As I write this article we are still in winter yet the cricket season is only just 2 months away. Preparations for the season ahead are well in hand and the teams are already training at winter nets C/O Oundle School on Wednesday evenings. Outdoor nets will start in April once the weather improves. Plans are progressing for the arrival of our overseas player from South Africa for the first time in two years, so finger crossed he will be here for the start of the season. The first X1 kick off their premiership season with a home game against local rivals Geddington on Saturday 23rd April, all welcome, and the second X1 season starts the following weekend with a home game against Desborough. For the first time in its history, I believe, Brigstock will be running a U17's team and these fixtures will be played on a Thursday evening, the first being on 5th May. We will also be running the U11's, U13's and U15's but this year we have joined forces with Burton Latimer CC to run combined teams for these age groups, this is to ensure players get to play cricket. If you know of any child that wants to play cricket then speak to me or any member of the club. In addition to these teams, we will be running the All-Stars (ages 5-8) and Dynamos (ages 8-11) programs on Friday evenings starting 6th May. Further details will follow regarding registration for these two initiatives which provide a fantastic first experience for all children aged 5-11 years old where they're guaranteed 8 weeks of jam-packed fun, activity, and skills development. The program is designed to introduce children to the sport, teaching them new skills, helping them make new friends, and have a great time doing so. The bar will be open as per usual on Fridays and Saturdays to members and we hope to have an external caterer there on Fridays evenings serving pizzas.

There is a lot of work to be done on the ground ahead of the first game so we will be holding a "ground force" day after Easter so please keep an eye on social media for the date as all volunteers will be welcome. You will be pleased to know there will be a couple of social events this season, one of which will include a live band, again further details will follow, via social media once the dates have been confirmed. THE BRIDGES OF BRIGSTOCK

Everyone is very pleased to see the footbridge along Church Walk back open and expertly repaired by the County Council after the devastating damage done by the 2020 flood. When the bridge wall collapsed a date stone was revealed - 1731. This is plausible as the 1734 map by Brazier (on display in Boughton House) shows a footbridge across the brook below the church. At this time there was a ford where the Grafton Road bridge now crosses. There were many more houses on the Park Walk side of Harper's Brook in what was called "Little Brigstock". Just who built the bridge and paid for it is not known.



Residents would have welcomed a footbridge across to the church which meant that they didn't have to risk getting their feet wet or make a lengthy detour via Bridge Street.

According to Historic England the present bridge by the school is also of 18C origin, restored in the last century and also shown on the 1734 map. Maybe it replaced an earlier bridge washed away by a flood?

There have been several challenges for the Parish Council in this last quarter.

Councillor

Happily the outcome in relation to the proposed erection of an enormous mast at the entrance to Mauntley Avenue has been dropped. Well done to all those who made their views known.

Sudbourough Road Industrial Site

We have continued to collect information on the development of this site and have written a strong objection to the proposed plans. The objection made reference to the Industrial and Commercial Development paragraph in the Brigstock Neighbourhood Plan that was ratified in December 2018. The plan sets out restrictions to ensure the site is maintained in keeping with the rural village environment.

Flooding

Sue Doolan

We are continuing to monitor the progress of the Environment Agency as they address the flooding problems of the whole of the Harpers Brook Valley. At the moment we are exploring the possibility that we could install a flood monitor of our own to give the village up to date measurement of the water level in the brook rising.

PARISH COUNCIL

Jubilee Celebrations

A committee has been formed to discuss and develop ideas put forward on the Survey Monkey questionnaire. Many thanks to all who responded to the survey. Money was retained from the VE Day Celebration that was cancelled which gives us a start towards making it an event to remember.

5 Year Plan

The development of a 5 Year Plan for Brigstock is in progress. In particular, there will be a survey of all the trees in the village that are the responsibility of the Parish Council. A rolling program of maintenance can then be drawn up and costed per year.

Some other costs, to name but a few, that can be planned for are related to:

Improving the cemetery, the bus shelter, the village seats, the maintenance of the footbridge over the brook and the meadow fence bordering Bridge Street.

We would also welcome suggestions of projects to make Brigstock an even better place in which to live.

IMPORTANT NOTICE

In April 2023 Nigel Searle intends to retire from his post as Clerk to the Council after many years of outstanding and selfless service. We must, therefore, begin the search for his replacement. In the first instance we intend to advertise the role in Brigstock Parish as a local clerk will have a first-hand understanding of our needs. To ensure seamless continuity we intend to appoint Nigel's successor before he retires to enable him to pass on his vast knowledge of current and past issues.

FLOODING UPDATE

Following the December 2020 floods the Environment Agency has concluded the following: On the 23rd/24th December 2020 there was a large area of significant rainfall ($60-80\ \text{mm}$ in 24 hours) over the Harper's Brook catchment area. Harper's Brook levels rose over 2.5 metres in less than 12 hours which resulted in the channel capacity being exceeded and the floodplain being utilised to store this excess flood water. Surface flooding merged with river flooding. Many gauging stations recorded their highest ever levels.

Following comments from communities affected, the Agency has changed the name of the Brigstock Gauge station to Harper's Brook at Brigstock and it is available using this link: https://flood-warning@information.service.gov.uk/station/9396. There is also a link on the parish website. We have updated the maximum recorded levels at this station reflecting the levels seen in December 2020.

Variations in river levels and any sluice gate operations on the River Nene have no impact upon Harper's Brook as far north as Lowick, Sudborough and Brigstock. **Next Steps:**

Continue to work with communities at risk along Harper's Brook to help increase resilience.

