Having enjoyed lovely weather for most of the weekend Sunday was cold and wet so unfortunately the planned picnic on the Meadow was




the Meadow was cancelled. A few of us took our lunch along to

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### Sheila Chalmers: Brigstock's Jubilee Queen

Brigstock enjoyed a very successful weekend of celebrations in June to mark Queen Elizabeth's Platinum Jubilee. As part of the celebrations a Jubilee Queen was chosen for the village and Sheila Chalmers, one of the oldest residents, was selected and, although a bit reluctant at first, she agreed to take on the role and enjoyed her day in the limelight. On the day she enjoyed a drive, in style, from her home in Barnard's Way to Hall Hill in a Jaguar saloon, courtesy of Nigel Searle. On the Market Cross she was crowned by the Parish Council Chair, Margaret Smith, and then presided over maypole dancing, which was open to anybody who fancied taking part. Later she had a walk round the stalls on the street market and visited the URC church to see the interesting exhibition of historical photographs of Brigstock. Sheila was presented with a bunch of flowers, a box of chocolates and a necklace which she really appreciated.

Sheila, nee Beasley, was born in Brigstock on the 22<sup>nd</sup> of August 1930, the middle child of five, one sister Betty and three brothers, John, Malcolm and Richard. Her father was a cattle dealer who made regular trips to Ireland to buy stock which he brought over to England. The family lived in a house at the top of Bridge Street which is no longer there as it was demolished, along with those of their neighbours so that an extension to the school could be built. She then moved to the house in Barnard's Way in 1960, where she has lived ever since.

She attended Brigstock School and the teachers she remembers are Mrs Palmer, who taught the infants, Miss James, music and the headmaster at that time, Mr Tomlinson. She recalls the big changes that came about in school life when child evacuees arrived during the war years, mostly from London, which meant that at one stage there were twice as many evacuees as village children. The number of pupils in each class went up, with the evacuees and village children mixed together, and extra classrooms were set up at the chapel and the conservative club in Back Lane.

Apart from the regular lessons Sheila recalls going out to collect rose hips to make rose hip syrup and everyone having two weeks off in the autumn to pick potatoes. At Christmas there were Christmas parties for the children at Fermyn Woods Hall and later, during the war years, at the American air base at Grafton and with the Czech soldiers based at the Mill, in Brigstock

Christmas at home was a much simpler occasion than today with not many presents, a stocking filled with nuts and an orange and goose rather than chicken for Christmas dinner. And in those days people didn't go on summer holidays as they do today. Sheila's first holiday away was a trip to Ireland when she was 19 to visit her father's relations.

Sheila left Brigstock school at aged 15 and started work in Greenlees shoe factory in Kettering, earning £3 a week of which six shillings went on bus fares and five shillings into a clothing club for dresses etc. But a bonus was that the weekly bus ticket included Saturday when she did not go to work. So it was possible to save the unused Saturday tickets and exchange them at the office and have a free week on the bus with money in her pocket to spend on other things. Entertainment was a dance every Saturday at the mill in Brigstock, pictures in Kettering or Sunday and, on the free week, dancing at the Central Hall, Kettering or the Raven, Corby. After leaving the shoe factory Sheila worked on farms for a time and was a cleaner at the Green Dragon public house for twenty years.

Sheila has seen many changes in the village over the years. When she was growing up there were many more shops in Brigstock than nowadays and people could get everything they needed without leaving the village. There were even two midwives on hand locally. It was the usual thing to drop off the Sunday roast at Freeman's bakehouse on the High Street to be cooked then pick it up later maybe on the way back from church. Everybody knew everybody else which isn't the case today with people moving out and new people coming in all the time.

Sheila has some mobility problems these days but she keeps her mind very active doing crosswords, jigsaws, TV quizzes and also likes to watch tennis and horse racing on television. She used to be a regular at Sunnysiders and still attends the church service on Thursdays. Sheila feels very fortunate to have her daughter, Fiona , living with her. She is able to get out with Fiona in the car to go to the shops or other outings, including garden centres which she enjoys. Sheila maintains that living with someone younger helps to keep her young as well and I am sure that we all wish her a very happy 92<sup>nd</sup> birthday.

A couple of planned events had to be cancelled, one due to the weather being too hot. Who would have thought that could happen in this country?

Three very successful 2 hour Macrame workshops were held in Stanion Village Hall where 10 of us each week made something and learnt about macrame. Em Davies very kindly ran the workshops and provided all the materials, I grew the spider plants for the plant holders we made the first week. Thank you Em for doing this for Jordan's Weeones. In fact I grew so many spider plants I was able to donate some to a gentleman in Woodford who sells plants in aid of the NHS. His fb page is "David's Growing Plants for the NHS" if anyone wants to have a look.

Looking forward Jordan's Weeones will be holding an Autumn Craft Fair with bouncy castle, refreshments and hopefully the fire engine will be able to attend on Saturday October 8th. There will also be the biggest pumpkin and marrow competition at the Autumn Fair

We will also be holding either a raffle or another online auction October/ November with lots of Childrens toys so you can start Christmas Shopping.

Christmas brings Jordan's Weeones Enchanted Garden and Father Christmas again running on the 16th, 17th, 18th December. Father Christmas will again be free for Brigstock Children. If anyone is upgrading their Christmas tree I would be grateful for any old artificial ones which I can use in the garden.



