Brigstock Neighbourhood Plan Update – The Survey

Firstly, a big thank you to everyone that completed the questionnaire earlier in the Spring. In total we received 305 responses from people who live and/or work in Brigstock. The Neighbourhood Plan committee were thrilled with the level of response, and believe it bears testament to how much local people care about the future of Brigstock.


99% of respondents live within the Parish of Brigstock, and 9% work in the parish. Responses were received from a wide range of age groups. However, 39% were aged 65 years or older.

What you told us...


We asked you to let us know what the most important issues are for the neighbourhood plan to tackle. The issue deemed important by the largest number of people (71%) was 'controlling future development'. 'Protecting green areas in the village' received the second highest number of votes, with 62% of you stating this as important.

Future Development

When asked how many new homes should be built in the village over the next 15 years, 75% of you suggested somewhere between zero and 50 houses would be appropriate. The average came out at 36 houses. See graph, right for the full result



If there is to be more housing in Brigstock, 81% of you believed it should be for first-time buyers. Only 17% of you thought any new housing should be for the private rental market.



Local Green Spaces and the Countryside

When we asked you whether or not you agreed with the current designation of specific Local Green Spaces, on the whole you did, with most areas receiving agreement levels of 90% or more.

When we asked whether people considered that Brigstock Pocket Park between Barnards Way and the bypass is under used and could be developed for other uses, out of the choices provided the most popular ones were: a new site for the school; (37%) new social housing (36%); and a new site for the pre-school (35%). Private housing was the lowest ranking option at 12%, while 24% of people said it should **remain as a park.** Employment usage was also ranked relatively low, with only 18% of respondents agreeing the Pocket Park could be used for light industrial employment, and 14% of respondents agreeing it could be used for an office-based site of employment.

Local Heritage

It is clear from your responses that heritage is very important. There was agreement from 91% of people that any new development should make a positive contribution to the local character and distinctiveness.

What Next?

The Neighbourhood Plan committee may also come back with more questions and consultation as the plan starts to come together — it's all about letting the people of Brigstock have their say. For more on the plan so far, visit the parish council website at www.brigstockcouncil.org.uk

SUNNYSIDERS CLUB

Sunnysiders are looking for some more friends to join them. They are a group of young at heart senior citizens who meet weekly on a Tuesday at 2pm in Harpers Court Lounge. There is a varied programme of activities published in advance. Membership is £1.50 per week which covers activities and subsidised trips and meals. Everybody is welcome but car drivers and a few more men would be very welcome. Do not be put off if you are neither of those, you will receive a warm welcome.

I wonder how many residents remember or know where Holy Corner was in Brigstock?

This was part of Park Walk and Church Walk, before Harpers Court flats were built. The reason it was (Nick Named) Holy Corner all the residents were big Chapel (U R C) people. The main family's living there were the Rowell family, the family business was the Fellmongers which prior to the 1960's were a very busy place of work, consisting of collecting hides and skins from slaughter houses farms and butchers shops. These were soaked in pits drawing water from the brook then treated with lime and chemicals, the fat would be scraped off the skins—these were now called the pelts - then going to the tanners in Stourbridge.

Wool would be collected from the farms during sheep shearing times in lorries. This would then be sorted before going to the Bradford wool mills and the Witney blanket company. Rabbit skins were dried by a coke brazier fire, then sent for making gloves. This area of Brigstock was one of the busiest places. Also, in the buildings adjacent to Harpers Brook, was a Blacksmith and Farriers shop, next to that was Braybrooke Bros carpenters shop. Here they made coffins and lined them.

I was born and grew up in a cottage next to these buildings. At the top of the hill on the left was Nichols Farm. This was farmed by Mr Tom Ellis, along with Mill Farm in the High St. This farm had a milking herd of about 30 cows, the one in Park Walk milked about 60 cows. All the milk was taken to Nichols farm where it was bottled and delivered by vans to Brigstock, Stanion, Sudborough and all the lodges. In the 30's and 40's, milk was delivered to Corby old village and Weldon. The cows at Mill Farm were milked 6-00am and 3-00pm every day. They would be taken after milking in the mornings as far as the old camp to a field for grazing until afternoon milking. This was my job when I started work— imagine taking a herd of cows along that road today, (imagine the abuse you would get). The cows at Nichols Farm would be milked at the same time and then all the milk would be bottled in the dairy ready for delivery, any excess milk was collected in churns by lorry and taken to Kettering Dairy. This part of Brigstock was a hive of activity especially in the mornings The house which is No 4 Park Walk was called Hillside. This was before house numbering. From the 1950s this house was the Doctors surgery, the waiting room was the front and the consulting room was opposite.

The surgery hours were Monday morning and evening, Wednesday and Friday Morning. The Doctors were Dr's Hunter, Shirkey, Ballantyne, Divine, and Carson. My Mother, living next door at No 6, would make coffee for them at 11-00am after surgery before they went back to the surgery in Corby, this surgery was in Kipling Rd, off Rowlett Rd.

