

Brigstock Support Network

Please do let us know if anyone is struggling with shopping, prescriptions or support of any kind. Assistance for travel to lakeside for Covid-19 vaccinations and hospital appointments is possible through Volunteer Action based in Oundle, subject to availability and with advance notice.

The biggest thank you is to everyone who came together and supported on 23rd December when the village was affected by sudden flooding. Over 5K was raised through a help page set up by Christopher Allan and this is now administered by the Consolidated Charity to help anyone affected.

The night of the flood and on many occasions it has become very obvious just how useful the Brigstock Information Facebook page and support Whats App group were. Thank you to Andre and everyone who has responded and provided assistance. What an amazing village we live in.

Brigstock Beer Festival 2021

After 15 consecutive years of the Brigstock Beer Festival (BBF) it was unfortunate that it was not possible to hold the festival last year due to the Covid pandemic. It is the ambition of the BBF committee to organise a festival for 2021, if the situation allows, so please keep your busy (?) diaries free for 17-19th September 2021. The plan is that the festival will have a Caribbean theme as it was felt that after 18 months of limited travel opportunity everybody might enjoy indulging in some different culture. Furthermore the Pharmacist on our committee has highlighted that there is good evidence that beer is a cure for coronavirus (blues).

BRIGSTOCK VILLAGE HALL FLOOD DISASTER

I think most of you know that the Village Hall was flooded on the Wednesday before Christmas.

We had a call mid-afternoon to say the river was rising and there could be risk of flooding. Several of the committee turned out to assess the situation and realising that the water was rising at a fast rate and not likely to stop in the near future. We quickly moved as much of the equipment upstairs or onto tables to get above a flood level. We tried to seal around some of the doors with tape but could not get round the side of the building as the water was by then about 3 foot deep and flowing fast.

We left the building about 6 o'clock we decided to turn off all the electrics and leave the building as the water was now about 12 inches deep in front of the door and flowing dangerously strongly across the car park to the Mill stream. We could not do anything else at that time. People were also out at other properties in trouble in the village especially at Harpers Court through the night.





We went back to the hall at 8am the next morning and found that the water level had dropped right down and had emptied from the building. On looking in the hall, we found that the water had been up to 14 inches deep and been throughout the whole ground floor. The water had brought in a large amount of silt which was now spread over all the floors. The wooden floor in the main hall had swollen and had blown and risen so that it looked more like a skateboard park!

We put out a call on the Village Facebook page for help. About 30 people turned up with mops, brushes and buckets to help. This was a great surprise and we cannot thank those who came to help enough

FLOOD DISASTER Cont'd

Within 2 hours we had done all we could, and closed up again. Volunteers then went to help around the village including removing debris from the river at the Manor and Harpers Court.

We contacted our insurance company and this started the recovery process. On the Tuesday after Christmas, the first dehumidifiers were installed and the builders started to strip the building. All the flooring has been removed including the wooden floor and the vinyl flooring on the ground floor. The plaster has been removed from all the ground floor walls up to 18 inches and a full drying programme has started.



Tenders are being sought by the Surveyor for the rebuild process and we hope that work will start on that in early March when the building has dried out. We will be getting new flooring throughout, kitchen base units replaced, new kitchen appliances, new gas heaters, toilet vanity units and cubicles replaced and new doors as well. The walls will be replastered and then decoration throughout.

Hopefully by June we should be opening with a completely refurbished building.

To try to prevent this happening again, we are seeking grants to cover the costs of installing flood protection methods to all the doors, airbricks and heater grills. Several applications are in for this, so we are hopeful that something comes up as the cost is in the region of £15,000 for the whole building.

We hope that we are back up and running by the time that lockdown is lifted and we can start using the hall to its full capacity. We will keep you informed on our progress in the next newsletter or on the Brigstock Village Information Facebook page.

Thanks for all your support and offers of help. These have been most appreciated by the committee.

A BIG THANK YOU

I think that this last year has seen the village and the residents at their best and makes you glad to live in such a great place.



Although most groups have not been able meet physically, there has been support for many in the village. This has ranged from the Village Pantry with donated food for those in need, zoom meetings for some groups and each street having a coordinator checking up on their neighbours to give support or doing their shopping and collecting prescriptions. Some people living alone just need that friendly wave at the window or a call.

