



BRIGSTOCK VILLAGE HALL RECOVERY.

In the last Newsletter, we were waiting for the main contractor to start work. The firm, Norray Joinery Ltd, started by appointing the subcontractors for the hall flooring, gas heaters, kitchen fitout and the flooring for the rest of the downstairs.

The walls were replastered, new doors and frames replaced, the electrics replaced by our electrician, Steve Bennett, the toilets rebuilt with new cubicles, sink units and tiling, and then complete decorating downstairs. The new kitchen units were installed and a new cooker, dishwasher, fridge and hot cupboard delivered. We also had a new wooden floor to

match the previous one laid. This is looking great. This took 9 weeks to complete within the contract period and we opened just in time for the Parish Council meeting in May.



During the closedown

period, we had all the interior lighting replaced with high efficiency LED lights. This was funded by several grants that we have been lucky to gain.



We also had a grant from FCC Communities for the improvement of the rear area behind the Hall which was the Playgroup area and will become a block paved seating area. There will also be a wooden gazebo to give a sheltered space.

To protect the building from future flooding we have been given 3 grants towards flood protection measures. These will be for flood boards to protect the 6 outside doors, removable covers for the air bricks and covers for the gas vents. We hope this will stop water coming into the building when the levels rise as long as there are not other entry points that we have not found.

We also intend to install disabled access to the rear doors via the side entrance. This will be complete by September hopefully.

When the last newsletter was produced, back in March, we had no idea that our lives would still be restricted, probably well into July. What a strange time the first half of this year has been. Apart from very dry, then very wet weather, we have had late frosts and a bit of a heatwave. It's amazing that our gardens manage to survive all these changes and, at the moment, everything seems to be blooming better than ever. We have also had a brilliant vaccination programme throughout the country and it certainly seems to have worked, with numbers of people infected or dying from Covid falling dramatically-until recently. But things have changed again and now we have to continue being more careful and keeping various aspects of our lives on hold again. Some people find it very difficult to be so restricted and are desperate to go away on holiday, and many businesses are still suffering.

We decided to open the chapel for Sunday worship at Easter as we have been able to maintain social distancing and accommodate people safely, and it has been great to welcome everyone back, plus several new faces too. It's such a shame that we still can't sing, but hopefully that restriction might be eased in July. However, we are still not able to open up the June Small room for the regular clubs that meet there, and it seems such a shame to see it empty all the time. We can, however, do some fundraising now, and by the time you read this we will have held our socially-distanced Midsummer Fair. We do enjoy these occasions because we meet up with so many members of the community, enjoy their company and raise muchneeded funds for the chapel. We are optimistically planning a barn dance in the Village Hall on October 15th and really hope we can hold our popular Christmas Coffee morning again on December 4th.

Hopefully, all the groups who use the June Small room will be back with us in the late summer. The June Small room was used for the local elections in May, and for those of you who were seeing it for the first time, it is available for hire (when restrictions are lifted) for £5 per hour. It is ideal for small parties and interest groups, and we do have facilities for disabled people and a wheelchair that can be borrowed by anyone for hospital visits etc.

Meanwhile, enjoy the sunshine, (it is very warm while I'm writing this and I hope it continues!), stay safe and make the most of the lovely walks around our village. Sometimes we forget how lucky we are to live in such an attractive, friendly place.

Cpl Tom Packwood: A Brigstock D-Day War Hero

On June 6th, the 77th anniversary of the D-Day landings an impressive new memorial was officially opened in Normandy, commemorating more than 22,000 British Servicemen and women who died in that conflict. The success of the operation was made possible by the heroic actions of some hand-picked elite troops who landed in France before the main landings, among them, Cpl Tom Packwood of Brigstock, who served in 2nd Airborne Battalion of the Oxfordshire and Buckinghamshire Light Infantry. This is his eye-witness account in his own words of a daring operation to capture vital bridges over the River Orne and the Caen Canal which was published in the Kettering Leader and Guardian on Friday October 27th1944

How Red Devils Took Orne Bridges.

Our force consisted of six gliders containing 180 men in all, 25 assault troops and five sappers in each glider. Our task was to capture intact these two important bridges and hold them until relieved by airborne forces, thus preventing the Germans from sending reinforcements from the Caen area to endanger the seaboard landings. Our platoon was to land three gliders on each bridge, although from information and aerial photographs we knew the canal bridge was the most heavily defended. It was thought that, owing to the small landing area, it would be impossible to land above three.

The operation entailed weeks of intense training in the country on bridges similar to the two we had to take. Every glider load had to know six different jobs in case one did not arrive (which unfortunately did happen) or, in the case of unforeseen circumstances, we did not land in the order laid down.

Our small force took off from a south of England airfield at 11pm on June 5th. The crossing was quite smooth and spirits were high, although after crossing the French coast, there reigned a tense silence, each one busy checking up his kit for the last time. The thoughts of us all, I feel sure, were "what sort of reception should we get". We all knew that if we failed thousands of men's lives coming by sea would be endangered, but we did not mean to fail.

We cast off at 6000 feet about five miles from our objective. Our tugs, which were also carrying bombs, flew on to make a diversion elsewhere so as not to give our position away.