Support NNC implement outcomes of the Section 19 Flood Report once published.

Continue to work with the Harper's Brook Working Group (PACM – Partnership Approach to Catchment Management).

There is now money available for implementing Slow the Flow schemes etc.

In Brigstock, the PC is looking to install our own water level indicator so that we have a local flood warning system in tandem with the EA. We will continue to monitor local developments that have an impact on Harper's Brook. Those with properties bordering the Brook have riparian (riverside) responsibilities and the PC will be getting in touch to make sure they understand what these are.


Village of the Year

The Wallis and Linnell Factory

One of the landmarks in Brigstock is the building on Back Lane known locally as the factory, which at the present time is being renovated and

turned into flats after standing empty for several years and being in danger of badly deteriorating. It dates from 1873 when it was opened as a clothing factory by the Kettering company Wallis and Linnell. It was an important source of employment, especially for the women in the village, for more than a hundred years, finally closing its doors in 1979. It lay empty for some time but in 1983 it



was acquired by the Wythe Holland Udall design firm and converted to architects' offices.

The following article from the Evening Telegraph of July13th 1983 gives a report on this change.

"New Image and HQ for Design Group"

"One of the area's best known design teams has changed its name and its location. With the retirement of architect John Stedman, the group has taken on the new name of Wythe Holland Udall partnership. And the partnership has moved out of the Spencer Court offices it occupied for 11 years into the old Wallis and Linnell clothing mill in Brigstock. The move is a happy revival for the 110-year-old mill which surprisingly was not a listed building and could have been a candidate for demolition.

The elegant Weldon stone-built mill belonged to the clothing manufacturers Wallis and Linnell who left the building empty several years ago as the company foundered and closed. The future was uncertain until the new partners stepped in and bought the building with a £42,000 conversion scheme. They were attracted to the four-storey building by its 81 symmetrical arched windows giving the fine natural lighting architects' offices welcome."

The Wallis and Linnell Factory—cont'd

"Every effort has been made to restore the exterior to its original state, even to putting back into working order the bell that used to summon Brigstock's mill workers to their benches. The renovation was not without its pitfalls though. Builders found a deep stone well inside the building and, also, the scars of the old steam belt-driven mechanism that powered the mill's 50 sewing machines.

Now the Wythe Holland Udall partnership is well placed to keep up the progress established by the John Stedman design group. The new practice is now busily planning Corby's future with building contracts on the town's Enterprise zone."

Note: the factory is now a listed building.

Fermyn Woods Country Park

It has been a relatively mild and dry winter this season, there have been some cold spells but nothing prolonged. It felt like spring was coming early this year as the birds were starting to sing by the third week of January. I even heard of a Blackbird seen in the Nene Valley feeding a fledgling chick which is very early.

The Ranger team along with help from our volunteers have been busy with our winter habitat work around the park. We have been doing the annual and biannual cuts of the different wildflower meadows and other areas. Back in November we had a Countryside service team day here at the park where our colleagues from the other Parks came and helped us clear round the fishing pond and clear areas of grassland all to help improve the biodiversity for the wildlife.

We have also been thinning out trees in the refuge pond, Great Thicket and Little Thicket all to help the fauna and flora around the park as by removing the trees we are allowing in light down to the ground and hopefully encourage any dormant seeds to germinate and grow. Also, by removing the trees be they dead or too many in a small area it will help the existing trees to have room to grow, all the brash created is put into habitat piles/dead hedges where possible, where this is not possible the rest is burnt.

The wildlife round the park has been busy feeding over the winter months, there has been constant signs of Fallow deer moving round the park, Redwings and Fieldfares have been feeding on the berries, there has also been signs of Siskins and Redpolls. The Red Kites and Buzzards have been over the park regularly, on sunnier days both have been seen together riding the thermals with up to 20 Kites seen at one time. If you are interested in what wildlife is seen round the park then you can keep an eye on the wildlife board that is updated regularly, this can be found by the fishing tickets box outside the toilets block.

BRIGSTOCK ARCHAEOLOGICAL GROUP

Cropmarks have long been a useful archaeological tool, and never more so than now for community groups such as ours given the instant and free access to historic satellite imagery now afforded anyone with an internet connection. We've yet to make the trip to Northampton to compare some curious cropmarks identified by BAG members recently with known features on the Historic Environment Record. However, it's evident Brigstock's past is still very much all around us in the present – if we know where to look.

While our most important archaeological sites are generally protected in law from unscrupulous speculative investigations through scheduling, we cannot safeguard heritage we don't know about. Fieldwalking provides both an opportunity to survey for new archaeological sites and clues to better understand known or suspected sites and features in the landscape around us. It's certainly not definitive. Indeed, our most recent surveys — both formal and informal — have been notably lacking in significant volumes of historic ceramic finds, even when in the vicinity of known significant sites. Which goes once more to prove the archaeological adage that absence of evidence is not evidence of absence.

It's surely no surprise then that focused fieldwalking, as well as further testpitting, look likely to feature large on BAG's activities programme this Spring and Summer.


We are also looking to carry out another trial hole dig somewhere within Brigstock village. To date we have completed 3 digs which have revealed Victorian history in one, back to early medieval in another, and some good stonework flooring in a third.

Our first face-to-face meeting in a while should have taken place by the time you read this, after which we should have a better idea of what members would like to see included. Do let us know your thoughts and if you'd like to get involved. Meanwhile, we're awaiting news on a date for our pottery identification workshop with Museum of London Archaeology (MOLA); more on that as soon as we hear back.