The weekly clappings for the NHS and front line staff was enthusiastic during the first lockdowns which showed our support for others working at risk for us.



Then during the flood just before Christmas, the helpers came out again. Harpers Court had people there all night helping to move furniture and saving possessions from the rising water and then finding them places to stay in the short and long term. Then many were out on Christmas Eve and subsequent days aiding the cleaning of the village hall, clearing the brook of sofas, decking and other flotsam, and clearing the footpath past the church which was blocked by the fallen tree and the Manor wall. The residents of the several houses that were flooded also asked for help and this arrived swiftly. Offers of replacement furniture were made and a support fund started which is now being handled by the Brigstock Charity.

There has been amazing amount raised for various charities and some groups raising funds by providing goods that meant a trip out of the village was not necessary.

Volunteer drivers have continued taking residents to appointments and especially recently with the Covid jabs.

Several groups and organisations tried to bring a bit of cheer to the village with a Winter Wonderland, Advent Window and a Scarecrow Competition among other things.

The Brigstock Village Facebook page was an extra bonus that we have not had be-

fore and we thank admin for keeping it running. It has been invaluable

during lockdown and many more postings than normal. During the flooding instant access was made available so response was quick to requests.

Local businesses have played their part with donations and extra services and our surgery has stayed open for dispensing medicines despite themselves being a victim of the flooding.

I am sure that we would like to thank all those that have helped in anyway. There are too many to mention individually and I would be sure to miss many as well. It is also good to see that the effort that was made has been appreciated out of the Village. Several people in the village have received letters of thanks from the Lord Lieutenant of Northamptonshire for their hard work. Well deserved praise.

Let's keep this spirit of helpfulness as we hopefully come out this crisis and recover from a strange year and a wet winter. Spring and summer should bring new pleasures but probably more challenges that we will need to meet. Be ready to stand up again if needed.

BRIGSTOCK WI RECIPE

Fruit oat biscuits

Oat biscuits to make with children. This is a very easy recipe which children can make and have fun with.

Makes about 20 (depending on size of ball)

75gm /3oz plain flour

75gm/3oz sugar

75gm/3oz rolled oats

1/2 teaspoon bicarbonate of soda

75gm/3oz butter

1 tablespoon milk

1 tablespoon golden syrup

75gm/3oz mixed fruit

Preheat oven to 150c and Mix all dry ingredients together Melt butter, milk, syrup on heat and add to dry ingredients

Shape into balls on greased trays, flatten slightly

Bake for 25-30 minutes

Leave on trays for 3 minutes and then cool completely on racks.

Store in airtight container or eat.

The December Floods

Following the December floods, the Parish Council has been collecting information regarding how many of you were affected and the damage incurred. We have also been in contact with our MP Tom Pursglove who has been active on our behalf. Extracts from a letter from the Environment Agency are here below:

We will be working closely with Northamptonshire County Council because the flooding from Harpers Brook - affecting Brigstock, Sudborough and Lowick - met the thresholds for a formal Section 19 investigation under the Flood and Water Management Act. The Environment Agency also undertakes its own review after any river flooding incident to identify improvements and to recalibrate trigger levels of the flood warning system if required. Property Flood Resilience (PFR) includes barriers, water-tight doors and airbrick covers. The Environment Agency and Northamptonshire County Council can bid for Government funding to install PFR measures at residential properties.

We currently have a list of properties across the county where these measures will be installed. We will then look to develop a next phase of delivery and will include those properties in Brigstock on the list for consideration. We will consider existing flood risk mapping, as well as information gathered about flooding over Christmas 2020, to assess whether PFR measures are appropriate at the affected properties. We expect to be able to look at the next properties for installation during summer 2021.

This is fairly positive news for those affected and we hope to have an open

meeting to discuss ways forward once the flood report has been made public which must take place within 6 months. The PC is involved with a group called a Partnership Approach to Catchment Area Management coordinated by the Nene Valley Regional Park.



PARISH COUNCIL

Parish councils affected by flooding meet with representatives from the Environment Agency, NFU, NCC and others to get a clearer understanding of the causes of the flooding and what can be done. For instance, we are looking to engage landowners in installing flood mitigation measures including leaky dams, attenuation ponds etc.