Greetings from Fermyn Woods Country Park

During the winter we continued our program of clearing glades in the Great Thicket with continued help from the Butterfly Conservation Trust for Bedfordshire and Northamptonshire. This is part of an on going programme to clear glades in the thicket which form ideal habitats for the elusive Black Hairstreak Butterfly. Look out for this small brown butterfly flitting around blackthorns and nectar plant in the middle of June .

You may have noticed some particularly large butterflies have appeared near the land slip (aka Muddy Mountain). The butterfly sculptures have

been carved by local chainsaw artist Dick Tilley as part of a grant scheme funded by Mick George Ltd. The benches have been placed in one of our key butterfly areas, doubling up as some where to sit to admire the view and a good spot to see Grizzled Skipper, Dingy Skipper and Green Hairstreak Butterflies, all of which can be seen in the month of May. The new butterfly seating area is situated just behind the butterfly interpretation board. Here is a picture of a Green Hairstreak photographed by Roland Bogush.

BRIGSTOCK HISTORICAL SOCIETY

LOCAL HISTORY

Last month Bill Simon, Robin Phillips and I visited Hatfield House to look at their extensive records on Brigstock. We were particularly interested to see the old maps of the deer parks dating from the time when they were granted to Sir Robert Cecil by Elizabeth 1 in 1602. This was not a popular decision amongst many of the locals. Cecil wanted to maximise profits by selling off timber, grazing cattle in the Great Park and driving the deer into the Little Park which was to be let to Thomas Tresham a gentleman "most odious in the county" probably because of his "hard and extreme usage of his tenants and countrymen" and his Catholic faith. The people of Brigstock protested against these changes by rioting in April 1603, stirred up by a local gentleman called Simon Montagu and his brother-in-law Chaney. In May Chaney ordered the workmen in the Great Park to stay their sale of wood and timber saying falsely that he had the authority of the king. He also claimed that Simon Montagu should have charge of the deer. Various attempts were made to prevent the buyers of wood from paying in their money. Chaney even gathered 'a troop of lewd women of Brigstock' to put further pressure on the workmen. The keepers of Farming and Geddington Woods refused to receive three or four hundred deer turned out of the parks so they were allowed to stray across the neighbourhood. The locals were probably well supplied with venison at the time. The sheriff and JPs had to be summoned to intervene and the unruly people of Brigstock were eventually subdued with a combination of threats and persuasions. Cecil helped by distributing alms for the poor and securing new leases for the tenants. We discovered a letter from George Sharp, vicar of Brigstock, written to the Earl of Salisbury in February 1604 in which he says;

HISTORICAL SOCIETY - CONT'D

"I find all the chief of the parish, with many of the inferior sort on both sides depending, to consist of puritans, I hope something conformable, and of papists, I fear refractory and obstinate. Between both there is outwardly scarce a show of humanity, but inwardly mortal and unchristianly malice. Of the rest, many rebukeable for their dissolute courses, others to be pitied for their beggarly estates. I am grieved that where there is no agreement with contrarieties, nor any communion with different religions, he whose part is to reconcile shall find his labours uneffectual or intolerable. My duty shall not be wanting. The value of the living is £40 to be farmed, but this year scarce anything as Mr Baldock the late incumbent has sown all the land and must reap the benefit. In regard whereof, and intending to take the degree of Bachelor in Divinity this year at Cambridge, I beg to continue in the university until midsummer."



George Sharp remained vicar until 1615 and obviously had his work cut out tending to his wayward flock! How things have changed.

We obtained digital copies of the maps and some of the documents and hope to be able to display these at a later date.

Following the flooding in the village at the start of the year we had a meeting with the civil engineer appointed by NCC to produce a flood report. He listened to residents and had a thorough tour of the village. We hope that measures will be taken to address some of the problems. Closing the roads to traffic proved difficult as some inconsiderate motorists tried to get through the flood water without any thought to the havoc they were causing by creating waves. Many thanks to Ken Chapman who acted as flood warden, and everyone else who helped out on the day. NCC no longer provide sandbags but the PC has purchased a number of flood sacks which are more effective and can be purchased at cost from the clerk.

Following complaints about parking in the village particularly along Grafton Road, a meeting was organized with residents, our county councillor Wendy Brackenbury, and the police. Most of the problems occur because motorists park inconsiderately so we have worked with the police to produce some parking notices which will be put on cars parked in awkward places. The aim is to make people think about how they park but pursue prosecution if offenders persist.

PARISH COUNCIL

Questions have been asked about the progress of the skateboard facility. Following a meeting with the interested group of youngsters they were tasked with talking to the Cricket Club about siting, talking to the owner of the Meadow and looking at sources of funding. The PC needs to be sure that there is long term commitment from the user group because we will have the job of maintaining and insuring the facility if it is built. We have not yet received a progress report. At the same time, through the Neighbourhood Plan, we are looking at other ways of enhancing play provision for youngsters in the village.