The Parish Council continues to work hard on your behalf. Since the last edition of Brigstock News there has been steady progress with ongoing issues.

#### Sudborough Road Industrial Site

We have made a robust response to the developers' 44 page document explaining why it is not a foregone conclusion that such a site would be acceptable to the village.

#### Flooding

The Environment Agency is yet to complete its report which they continue to assure they are working on.

#### Solar Farms adjacent to Bullymore's Farm

Following a further presentation by Scottish Power, we feel confident that they are taking our concerns into consideration in their planning for construction of the site. The recent world focus on climate change certainly underlines the need for such sites. They have positioned the proposed battery storage construction such that it is hidden from the road and the village. Ahh, the agony and the ecstasy of archaeology! With our Hall Hill excavation still in progress as this newsletter goes to press, it's fair to say we're currently – frustratingly – a lot less clear about what we've found compared to the same stage of last year's



summer dig. Fascinating, relatable items like a brass huntmaster's button and a slightly-dented thimble have been mixed in with metalworking evidence, plenty of ceramic, and animal bone. Indeed, some interesting sherds some half-metre down might yet turn out to be significantly earlier than the Lyveden-Station Ware we can date to c1250-1450CE.

But so far, not much has emerged in the way of identifiable stratigraphy and features to offer context and help us interpret how our site was being used at different times. This lack of coherence may actually be the best clue we have to at least understand the later phases of activity. It's not surprising to find heavily disturbed upper layers in villages like Brigstock with a long history of occupation. However, as some keen gardeners may have noted, Brigstock's topsoil/subsoil isn't that deep in places – well under a metre in our previous two test-pits. So, it may be that a limestone surface we're presently revealing is in fact the final phase of this summer's dig.

If that's the case here, we're likely facing much the same issue as at our Bridge Street test-pit in July. The shallower the combined depth of topsoil/ subsoil, the more likely the soil matrices around our finds might be jumbled up and represent a completely different time and even place to where and when such artefacts were deposited. Before regular collection was established, refuse was often buried in garden pits, and manure and night soil (human waste) were used as fertilisers. Sometimes artefacts from the same spot hitched a ride to new places, some near and some far – and can subsequently frustrate archaeologists with seemingly random ceramic scatters in unexpected places.

Repeat this kind of activity over several centuries in a confined area like a village garden, and the archaeology can get very complicated to interpret. We may marvel at the material culture of Brigstock's past residents – the often-simple designs and careful crafting of everyday objects –

and contemplate what they meant to their historic owners, but we can rarely understand their full biographies. At best, archaeology like this summer's dig can sharpen the focus a little when seeing our history through a looking glass, darkly.

By the time you read this, we should have just about wrapped up our summer dig. Keep your eyes peeled for news of some focused fieldwalking in the Autumn.

# Fermyn Woods Country Park

According to the Met Office July was the driest July since 1935. During the extreme heat the ponds dried up or reduced in size, but we made sure there were areas for wildlife to get water. Because of the heat, I counted over 40 Purple Hairstreak butterflies that had come down to feed on minerals and what little moisture they could find on the ground. Usually they are found at the top of Oak trees.

Because of the extreme heat and risk of wildfires we band all BBQS from all North Northants country parks. And as I write this the summer holidays are in full swing with families coming to the park for a walk, play or ice cream from the café.

Apart from struggling in the warm weather there has been a lot of wildlife seen round the park, especially butterflies. It seems to have been a good year for Marbled Whites, Meadow Browns and Gatekeepers, but I have not heard what sort of season the Black Hairstreak or Purple Emperor have had.

I spotted a hummingbird hawkmoth flying on the purple route feeding on bramble flowers. They are an impressive moth to see - they are a small day-flying hawkmoth. It is a summer visitor to the UK, migrating from Southern Europe in variable numbers each year.

With help from the friend's group and Chris Allen we managed to get a grant for five interpretation boards telling you about different habitats and wildlife as you go round the park. These include Reedy Pond, Long Pond, and the fishing pond, but also about the history of the park and the local area. Keep an eye out for them as you walk round the park. The interpretation boards were officially opened by the Councillor for Climate & Green Environment, Harriet Pentland.

It has been another good year for the wildflowers. I have noticed that the Knapweed has spread to areas in the park where it has not been seen before, along with Birds Foot Trefoil. All the wildflowers have been full of bees, butterflies and other pollinating insects feeding on them.

Do come and join to see the Park turn from summer into Autumn and Winter over the next few months. Remember that you can always stay and have something to eat or drink at the Café every day.





#### WALLIS MILL NEWS

#### Dear villagers,

We are delighted to announce that planning has finally been approved to convert this iconic old building into beautiful boutique B&B accommodation. The plan is to create seven B&B studio rooms – 5 one bedroom suites, and 2 family suites (with two bedrooms). We aim to make this as successful as our award-winning Swallows Rest B&B that we



have been operating in the village for over 9 years.

We are really excited to breath life back into this unique old building, sympathetically restoring it, retaining the character and turning it into something that the village can be really proud of. The original "Wallis Mill' name will be kept, in honour of the man who opened this extraordinary building back in 1873, Mr Frederick Wallis.

Already we have uncovered lots of the original features of the mill. We have found a deep groundwell in the middle of the building; tiny pieces of fabric, timesheets, sweetwrappers and buttons dating back to the 1900s; and of course the old bell which still works!
