

## Brigstock United Reformed Church

Since the last issue of this newsletter, the national news has been dominated by the situation in Ukraine, and we decided that we needed to do something to help the refugees. As the chapel is central and empty during the week, we made it available for two sessions when anyone could donate essential products which we packed and took to local distribution centres in Corby and Kettering. The response from the village was amazing, and we also had a great response from people who are not connected with the chapel but who wanted to help with the sorting, packing and transport. There were so many helpers that it would be difficult to name each one as we are bound to forget someone and that would be unfair!-so, a very big thank you to everyone who helped in any way. We finally managed to take four large estate cars full of boxes to the collection points, and these were sent on to be taken to Ukraine by the drivers who had been stranded near Rothwell when the war broke out. We are conscious of the fact that life is still very tough for so many Ukrainians, but it seems that money to buy essential goods is now preferred. We will however, be ready to collect goods again if the opportunity arises.

We also sent £220 for the DEC Ukraine appeal after the Lent Lunch we shared with friends from St Andrews.

We have continued our fundraising this year with our annual Easter coffee morning when we enjoyed hot cross buns and coffee with lots of friends from the village and raised over £500 for our funds. We had a successful Fashion Show on May 12<sup>th</sup> and raised £1120. Our yard sale made £65.

It will soon be Jubilee weekend, and the chapel will be open for an exhibition organised by the Historical Society. We shall be serving coffee and cakes on the Friday and Saturday mornings, from 10-1in the June Small room, and we shall also have a stall at the street market. After that, we think we deserve a rest, and so there are no immediate plans for any more events before the Beer festival. We are still open, as always, every Sunday for a time of worship at 10.30, and we welcome anyone from any denomination to join us. Our services are very informal and we have a variety of different people leading them — and sometimes we organise them ourselves. We welcome you all to join us.

My, how time flies! I cannot believe that I have been in the chair of the Parish Council for a year, but both with some successes and some challenges. Our new members are now fully involved in council business and bringing new ideas on the focus of the council. The higher profile of communication with the village on line is, I feel, more inclusive in supporting the traditional hard copy bulletins.

The Village Hall committee had asked the Parish Council as to how their running loss of "Brigstock News" could be covered. We discussed as to whether "Brigstock News" should be offered digitally as well as in hard copy but the consensus was that the magazine offers a reference point throughout the quarter of activities available in the village.

#### **Sudbourough Road Industrial Site**

Here is still an ongoing problem here, with increased traffic and noise, even throughout the night. We have again written to Tom Pursglove to forcibly complain about the impact of this on the village and ask for his support. We have also written our objections in the strongest terms to the The Transport Commissioner in Leeds and have an ongoing dialogue with North Northants Council Planning Environment Officer.

## PARISH COUNCIL

#### 5 Year Plan

The development of a 5 Year Plan for Brigstock is making progress. A very comprehensive survey of all the trees in the village has been made showing that there are very few trees that need special attention. The pollarding of the willows near the brook, and the trees in the cemetery now have a program of maintenance and are costed per year.

#### Solar Farms on Grafton Road

Scottish Power recently made a presentation to the Parish Council as they are now responsible for both of the planned solar farms to be located between Bullymore's Farm and Grafton Underwood. Because they have ownership of both projects and work to Scottish standards for installation and maintenance of the sites they believe it will be a better experience for all concerned. We were encouraged to raise any concerns that we had so that they could address them at the planning stage. It is unlikely that any work will begin within the next eighteen months, as this is the early stages of getting permissions sorted and considering the best way to get equipment on site. We raised the obvious concerns about traffic movements through the village and up a narrow road. They are considering a number of solutions, which they will present to us at a later date.

#### **Jubilee Celebrations**

A big thank you to the Jubilee Celebration Committee for arranging a comprehensive and varied selection of activities.

There's:- dancing, bell ringing, street parties and picnics, coffee mornings, tea parties, film's, art exhibitions and church services, plus photos of past celebrations and flower arrangements in the church, (not to mention your private celebrations too).