We have just held the Annual Parish Meeting which was attended by two members of the public. This meeting is not a council meeting and is an opportunity to celebrate local activities and debate current issues in the community. Should we make it a more informal occasion in an attempt to encourage more residents to come along and meet with parish councillors and discuss things that you yourselves have put on the agenda? Or do we take it that you are all very satisfied with what is going on in the village and leave it as it is - a short meeting before the usual parish council meeting in May?

The PC response to the Gladman application can be read on the village website. It is quite clear that residents don't want this development, ENC doesn't want it, the County Council doesn't support it, and our MP Tom Pursglove is on our side.

Thanks to all of you who took part in the village litterpick. A huge amount of litter was collected and volunteers were very grateful to the WI for the delicious refreshments.

Thank you too to those residents who keep parts of the highway grass cut. We only have 5 contracted cuts a year so your efforts are greatly appreciated.

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GLADMAN DEVELOPMENT, OFF BENEFIELD ROAD

A developer, Gladman, submitted another application for 110 houses. This had a few minor changes to the previous, but tried to answer some of the objections raised. This planning application will be considered by East Northants shortly, and there have been about 500 letters of objection to this submitted by local residents.

There will be a Public Enquiry set for the 18th July where the original application and evidence will be considered. The Planning Inspector will make his recommendation to the Secretary of State for a final decision.

The Enquiry is open to all to listen to and some residents will be able to make representation as well. Keep an eye on the Planning website as to how you can attend and watch the discussion or possibly put your case forward to the inspector

WOODLAND SCENES

Spring is rapidly moving into summer, and nature moves along at a fast pace to keep up.

The Bluebells in the woods have put on a great display in many of the local woods along with the snowdrops and wild Primroses. In the Red Kite nest that I have been watching, the mother bird starting sitting on the 1st April, and the chick would have hatched about 3 weeks later. The mother bird has been sitting tight, and the first chick was seen until the 25th May, when it would be about 4 weeks old. I expect it will fledge about 7-8 weeks old when it has grown all its new feathers. The Red Kites seem to have spread out from this area following the closure of the tip in Corby. This was a good place for them to get their afternoon tea, but now they are having to look further afield for their food.

Fallow Deer are still present around the fields in small herds of up to 25 to 30 deer, comprising of Does and young Pricketts. They will be having fawns shortly, and will become harder to see as they hide their young away from sight.

Look out for the Purple Emperor and White Admiral Butterflies which appear in the woods in the first 3 weeks of July. People come from all over the country to see these beautiful insects. So don't miss out and follow the experts along the tracks behind the Country park to see this spectacle.

"Superfast broadband speeds for Brigstock!!

The Brigstock community are a beneficiary of BT's investment partnership with the County Council (Superfast Northamptonshire) to extend the reach of faster broadband to over 95% of Northamptonshire business and residential premises.

As part of this rollout programme, Openreach engineers are installing new fibre broadband infrastructure in the village which is expected to be fully operational by early summer. Once the new fibre broadband infrastructure has gone live, residents and businesses who wish to benefit from faster broadband speeds, will need to order a fibre broadband service from their current broadband provider or choose a service from over 150 service providers (e.g. BT Infinity, Sky Broadband, Talk Talk and Plusnet), using the Openreach fibre infrastructure to provide faster broadband services to their customers.

Any resident/business with a telephone line will be able to upgrade to the new fibre broadband service (offering speeds of up to 80Mbps with technology developments in the pipeline to go even faster). No digging of verges, pavements and driveways is needed to connect a property to the new fibre broadband service.

Brigstock residents and businesses requiring even faster broadband speeds, will also have the option (when this is made available in the area) to order a fibre to the premises (FTTP) connection via an ondemand arrangement. Speeds of up to 330Mbps are possible via this fibre broadband technology, with further speed enhancements to come.

Volunteer Action

Helping you to stay active in your community

As you get older, or perhaps because you've always lived with a disability, it can be hard to get to those places that really matter to you. If you find yourself at home more than you'd like, you may wish you could see more people in your home.

That's where Volunteer Action (VA) can help. We provide a car scheme for those who cannot access public transport and can take you to very many of the places you would like to go – not just the hospital and doctor's surgery (although they are of course, offered!) but also shopping, to the hairdresser, to visit friends etc. We also run a befriending service of volunteers willing to come out & chat regularly. Our aim is to help improve your well-being and how you define that is largely down to you. This summer we are introducing an enhanced referral service to help you find the help you need.

<u>CAR SERVICE</u>: There is no membership fee. We do need 2 working days notice of drives but will consider medical drives at any time. All our drivers are volunteers who get paid 40p per mile (minimum charge £3). This is paid by the passenger directly to the driver in cash on the day. Drivers will wait an hour for a return journey for any purpose other than hospital appointments. For these we allow 2 hours. When travelling further afield (eg to Addenbrookes), drivers will wait even longer. Generally, distance is not a problem.

Brigstock to Thrapston £5.20

Brigstock to the local surgery £3.00