Thank you to all of you who helped those affected by the floodwater, particularly the volunteers who were down at Harper's Court and arranged evacuation for residents. We had very little warning of the flood so we had to act swiftly, and, in spite of Covid 19, everyone was helped to safety.

FUTURE POLICIES AND ELECTIONS

Thank you too to those of you who helpfully responded to our request for future priorities for the Parish Council. These will be discussed and actioned as necessary.

Now that the vaccine is being rolled out we can look forward to a less stressful year ahead. The local elections are scheduled to take place in May so, if you are interested in joining the Parish Council, watch out for details.

Finally, we are pleased to report that the streetlights are now powered by 100% green energy.

VILLAGE PARKING

Parking in the village is always a problem. To help with this the PC is costing a scheme to provide extra parking places outside the school next to the postbox on Bridge Street. We would also have the opportunity to tidy up this important space in the heart of the village. This will be a costly project but one that we feel is well worth doing if we can get funding. Watch this space!

Fermyn Woods Country Park

What changeable weather it has been, starting with the heavy rain and flooding just before Christmas and then snow. All the culverts round the park have not stopped flowing with water coming off the woods making all the ponds nice and full. Whilst out on a site patrol one wet day I happened to come across a Kingfisher looking for his dinner in long pond which was nice to see on a dull winters day.

Despite the weather and other things, we have been getting on well with our winter habitat work with help from volunteers we have: -

Cleared overgrown scrub down some banks on the plateau opening it up and also exposing ponds that have become lost in the undergrowth.

We have been making some wildlife corridors around the park to help the wildlife move between habitats.

Brushcut and rake off areas that are good for wildflowers which then in turn attract insects and butterflies in spring/summer.

Removed dead and dying Blackthorn in Little thicket to open up the path, create a bit of a glade but also to allow the Blackthorn to grow back better as due to overcrowding the trees were leaning nearly horizontal where they have tried to find what light they could.

To mention just a few of the tasks we have been doing this winter.

When you are walking round the park why not download the Froglife Dragon finder app which will help you identify adult reptiles and amphibians as well as their eggs, larvae and calls. Submit your records quickly and easily using the recording form'. https://www.froglife.org/dragonfinder/app/

BRIGSTOCK ARCHAEOLOGICAL GROUP

Time to meet! As this newsletter goes to press, we're still in the dark about when and how lockdown will end. BRIGSTOCK'S ROMAN ROAD

There is a lost piece of Roman Road in Brigstock Parish. It is probably about 2 -3 feet down but there must be some sign of it somewhere. The road is called the Garetree Road and went from Godmanchester to Leicester, and joined three other famous roads; Ermine Way, Fosse Way and Watling Street.

Except for the Brigstock Gap, it can be followed for most of its 45 miles either as the line of present day roads, footpaths, hedges or crop marks. In some places the agger or embankment on which the road was built can clearly be seen. The remains of the wooden bridge where the road crossed the Nene have been found in gravel workings at Islip in 1967.

The line of the road is quite clear from Alconbury Weston to Titchmarsh where there was a roman settlement, and then through the woods north of Sudborough to Cats Head Wood. Then the line disappears and until it has been found at Stanion Lodge, through Little Stanion, Corby, Cottingham, Medbourne and on to Leicester. Much can be identified from OS maps.

Roman roads are well known to be built in straight lines, but there must be a bend in the line for the two sections to join. The obvious place for a bend would be where the road crosses Harpers Brook.

This would be possibly just to the west of the CTS lorry yard and then heading towards Park Walk, crossing Dusthill Road somewhere and across the fields to Stanion.

The roads were often constructed using material excavated from the two edge ditches and piled into the road. They could be up to 15 metres wide and could have been raised above the surrounding land. Just before Christmas two of the committee went to inspect an archaeological dig being carried out in Olney on a development site. They had found a roman road crossing their site and excavated the ditches and a section through it. The actual road was constructed with sand and gravel in several layers with dirt in between them. It was quite hard to see and without a clear section, it could easily have been missed. Perhaps sections have been dug up in the Brigstock but not noticed.

The Archaeological Group are looking into this and carrying out more research to see if we can solve the mystery.
