RAF GRAFTON UNDERWOOD'S WW2 MEMORIES

FACEBOOK PAGE

This is a Facebook group dedicated to the WW2 memories of the airbase which was situated in the village of Grafton Underwood. The emphasis is on the USAAF 384th Heavy Bomber Group who flew the famous B-17 Flying Fortress. The 384th were among several Bomber Groups based at RAF Grafton Underwood, however their stay was the longest at approximately 2 years.

Back in the 1960's, Quentin Bland- a lifelong resident of Grafton Under-

wood, became the official historian and liaison officer for the 384th BG. His daughter, Sam Coleman, and her partner in this project, Paul Teal, decided that they would make every effort to carry on Quentin's legacy thus keeping alive the WW2 memories and history - otherwise they could be lost forever.



Sam and Paul are concentrating on 3 main factors:

Preserving history (original photos, paperwork, videos, etc).

Ensuring that the history is accurate via research, and, Sharing the history.



There are many more photos on the Facebook Page of local views, the planes and equipment and the air force personnel.

Sam and Paul's Facebook group, 'RAF Grafton Underwood's WW2 memories' is devoted to sharing and preserving this important local history. Please of course feel free to join their group!




.Collectors Corner

HUMBLE SCONES RECIPE

50g strong white flour 5tsp baking powder Pinch of salt 1 egg yolk for a glaze 50g caster sugar 100g butter cut into small cubes 300ml milk ideally full fat

Method

- 1. Preheat your oven to 200C/Fan 180C.
- 3. Mix the flour, sugar and baking powder, no need to sieve, add the butter with a pinch of salt. Gently using your fingertips mix until it resembles breadcrumbs. Then add the milk and mix until you have a smooth dough. Then chill in the fridge for 10 minutes.
- 4. Roll out and cut out using a 7cm cutter you should get 12 scones then coat with the egg wash.
- 5. Bake for 10 to 12 minutes, allow to cool. Enjoy with clotted cream and your favourite jam.

Continuing our test-pit programme around Hall Hill, this Summer's dig looks set to be our first to the east. On a somewhat snugger site than of late, it has all the potential of previous years for revealing something interesting about our shared past. We've yet to finalise details, but the intention is the same as for the last couple of summers. That is, to better understand the sort of activities taking place in this central area and to continue to devel-



op field skills among as wide a cross-section of our members as are interested. Both were thoroughly worthwhile experiences and seem likely to lead to more. A huge thank you to all involved, especially our newest members for hitting the ground running, and for all who took the time to turn out. Updates about future events will be posted on the village Facebook page. We've already begun discussions for another talk, this time about the village's most recent commercial dig, also off Grafton Road, once post-excavation analysis and report writing is complete. Preliminary findings of Iron Age and Saxon ceramic seem certain to offer some insight into pre- and early history on the south-west side of Harper's Brook only briefly outlined in Glenn Foard's urban survey c. 2000.

Fermyn Woods Country Park

I have just read that March was one of the wettest on record and that April was one of the coldest, because of this it is thought that Spring 2023 is

about a week late. I know here at the park the butterflies seem slow to emerge, so far, I have seen Orange-tips, speckled woods, Brimstones, Tortoiseshell, and Peacock. Looking back through the wildlife records we have for the park they are later. As I write the May butterflies are starting to emerge, Grizzled and Dingy Skippers and Green Hairstreak which are rare species we have been helping with the habitat work we carried out in



the winter with Butterfly conservation volunteers. In June look out for the

Black Hairstreak in the Great Thicket and in July His imperial Majesty the Purple Emperor up in the Forestry England section of Fermyn Woods.



Here at the park, we try to do minimal mowing around the park, we have the amenity meadows cut for picnicking and the overflow car park, we then put a very small edge on the verges around the park

to stop vegetation coming over the path but the rest we leave and allow wildflowers to grow which provide valuable nectar for the many pollinators we have in the park.

The summer migrants are arriving back at the park; so far to arrive are: -

Blackcap, Willow Warbler, Chiffchaff, and I have just recently heard a Whitethroat and a cuckoo, have a listen as you walk round the park and see what you can hear.

Now that the winter work has ended, we are now concentrating on estate work that needs our attention round the park, none of this work can be achieved with out the help of our valuable volunteers.

So far, they have installed some steps at the fishing pond, and we are just starting to repair a section of fence on the red route.

Jean Shiells: A Brigstock Land Army Girl

The Women's Land Army made a valuable contribution to the war effort during the Second World War and during that period a contingent of these young women was based in Brigstock. The girls worked on the farms round the area and did a wide variety of jobs, from milking cows to driving tractors. A few of these girls stayed on after the war, got married and settled here, including Jean Shiells, who lived in the High Street with her husband Reg and was very well known in the village for many years until her death in 2018 at the age of 92.

This service to the country was not officially recognised for many years but finally in 2008 they were given an award and the presentation was reported in the Evening Telegraph on 13th November 2008 with the headline "Recognition for a forgotten army" The report describes how the Women's Land Army and Women's Timber Corps were formed

to make sure farms were kept going to provide vital food, timber and crops while the men were away at war. Made up largely of young women, the Land Army grew to 80,000 by 1944 and was finally disbanded in 1950. With a uniform of green jumpers and ties and brown slouch hats these young girls supported the war effort and helped to avoid food shortages.

The awards ceremony took place in the Willows Arts Centre in George Street, Corby and was attended by dozens of ex-Land Army girls, including Jean Shiells. The presentation was made by the local MP at that time, Phil Hope who said "I am delighted to have been asked to honour the veterans of the Women's Land Army. We owe each of them a huge debt of thanks. During the war they worked on farms to support the war effort and feed the nation and I believe it is absolutely right that we recognise their efforts by presenting them with this long-awaited veterans' badge to pay tribute to their determination, hard work and commitment to serving the country".

Jean Shiells , nee Threadgold, was originally from Wellingborough and joined the Women's land Army in 1942.

Jean Shiells: A Brigstock Land Army Girl Cont'd

The 83 year-old (in 2008) said "I worked at Perkins the Printers in Wellingborough but on my 17th birthday I joined up and came to Brigstock to stay in a youth hostel. There were about 30 of us and we used to go round the farms. We did ploughing, milking, everything. I had lots of friends and there were various aerodromes around and the Yanks used to fetch us to dances. Everyone loved it because it was a social thing. I left in 1948 when I got married to my husband and we stayed in Brigstock and I have been here ever since. I am sure we



were making a contribution to the war effort. It was very hard work but I'm sure that's the reason we kept so healthy and that's why we still grow our own vegetables. I've been looking forward to getting the award because it has been such a long time and it will be nice to be recognised for what we did."


