#### **Brigstock War Memorial**

Was it really 6 years ago that Knit and Natter ladies, together

with ladies from the village knitted over 2,000 poppies for the village war memorial. Every year they are carefully dried and stored away and have now become a village tradition.

Every year we think of different ways to ease the task of putting them up. Earlier this year, we asked for help on FaceBook to sew Velcro on the cross section and poppy bands to hold the main structure in place,

rather than the usual tie it all together with red string, which took forever to do. We wish to thank Gill Dorks, Glenda Stephen for creating the Velcro trips and Antonia McKinnon from Red Piece Equestion who had the difficult job of sewing Velcro onto the sections of the cross. What a difference it made. Gordon Stephen spent ½ the time he normally took to create the display in time for the Brigstock Memorial Service.

Your Parish Council has continued to work for the good of the local community. Although we have few legislative powers, we endeavour to bring your issues to the notice of those who do. With the changes following the establishment of North Northamptonshire Council, which encompasses the duties which were previously undertaken by the now defunct East Northamptonshire Council (NNC), new lines of communication are still being forged and those holding office are beginning to get to grips with their new roles.

In conjunction with other villages in Harper's Brook Valley, many communications have been made regarding the state of the roads in Brigstock and the A6116 between Stanion and Islip. Unfortunately, resultant action taken has been limited to signage noting an uneven carriageway and a vague promise of more fulsome improvements in the future though without a specific timeframe. We will continue to draw the attention of NNC to these issues. On a more positive note, and doubtless due to the additional assistance of parishioners identifying road surface issues via 'Street Doctor', many of the potholes in the village have recently been repaired. Likewise, repairs to the school are now underway by much encouragement from various parties.

The contentious problem of changes in planning permissions made by Grace

Homes in respect to the new housing site has created much concern within the village. Despite active protestation from the Parish Council, NNC have stated that there is a government 'loophole' that allows any developer to request a reduction in the provision of affordable housing citing that it is uneconomic for them to construct such. Whilst we await further comment and clarification from our District Councillor, it appears that any changes being considered do not require approval or indeed comment from the Parish Council and we appear to be powerless to act in such circumstances. Having spent three years developing the Neighbourhood Plan with extensive consultation with the village, it is of particular concern that the stated objectives of the parish to provide more affordable homes is so readily overturned. We will be contacting our local MP over this matter.

We are at present seeking to clarify the implications of Article 4 conversation directions which aim to control small scale changes to the outside of houses that would otherwise harm the historic or architectural character of the conservation area. Whilst obtaining permission to make authorised changes has been required in the past, the government have now decided that more formal planning permission needs to be made where additional costs can be involved. This is a complex area where we have been actively in consultation with NNC Planning Department to clarify matters as to where and under what circumstances planning permission is required. We will be publishing clear guidelines for householders when such consultation is complete.

We are pleased to announce that we are able to fund some projects for the village from money provided by Grace Homes who have already contributed to the seat to be erected near to the post box on Stanion Road. There will also be a substantial amount available from Scottish Power once the solar farm off Grafton Road is connected to the National Grid. The Parish Council is, therefore, pleased to receive suggestions for ways to use such monies to enhance life for parish residents. Practical suggestions can be communicated via the Parish Council website by email to the Clerk.

**Litter Picking** The Parish Council would like to thank all the volunteers who pick up the litter when out for a walk. Any piece picked up helps to keep the village looking good. If anyone wants to tackle an area on their own, there is equipment available from the Parish Council. Contact Liz Searle 373672


We have some new entries this year, which along with all the other re-

### Act of Remembrance Lancaster DV361 -Lyveden Airfield memorial Site 80th Anniversary -Friday 22nd December 2.30pm

On December 22<sup>nd</sup> 1943, Lancaster DV361, a 207 Squadron aircraft was on a post repair cross country test flight, taking off from RAF Bottesford.

A fire was reported in the starboard inner engine. The pilot ordered the crew to stand by to abandon the aircraft and the Flight Engineer to feather the engine and operate the Fire extinguisher.

The Pilot dived but the fire continued. The order was given to abandon the aircraft.

The Bomb Aimer, Flight Engineer and Navigator baled out, the pilot followed minutes later after trimming the aircraft.

The three men in the aft of the aircraft were trapped by a jammed rear door and perished in the crash.

Sgt Thomas Higgins R.A.F

Sgt George O'Neill R.A.F

We will hold a short Act of Remeberance for the crew. The crash was recorded as at 14.42 and

at this exact time, we will observe a minute of silence to reflect on their sacrifice.

Kevin Flecknor and I continue the work of the late Paul Knight, who fundraised and erected the memorial. We endeavour to keep alive, at least in memory, the three airmen who perished.

#### Some Victorian Parlour Games for Christmas

#### Are you there, Moriarty?

Two players are blindfolded and lie face down, head-to-head, holding each other by the left hand. Their seconds hand them each a rolled up newspaper. The first player calls out "Are you there Moriarty?" His opponent replies "Yes" and the first player tries to smack him on the head with the rolled-up newspaper using the voice as a clue to where his head is. Then the victim takes his turn. What fun!?