After all their enthusiasm and hard work they just need you to come and participate with equal enthusiasm to mark the Jubilee of Her Majesty's 70 year reign with a celebration that will be remember for long into the future.

#### PARISH COUNCIL CONT'D

#### **Flooding**

To date, there is little further to report. So far, a survey of Harper's Brook has been conducted by the Environment Agency with a number of small remedial measures having been put in place by householders. Such actions, however, should be undertaken by the Environment Agency who will, in the near future, be assessing the line of the brook as it runs through the village to ensure a co-ordinated approach. The overall project has been allocated a period of five years between reporting and resolution and, in this respect, two years have now past. The Parish Council will continue to encourage that this process remains on track.



## Fermyn Woods Country Park

It was a Spring of all weathers this season, started off with April showers and ending in one of the driest April on record, with sunny warm days and cold days thrown in as well.

This changeable weather affected many species, The blue tits nested and started brooding later than they did in 2021 but then Fledgling Blackbirds have been seen as early as February.

There was another good display of bluebells on the orange route.

As I am writing the summer migrants are arriving at the park I have seen/heard: Willow warbler, Chiffchaff, Blackcap, Whitethroat, Garden Warbler and Cuckoo

Many species of butterfly are also starting to emerge so far spotted have been: Peacock, Comma, Brimstone, Orange-Tip, Dingy and Grizzled Skipper, Speckled wood, Green hairstreak.

As you walk round the fishing pond you will notice two new sculptures installed, they are of a grass snake and toad which add to our collection of newts and frog sculptures that can be found round the park.

By the time you are reading this there should be even more species of butterflies and summer migrants round the park, why not come and have a walk round and see what you can find, the wildlife board is updated frequently for people to see what is about. Once you have finished your walk why not pop into the Skylark Café for tea/coffee and a piece of cake.

We have now received all the new information boards which were made possible by a grant from FCC Communities. These will be erected shortly and along with the new sculptures, make some interesting objects to find on your walk round the park. Thanks to our volunteers for their help in getting these all erected.



#### **ALAN KEITH HECTOR 1923-2003**

Alan was my uncle. I was born 1938and Alan was 15 years old. He lived with his parents, my Granddad and Grandma. My Mum and Dad and Myself also lodged with my Grandparents in a threestorey cottage called "Fernhollow" in Church Walk, where Harpers Court is now.

In 1941, Alan was called up at 18. He was put in the 4<sup>th</sup> Battalion Coldstream Guards (Service No 14584906) and he then joined the tank division doing his training at Pirbright camp. He was with the D day landing, serving with Overlord campaign,



After D Day landing, Alan was in No 2 Squadron HQ troop and was commanded by Capt Dick McDougal. Alan was driver of a Churchill tank named JACKAL. (Serial No 14584906)

During the advance battle to Overlook in the Netherlands taking place between 30 Sept and 18<sup>th</sup> October 1944, the crew of the tank fell victim to the NEW GERMAN RIEGAL MINE on the 12<sup>th</sup> October 1944. On the photo you can see where the Riegel mine ripped out the bogey wheels from the lefthand side and also penetrated the Churchill's thick belly plates, which sadly caused casualties. Two of the crew were killed, Capt McDougal lost a leg, and Allan was partially blinded by battery acid. Lucky a medic crew were close by that saved Uncles sight and Capt McDougal's life.

After the war ended Alan was transferred back to Wellington Barracks, Birdcage Walk, London, where his duties were keeping guard at Buckingham Palace, (outside on the pavement before the sentry boxes were moved in-

side) and guarding the vaults in the Bank of England. He also attended Trooping of the Colour under King George VI.






#### ALAN KEITH HECTOR 1923-2003 Cont'd

My story does not end there. Many years later, Alan and wife Suzy went on holiday to Belgium and the Netherlands, and, during a visit to a open air war museum, Alan saw this Churchill tank sitting on a concrete site, and telling his wife it was the type he drove in the war. Looking on the side of the tank, he saw the name JACKAL. He could not believe it. He checked the serial Number and clarified this was the actual tank him and his crew were in when it struck the mine.