Our landing field we knew would be rough, so everyone prepared himself for a shock to come. It came, we lost one wheel but still skidded on crashing through a woodpile and at last finishing with our nose through a fence about 20 yards from the road which ran over the bridge. I should like to point out that we had the best glider pilots they could produce. They had done their job; now we had to do ours.

The first glider's job was to get over to the other side of the bridge and put out of commission two machine guns, which would play havoc with the rest of the landing force. We rushed those machine guns but a few of our small number fell, being caught in the murderous crossfire. Anyway we eventually got the bridge and sat down in the German position to wait for the counter attack, which we knew would come from a small village about half a mile away. It did. The first to arrive were two armoured ammunition cars. These were soon non-existent, thanks to Piat. We were then treated to a beautiful firework display which lasted until daylight.

I forgot to mention that we landed at five minutes past midnight on June 6th, about six hours before the seaborne landings started. By daylight we were reinforced by a few more paratroops and with these we beat off 12 small counter attacks in 17 hours when we were eventually relieved by the Commandos, who had a rough time trying to reach us. The Germans, now fully awake to what was happening sent two gunboats up the canal to amuse us. One of these the Piat dealt with and the other was put out by a German anti-tank gun they forgot to remove

As a memorial to the men who fell on that bridge it is now called Pegasus Bridge after our badge.

Pegasus: the winged horse. The badge of the British Airborne Forces

The original Pegasus bridge can be still be seen at Memorial Pegasus, the Airborne Forces museum on the bank of the Caen canal.

The children were Caroline Katie Brown born 26 Nov 1886 and died 15 October 1893 and George William Brown born 31 Dec 1888 and died 17 October 1893

The parents William Brown and Harriet Elizabeth Brown nee Avil (Avel) were both devastated by their young children's death and the death certificates say William Brown was at the death of both children.

William was from Brigstock and Harriet from Hardingstone and their children were born in Brigstock.

Family say that the children were buried and lime put in the grave(s) because of the infection. I cannot find out where they are buried. Might it have been in an institution or isolation hospital?

Their death certificates say died Brigstock R. S. and what looks like an D or G and their deaths were certified by Arth. S. Stokes and Joseph Baines was the Registrar.

Can anyone help with this mystery of the missing children's grave(s)?

According to the met office April was one of the driest Aprils since the 1920's and May was one of the coldest and wettest. Due to this spring was late which has affected the breeding season for many birds and delayed a lot of the wildflowers. The blue tits in the café nest box hatched 8 chicks but unfortunately because of the weather only one survived and successfully fledged.

We opened our new playarea just before the Easter holidays, named the butterfly pit. It has been extremely popular with the public, and with help from our volunteers we have installed a raised bed which has been planted with many insect attracting plants.

Like with the birds and wildflowers, the butterflies also struggled at the beginning of spring but by May half term they started to pick up with Dingy and Grizzled Skippers spotted along with common blue, orange-tip and speckled wood to name but a few. Other wildlife in the park worth mentioning is Cuckoo, Blackcap, Willow Warbler, Chiffchaff and Whitethroat to name but a few of the summer migrants we have here. There has been a Brown hare spotted in the park and along the purple route and we quite often have Ravens fly over the park.

With help from the friends group and a grant from FCC Landfill Tax monies ,we have two wooden sculptures to go out in the park - one of a lizard and one of a newt that were done by the woodcarver Tony Langston. These will be placed out in the park in the near future for all to enjoy and will be followed by further sculptures over the summer as they are carved.

As you walk round the park you might see black sheeting in certain areas, these are reptile refugia. They have been donated to us by Froglife for us to be able to survey what reptiles we have in the park and in what numbers. They are in key areas that get the sun so they can heat up and be used by lizards or snakes to bask and raise their body temperatures which they need to do to be able to function due to them being cold blooded. It also allows us to be able attract them to one place so we can record our findings and share them with Froglife.

Please enjoy the park, and remember to take your rubbish away and leave the park clear for others.

BRIGSTOCK ARCHAEOLOGICAL GROUP

Cautious roll out continues for our 2021 activities programme, and we continue to build on each new experience. To find the right balance between what is archaeologically rigorous with what is enjoyable, we've trialled three different approaches to fieldwalking so far this year. What have we learned?

The most formal – marking out stints and transects with flags – is by far the most time-consuming method. It also recovered less interesting material from a field off Dusthill Road than our more informal approach off Grafton Road. There we used furrows as guides and recorded one GPS location for finds within a five-metre radius, turning up a handful of what appear to be Roman greyware and Nene Valley Colour-coated Ware sherds. This discrepancy is certainly a factor of our choice of fields and perhaps how agriculture impacts the archaeological record.

The least formal was the least productive as we had permission to walk fields with a mixed, partly-rotted non-food crop that, despite initial appearances, turned out to be too dense even for pre-survey purposes. All of which serves to underline the importance of thorough fieldwalking preparation and is already steering our plans for more surveying after harvesting this Autumn. So, initial research and scouting fields ahead of survey can help select more interesting fields, which in turn suggest sites for full surveys. None of which actually guarantees we'll find anything recognisably significant, but that's archaeology.

