavourably on the sanitary conditions in Brigstock Schools. The report says 'The drains were bad and had been frequently condemned but nothing had been done, the schools were overcrowded, the closets were in fair condition but fowls were kept in a portion of disused closets which he considered should not be allowed.'

Attendance at Latham's school was so poor on August 6th that the remaining children were sent home and the school did not re-open for five weeks when it was recorded in the school log that two girls in Class 1 had died in the summer holidays.

The Council considered that it was essential to isolate the five children who had contracted the disease if that was possible. For this purpose, Brigstock Council had in their possession a hospital tent but, when examined, it was discovered that, although it was supposed to hold four beds, it was, in fact, only able to accommodate two. This awkward situation was alleviated by Mr Beeby who offered 'free of charge, a suitable building which had accommodation far in excess of the hospital tent.' (This was a stone outbuilding adjacent to the Homestead in Park Walk). Mr Gardiner Muir of Fermyn

Woods also helped by offering to guarantee payment for two nurses engaged to look after the sick. These nurses were local women volunteers, one of whom is thought to have been Biddy Eeet. The Councillors agreed that 'given these provisions, the best that could be hoped for in the circumstances, every inducement should be given for the patients to go to the hospital.' In an angry letter to the 'Leader' on August 29th Rev J. P. Sandlands, vicar of Brigstock, describes the distress caused to parents and children by these 'inducements'. 'They have five children in an outhouse one of whom was forcibly taken crying and screaming from his frantic mother.'

Although the isolation ward and the nurses had been provided for by members of the local community, the doctor's bills still had to be paid. One of the Councillors, Mr Jellis, inquired whether those in a position to do so should pay.

The Clerk to the Council clarified the position by reading an extract from the appropriate Act of Parliament which made it clear that payment could be forced by the Council who were the sole judges of who should pay and who should receive free treatment, again emphasizing how much power and responsibility was vested in the local authority. Whether or not any of the parents of the unfortunate victims of the disease were made to pay for the treatment is not known.

The only specific, effective treatment for diphtheria is an anti-toxin injection. This was available in 1902 as Dr Elliott pointed out to the Council, stating that, in German hospitals, the mortality rate had been halved in the 1890s by the use of anti-toxin. Vaccination was a controversial issue at this time and the Council was noticeably wary about recommending its use, and decided that 'the question of its employment should be left to medical men.' It is unlikely that it was administered to the patients in the isolation hospital but, interestingly, it was used in Brigstock at this time. Mr Fred Swan, an employee on the Fermyn Woods Estate, had lost four children in the disastrous diphtheria outbreak of 1893, and one girl, Florrie, in the outbreak of 1902. An agent on the estate, Mr Lake, who was acquainted with Mr Swan, obtained a supply of anti-toxin at his own expense from London which was given to the surviving children of Mr and Mrs Swan.

Winnie Swan, now Mrs Spencer, still remembers being injected in the thigh with the serum and is still grateful to Mr Lake whose generosity she feels may have saved her life and that of her brother.

DIPHTHERIA IN BRIGSTOCK 1902 - Cont'd

While the diphtheria outbreak in Brigstock may be a relatively small incident on the national scale, it does bring home to us how much the standards of healthcare have improved over the century, and emphasises the importance of the central organisation and financing of hospital services and other health facilities which has enabled the great advances in treatment methods to be made available to all, whether they be rich or poor, or live in a city or a village. It may also temper the nostalgia many of us tend to feel for the 'good old days' of the Edwardian era.

BRIGSTOCK ARCHAEOLOGICAL GROUP

For many of us, life has been turned upside down in recent months. Somewhere below – possibly beneath your very feet as you read this – lies evidence of history repeating itself.

Written records tell us how Brigstock was significantly impacted by past pandemics in the late medieval through to the early modern periods. We know less about the physical proof of this though. Abandoned



or repurposed properties, declining volumes of material associated with human occupation and environmental archaeology would all help to support our understanding of how the village's population declined over several centuries.

But BAG's embryonic plans to shine more light on this continue – like those of so many community groups – to be overshadowed by Covid-19. Whether we can safely resume any kind of activities programme in 2020; when we can meet face to face again; if there's any point taking out the insurance that membership subs can now cover – we don't yet know the answers to such questions.

However, one of the positives that the 'new normal' has thrown up for many of us is how effective modern tech can be at connecting us and sharing information. So, while **Zoom** can't give us a hug or buy a pint down the Green Dragon, it will let us begin meeting virtually to discuss what we can, should and want to do in the months ahead and into 2021.

We've yet to finalise the date and details, but there's some sense aligning this with the next scheduled BAG meetings (that would be **7.30pm on 15**th **September or 20**th **October**). In the next few weeks, the working group will agree and email/WhatsApp details to existing members and post to Facebook.

You don't have to have a Facebook account to see this – just look BAG up and keep an eye on any new posts. Between us, we should also have enough Zoom experience to help anyone that's unfamiliar with the software to set it up and join the meeting.

We'll be taking a look at our first test-pit reports, sharing what we learned about the excavation process, discussing members' ongoing research and other ways that tech might offer innovative approaches for BAG to move forward. Would socially distanced fieldwalking or live streaming test-pit activities be possible, for example? Could Zoom offer a safer, cheaper, more convenient way to meet for some types of events in the long run? We look forward to covering all this and more with you at BAG's first Zoom event.

One final thought; in a millennium, perhaps future archaeologists will be puzzling over evidence of how the current pandemic showed up in Brigstock's archaeological record. Maybe a spike in insect populations found in organic samples from 2020 or less takeaway litter along busy road routes. Connectivity apps like Zoom could have such a profound impact on how we work and play in the long run that how communities work and develop might change entirely. And if all digital and written records of our time were lost, how would all this be explained from the archaeology?