#### **Reverend Crawley's game**

You need seven or eight players or more. You all stand in a circle and link hands but not with the people on either side of you and not both hands with the same person. This has the effect of turning the group into a huge human knot, and your joint task is to untie it. You work together to step over each other, crawl under people's arms, climb through gaps and so on - all without letting go of the hands you are holding. You usually end up with a single ring of people holding hands.

#### Laughing Game



### **BRIGSTOCK ARCHAEOLOGICAL GROUP**

Pottery sherds are among archaeologists' most useful tools. Often almost indestructible, they are common finds when digging in the UK. Comparing them with ceramic type-series – so called typological analysis – can begin to suggest when, where, and why they were made. Today, for the cost of a smartphone, all sorts of reference collections and guides are freely available online for identifying pottery. These cover all periods and a huge array of different ceramic wares, from Roman finewares to post-medieval clay smoking pipes. You may like to check out <a href="http://www.pipearchive.co.uk/">http://www.pipearchive.co.uk/</a> the next time pieces of that distinctive fine, white fired clay turn up while digging your garden.

But even then, it can be far from easy to recognise your battered sherd among the thousands of historic forms, fabrics, and styles evidenced in Britain's archaeological record since ceramic first appeared in the Neolithic some 6,000 years ago. So, when it comes to identifying our finds, community groups like BAG prefer to consult the same specialists as commercial archaeological units. As this newsletter goes to press, we're currently – excitedly – reviewing results from analysis by Time Team regular, Paul Blinkhorn, that include ceramic finds dating back to Brigstock's Iron Age. Equally usefully, this has also allowed us to begin to draw up our own ceramic reference collection specifically for Brigstock – a resource of ever-greater value as we supplement it with finds from future excavation and fieldwalking.

Unfortunately, rain has rather curtailed our planned Autumn surveying programme so far this year, but we're still holding out for some opportunities if better weather returns. As ever, archaeology is often on so many levels very much at the mercy of the elements. ### Fermyn Woods Country Park

There has been an amazing display of autumn colours in the park this year, the trees have also produced an abundance of nuts and berries which the wildlife is taking full advantage of,the old wives' tale of it being a harsh winter due to a good year for berries comes to mind, we will have to wait and see on that one.

The summer migrants have gone to warmer climes, and we are starting to slowly see the arrival of the winter migrants of Fieldfares and Redwings, also a lot of the resident birds are starting to flock together, I have seen big flocks of Goldfinches and Linnets around the park. As the weather turns more wintery, we will see the arrival of Siskins from northern England and Scotland.



We have had our hay meadow, plateau and

grass maze cut and with help from corporate group volunteers we were able to get them raked and the arisings put into grass snake habitat piles. We have also been busy with our regular volunteers with maintenance around the park which has included: - redesigning the refuge viewpoint and installing gabions (metal cages filled with stone), digging over the bark chip in the main playarea, repairing the squirrel scramble, to name but a few of the tasks that we could not do without the help of our amazing volunteers.

Our thoughts are now of the winter habitat work we are starting to undertake as the season goes on, we have been slowly brush cutting areas around the park that are either done annually or biannually. As autumn and winter gets later so does our tree habitat work as the trees are still full of leaves and the sap has not stopped rising which makes it difficult to carry out our work. This season we are going to carry on in areas which we did not get to finish, create some more wildlife corridors and glades to let in light, create more low scrub hedges and any safety work that some of the trees might need.

So, as you go for a nice Autumnal/Wintery walk around the park keep an eye out for wildlife and then why not warm up in the Skylark café with tea/ coffee, homemade cakes and warming homemade soup.

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### North Northants Astronomy Club (NNAC)

Where do we live? Always a good question. We live on a planet in a solar system on a spiral arm of the Milky Way.

We can see the spiral arm in our night sky; it is a hazy band of light. We can see less than 5% of the Milky Way from Earth. We only have an artist impression (shown left) of what it looks like from space because we have yet to reach that far out!

We believe our Milky Way is about 13.6 billion years old, only 200 million years younger than the universe itself. The number of stars in it is thought to be around 100–400 billion, and counting.



With a width of 100,000 light years, even Star Trek: Enterprise at Warp 5 (125 x C) would take 800 years to traverse the Milky Way. That's with a fresh box of Dilithium crystals!

Our sun (yellow dot in the bottom) is located in a small spiral *arm*, the Orion *Arm*, which is one of the four spiral arms travelling around at 515,000 mph. Our solar system takes about 230 million years to complete one orbit around the galactic centre, so we were at top when dinosaurs roamed the Earth.

When talking about the Universe it is useful to understand what is a Light year? It is a unit of astronomical distance equivalent to the distance that light travels in one year, which is nearly 6 million, million miles.

We live on the third planet from the Sun, our precious Earth. We think our

solar system formed about 4.571 billion years ago from a dense cloud of interstellar gas and dust.

Our solar system is made up of a star, eight planets, and countless smaller bodies such as dwarf planets, asteroids, and comets. Pluto is now relegated to an inferior rank of a dwarf planet.