The abundance of post-medieval ceramic building material (CBM) and almost total lack of ceramic vessel sherds from our most systematic survey might seem surprising – disappointing even – given nearby fields turned in some interesting Iron Age and Roman finds during Foster's surveys some 30 years ago. Our site was under pasture at that time, so BAG's was possibly the first formal research.

Yet it seems the only notable 'find' was a roughly circular feature of darkened earth around 35m in diameter that may relate to a charcoal platform Foster excavated in a nearby field. It could be more evidence of the industry that Foard's Extensive Urban Survey of Brigstock (2000) suggested deserves 'high priority' research to better understand the relationship between markets and production in the parish.

BRIGSTOCK ARCHAEOLOGICAL GROUP - cont'd

It was always unlikely that we'd just happen to find compelling new archaeological evidence in the very first survey of a series of linked fields transecting the projected route of the 'missing' section of the Gartree Roman Road. But perhaps what we did – or didn't – find could be explained by agricultural activities. Repurposed brick from demolished livestock buildings, centuries of muck and a move away from deep ploughing might easily leave early deposits untouched and invisible to us. Another archaeology 101 - absence of evidence is not evidence of absence.

With this in mind, we expect to return to surveying when harrowing provides optimum visibility for fieldwalking, and we'll be exploring a fourth approach that we hope will offer greater speed and convenience to make it enjoyable while maintaining validity and allowing us to cover more ground systematically.

In the meanwhile, we continue to consult commercial archaeological units for advice (fingers crossed C-19 doesn't delay our ceramics workshop into 2022) and specialist interest groups such as the Roman Road Research Association to give us a better understanding of what to look for and how to interpret what we find. By the time you read this, we also hope to have initiated some test-pitting exercises starting in a property on High Street where there was a wheel wrights workshop and forge. Results will be published in the next edition.

BAG also continues to build its own QGIS map of the parish using data from the Historic Environmental Record (HER) at the county archives and other archaeological data is increasingly becoming available online, so this can only help to improve our planning. But we are essentially a group of interested amateurs still learning how to access and interpret available resources to inform our activities and develop core skills so we better understand our shared past.

BRIGSTOCK FLOODING

I am sure that you are all aware that the village suffered flooding to several properties which were situated along Harpers Brook.

Harpers Brook starts above Corby and drains a large area of countryside before it reached Brigstock. It discharges into the River Nene near Aldwinck-le. On December 23rd, after a long wet autumn and after 2 days of heavy rain when we had about 2 inches onto a saturated catchment, the Brook rose to a level not seen for over 20 years. The river started to rise about lunchtime and by 6pm it was out of bank and flooding the surrounding fields and village properties. The problems to the village hall have been well documented and it has taken nearly 6 months to get to reinstated to its original condition.

Several other properties were also affected including Harpers Court and the Church Walk was washed out and still waits to be repaired.

On 21st June, the Parish Council met with representatives of the Environment Agency and JB Associates to assess what happened and how properties were inundated. There was a walk round the village so that they could assess the problem and see where problems exist with the Brook and local drainage. They are also looking at any obstructions or local improvements that need attention to ensure that the Brook flow is not impeded.

Any solution will be complicated as it needs to look at the full catchment. Is it possible to reduce flows down the river by using flood storage in the town or in agricultural land upstream of Brigstock. This would need the agreement of landowners and funding towards these mitigation measures.

Hopefully if your property was flooded, you did get a visit from the Engineers. If not. Talk to Sally Wilks who is liaising with the team.

Also note that if you own land adjacent to the Brook you have riparian responsibilities to maintain your bank and cannot carry out work within 8 metres of the bank without Environment Agency permission.

This process could take several years to complete, if a solution can be found.

If you see any problems with the river, let the Parish Council or the Environment Agency know via their action line.

See elsewhere in the newsletter where the Parish council need a flood warden to help during floods.

It needs all of us to keep an eye out and watch for problems before they hit.

WI Recipe for Vegan Victoria Sponge by Janet Oldham

Ingredients for sponge cake

400gm Self raising flour

11/4 tsp bicarbonate of soda

250gm caster sugar

115mls sunflower oil

400mls dairy free milk (almond, soya or oat)

3 tbsp golden syrup

1 tsp vanilla extract

Ingredients for Vegan buttercream

200gm dairy free spread, such as vitalife

175gms icing sugar

1 tsp vanilla extract

4 tbsp strawberry jam

150gms strawberries halved to decorate

Method

Preheat oven gas4 180c fan,160c

Grease, and line 2x23cm or 9inch tins

Sift flour, bicarbonate of soda and sugar into mixing bowl. Mix all together

Whisk together sunflower oil, milk, syrup and vanilla in another bowl

Then pour into dry ingredients. Whisk using hand blender until thick and creamy

Spoon into cake tins.

Bake 35- 40 minutes until risen and cooked through. Remove from oven, leave to cool

Make the butter cream filling. Beat together the dairy free spread, icing sugar and vanilla

When cakes are completely cold, spread one with jam the other with cream. Put both together.

Then decorate the top with strawberries - Delicious