I enclose a photograph of my Uncle Alan Hector and the tank described above before and after the damage.

### **BRIGSTOCK ARCHAEOLOGICAL GROUP**

Engaging future generations is key to any community group, so it makes sense that this year's first excavation should be at Brigstock's primary school. By the time you read this, we hope to have completed a test-pit investigating the now-demolished row of houses at the High Street end of Bridge Street.



Consulting old documentation, especially maps, is an important part of preparing for any dig and will hopefully have helped us find evi-

dence of the structures themselves. But there's nothing quite like finding and cleaning artefacts that may have been quite commonplace objects a couple of generations back to help pupils understand how much life has changed within living memory in the parish.

We'll be reporting back on what we found later in the year. We also hope to conduct at least one more excavation over the Summer, and some focused fieldwalking after harvest. 

#### Spencer's Woodyard, Brigstock



For many years Spencer's Woodyard was a prominent feature of Brigstock with the crane dominating the skyline on the approach to the village. It was also an integral part of village life as people regularly went there to buy a wheelbarrow load of off-cuts to use as firewood (before the luxury of central heating). The charge was by the barrow-load and it was said that the biggest wheelbarrows in the county were to be found in Brigstock. The successful timber business was founded in the 19<sup>th</sup> century by Mr C. N Spencer and the following extracts from an article of 25<sup>th</sup> May 1928 in the Kettering Leader and Guardian, published to mark the diamond wedding of Mr and Mrs Spencer, give some interesting details of their lives.

"Mr and Mrs C. N Spencer who were married on May 26<sup>th</sup>1868 will complete sixty years of wedded life this month (*May 1928*). Mr Spencer is a well-known timber merchant of Brigstock and a familiar figure at the Kettering, Wellingborough and Thrapston markets. He is 86 years of age and his wife is 82 and all their wedded life has been spent in Brigstock where he founded the firm which bears his name. Mr and Mrs Spencer had a family of twelve, seven sons and five daughters and in addition 29 grandchildren and 8 great grandchildren.

#### Spencer's Woodyard, Brigstock cont'd

Mr Charles Newman Spencer was born in Stanion in 1842. He left school when he was nine years old and at twelve started work with his brothers assisting his father who was a timber merchant in a small way. He later spent some time in gentleman's service. In 1868 he married Miss Charlotte Head at Lutton Church on May 26<sup>th</sup> 1868 and they took up residence in Brigstock where he started a timber business. While Mr Spencer can be thankful from the business point of view for the advent of machinery into his trade, he might also be forgiven a certain regret for in 1880 he met with a serious accident when cutting a piece of wood with a circular saw, which severed his left hand at the wrist. When he went into timber buying he had little capital at the start and at one time he admits he owed £700 (a very large sum in those days). "Time seems to have gone very quickly" he says "my wife and I have been very happy and there is greater credit to my wife than to me for my success. She has been the backbone of our marriage."

He is still a regular attendant at the parish church and still dons his surplice and takes his place in the choir as he has done for 60 years. "I will sing as much as I can for as long as I can" he affirms. He also used to play the euphonium in Brigstock band but gave that up over 50 years ago as his wife said he was not at home enough.

Mrs Spencer has plenty to talk about too. Often as a girl she used to stay at Windsor. In those days the public were allowed to wander about the castle grounds when Royalty were in residence and frequently, on an evening stroll there, she would see Queen Victoria sitting on a balcony listening to the band. She visited Cowes for the regatta and review of the Fleet and saw King Edward V11 and Princess Eugenie of France. They recount how Lord Lonsdale, who was Master of the Woodland Pytchley Hunt took up residence in Mauntley House, which he bought in 1882. On January 25<sup>th</sup>1883 Brigstock was very merry for Lord Lonsdale had inherited his title and gave a supper and ball in the schools to which everyone was invited. On that occasion Mrs Spencer wore her wedding dress for the second time. And the third occasion on which she will wear the dress will be for the happy celebration of her diamond wedding."
